<u>Vallejo</u> is a waterfront community in the County of Solano in the north bay area of San Francisco Bay. The city is named for General Mariano Guadalupe Valley. He was a strong supporter of California's statehood and one of the first embers of the California State Senate. The city twice served as the capital of the state of California; once in 1852 and again in 1853. Vallejo incorporated in March, 1868. The current City Manager is **Greg Nyhoff**, and **Anne Cardwell** is the Assistant City Manager. **Dawn Abrahamson** is the City Clerk.



Anne Cardwell began her public service career as an Executive Secretary in the City of <u>Benicia</u> in 2003. She was promoted to Assistant to the City Manager in 2006, and served as the <u>Benicia</u> Assistant City Manager from January, 2014 to July, 2016. Anne was

appointed Assistant City Manager in the City of <u>Martinez</u> in 2016. She joined the <u>Vallejo</u> city staff in December, 2018 as the Assistant City Manager. John Russo Receives League of California Cities Lifetime Achievement Award

Members of the League of California Cities Past Presidents Council selected former city manager, city attorney, city council member, and League Board of Directors member **John Russo** as the recipient of the 2020 Past Presidents' Lifetime Achievement Award. He received the honor during the opening General Session of the League's 2020 Annual Conference & Expo.

After graduating from Yale with honors and finishing law school at New York University, John became a legal aid lawyer in St. Louis, Missouri. In 1987, at 28-years old, John moved to <u>Oakland</u> where he knew no one. Seven years later, he was elected to the <u>Oakland</u> City Council in a landslide.

John is the only person in California who has worked as a City Council member, a full-time City Attorney, and a City Manager. His municipal roles have been varied, and so have the cities in which he has served: <u>Oakland</u>, <u>Alameda, Riverside</u>, and <u>Irvine</u>.



John is a past President of the League, and he is also a veteran participant of the City Manager "Proof of Life" lunch program.





Gillian Hayes is the Planning & Development Services Director in <u>Vallejo</u>. Gillian worked as an Associate Planner in 2003 for the San Joaquin County Community Development in Stockton. In August, 2005 she took the City

Planner position in the City of <u>Santa Rosa</u>, where she worked for a little more than 7-years. In January, 2013 Gillian became the Director of Planning & Development for the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria in <u>Rohnert Park</u>. She left that post in 2018 to work for a private engineering firm. Gillian joined the <u>Vallejo</u> staff in October, 2019. The city incorporated in September, 1905 supported by ranchers **James J.** and **Thomas J. Furlong**, and **John B. Leonis**. The 2019 estimated population is 110. **Carlos R. Fandino Jr.**, a former U. S. Marine, has served as the City Administrator since 2016. Lisa Pope is the City Clerk.



Jessica Balandran, Utilities Compliance Analyst for the City of <u>Vernon</u> Public Utilities, began her working career as an Assistant to the Executive Director of the International Hispanic Network starting in May, 2007 in San Antonio, Texas. In January, 2009

Jessica took a job as a Legal Assistant for a law firm in <u>Pasadena</u>. After working a marketing position (2010-2012); then as a Senior Analyst for **Tripepi Smith & Associates** (2012); she joined the city staff in <u>Cudahy</u> as a Senior Administrative Analyst in September, 2012. In September, 2016 she moved to her current position with the City of <u>Vernon</u> Public Utilities. After attending classes at Eastern Michigan University, Jessica earned a BA and MPA from St. Mary's University.

<u>Victorville</u> is found in San Bernardino County's Victor Valley. In 1858, **Aaron G. Lane** founded a way station called "Lane's Crossing" in what is now known as <u>Victorville</u>. It served travelers. The area's history is filled with pioneers and prospectors coming to California. The city did not incorporate until September, 1962. The 2019 estimated population is 122,385. **Keith C. Metzler** is the <u>Victorville</u> City Manager, and **Charlene Robinson** is the City Clerk.



Sophie (Escobar) Smith is one of two <u>Victorville</u> Deputy City Manager. The other is **Jenele Davidson**. Sophie joined the <u>Victorville</u> city staff in August, 2000 as an Assistant Director of Economic Development, a position she held for more than

a dozen years. In August, 2012 she became the Economic Development Administrator. Sophie was appointed Director of Economic Development in April, 2016, and she was elevated to a <u>Victorville</u> Deputy City Manager in January, 2018. Sophie earned a BA in law and society from the University of California, Santa Barbara, and an MBA from California State University, San Bernardino.

<u>Villa Park</u> is a city in Orange County. The city was known as "Mountain View" in the 1860s. The U.S. Post Office refused to allow

the name because there was already a "Mountain View" Post Office, and the area became known as <u>Villa Park</u>. At the time, it was an agricultural area. The Serrano Water District was established to serve the area, and still provides the city water. <u>Villa Park</u> was incorporated in January, 1962. The City's 2019 estimated population is 5,790. **Steve Franks** is the City Manager and City Clerk.

Kim Chaudhry works as a Senior Management Analyst at <u>Villa Park</u> City Hall.

Alyssa Manassero is a Management Analyst for the City of <u>Villa Park</u>.

Carolyn Veregge became the City Manager of <u>Villa Park</u> in 1985. She worked as the City Clerk with **Arthur Simonian**, when he worked as a parttime consultant City Manager for the City. Tennessee-reared, Carolyn began working for <u>Villa Park</u> as a part-time secretary and moved up to Deputy City Clerk, and then City Clerk in 1978. She credited <u>Yorba Linda</u> City Manager **Art Simonian** for her understanding of the City Manager position.

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
