

Escalon was founded by James Wheeler Jones, who found the name in a book in the <u>Stockton</u> Free Library. Escalon is a Spanish word meaning "steppingstones." "Johnny" Jones, Jim's father,

crossed the plains in 1852 and settled where <u>Escalon</u> now stands. The City of <u>Escalon</u> incorporated in March 1957. It's 2019 estimated population is 7,574. **Tammy Alcantor** is the City Manager, and **Dominique Romo** is the City Clerk. **Bridget Gaines** is the Recreation Services Coordinator. **Robert Lackey** is the **Escalon** Chief of Police.



Tammy Alcantor began her public service career in 2004 as an Account Clerk in the City of <u>Escalon</u>. In 2005 she was promoted to Account Technician, and in 2007 Tammy became the <u>Escalon</u> Assistant Finance Director.

She began serving as the City of <u>Escalon</u> City Manager and Finance Director in July 2013. She has worked with the City of <u>Escalon</u> for nearly 18years. Tammy is an accounting and computer science graduate from Modesto Junior College.

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City Managers in Cities in the County of San Joaquin

Lathrop was laid out around 1868 when the transcontinental railroad was extended to area. A post office was established in 1871. The city was named for Jane Elizabeth Lathrop Stanford, wife of Leland Stanford, a Governor of California (1862-1863) and he served in the United States Senate representing California (1885-1903). Senator Stanford died in office at the age of 69. Leland and Jane are co-founders of Stanford University in 1885. The City of Lathrop was incorporated in July 1989. The city's 2019 estimated population is 24,483. Stephen J. Salvatore is the City Manager, and Teresa Vargas, CMC is the City Clerk.

Stephen J. Salvatore was appointed <u>Lathrop</u> City Manager in September 2012. Steve stepped up to serve as Interim City Manager when City Manager **Cary Keaten** left the city to become the General Manager of the Solano Irrigation District in <u>Vacaville</u>. Steve joined the city staff as the Director of Public Works starting January 1, 2008. Steve is not a member of ICMA.



Retired <u>Commerce</u> City Administrator (1987-1994) **Lou Shepard** is at his cabin in McKenzie Bridge, Oregon. Lou says he will have to miss the September 30 "Proof of Life" lunch as he will be in Oregon. In addition to <u>Commerce</u>, Lou served as City Manager in <u>Delano</u> (1964-1967), <u>San Pablo</u> (1967-1977), and <u>Signal Hill</u> (1985-1987). Lou also served as the <u>Pasadena</u> Redevelopment Agency Executive Director (1977-1981).

Yvonne Pimentel Quiring served as the <u>Lathrop</u> City Manager from June 2007, after serving as the Interim City Manager for six months, and two-years as the Assistant City Manager. Since then Yvonne has worked as the <u>Fillmore</u>

City Manager from 2010 to October 2012. She joined the City of <u>Davis</u> staff in October 2012 as the Assistant City Manager and Administrative Services Director. Her duties included those of Finance Director. She replaced **Paul Navazio**, who left <u>Davis</u> to become City Manager in <u>Woodland</u>. Before her <u>Lathrop</u> experience Yvonne worked in <u>Stockton</u> and the City of <u>Fresno</u>. Yvonne retired from <u>Davis</u> in 2015. Yvonne earned a BA in sociology from California State University, Fresno and an MBA from the University of Phoenix.

When the Central Pacific Railroad was able to obtain a site in the townsite for a station there in 1869 surveyors began to layout the streets for the City of Lodi. Initially called

Mokelumne and Mokelumne Station after the nearby river, confusion with other towns prompted a name change. Lodi is a city in northern Italy where Napoleon defeated the Austrians in 1796. More than likely, some of the earliest settler families were from Lodi, Illinois, and they chose to use the same name for their new town. The City of <u>Lodi</u> was incorporated in December 1906. The 2019 estimated population is 67,586. **Steve Schwabauer** is the City Manager and **Jennifer Cusmir** is the City Clerk.



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Roxanne Diaz is a member of the Board of Trustees of the California <u>City Management Foundation</u> <u>(CCMF)</u>.

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Steve Schwabauer is the Lodi City Manager He was appointed to the position in May 2014 after serving as City Attorney for 10-years. He was appointed Interim City Manager as the age of 46 starting in February 2014. Steve took over as City Manager when City Manager Rad Bartlam accepted an appointment in January 2014 as the City Manager of Chino Hills. Steve worked for a private law firm in Stockton. One of his clients was the City of Ripon in an eminent domain case. In 2000 he was hired as Deputy City Attorney and then appointed City Attorney in 2004 following 5-months as Interim City Attorney. A native of Ventura, Steve earned a BA in history from the University of California, Davis. He attended Santa Clara University Law School, and then earned a law degree from the University of California, Berkeley. Steve is an avid bicycle rider.



After working in finance for an investor bank and for a public finance firm, **Andrew Keys** joined the city staff in <u>Elk Grove</u> in April 2008 as an Accounting Manager. While serving as Budget Manager starting in September 2013, Andrew worked for a time as

<u>Manteca</u> was founded in 1861 by **Joshua Cowell**. In 1873 the Central Pacific Railroad laid track directly through the area. The community chose the name "Monteca" but the railroad misprinted the name to "Manteca," which was eventually accepted at the name of the town. The city was incorporated in May 1918. The 2019 estimated population is 83,028. **Mike Harden** is the Interim City Manager and **Cassandra Candini-Tilton** is the City Clerk and Legislative Service Director.

Mike Harden is a retired <u>Modesto</u> Chief of Police. He served as the <u>Manteca</u> Interim Police Chief for 7-months before he was tapped to serve as the Interim City Manager in April 2021. Since retiring in August 2012 from <u>Modesto</u>, he has served in serveral "interim" positions. Mike worked for the <u>Modesto</u> police department for more than 26-years; the last 3 years 3 months as Chief. He has served as Interim City Manager in <u>Hughson</u> (2013), Interim Police Chief in <u>Escalon</u> (2014), Interim Police Chief in <u>Oakdale</u> (2016; and as the Regional Manager of the Department of Protective Services for Sutter Health in <u>Modesto</u> (March 2018-March 2019).

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<u>Ripon</u> is on the site previously known as Murphy's Ferry. It was renamed <u>Ripon</u> for Ripon, Wisconsin, which was named for a city in England. The city was inforporated in November 1945. Its 2019 estimated population is 16,386. **Kevin Werner** is the City Administrator, **Lisa Roos** is the City Clerk and **Kye Stevens** is the Director of Recreation.

Kevin Werner is a civil engineer. He work in engineering positions in the private sector prior to joining the City of <u>Ripon</u> as the City Engineer in May 2007. Kevin was born and raised in Ripon. When City Administrator **Leon Compton** retired in 2013 after 27-years with the city, Kevin was afforded the opportunity to serve as City Administrator; first in an "Interim" capacity. Kevin earned a BS in civil engineering from the University of the Pacific.

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Michael Colantuono is Managing Shareholder, and currently is City Attorney for the City of <u>Grass Valley</u>.

Two of the firm's attorneys were named California Lawyers of the Year (2020).

Stockton is the county seat of San Joaquin County. Stockton was founded by **Arlos Maria Weber** in 1849. The city is named for **Robert F. Stockton**. It is said that the city is the first

community in Califonria to have a name not of Spanish or Native American origin. <u>Stockton</u> is home to the University of the Pacific (UOP), charterered in 1851; the oldest university in California. The Port of Stockton became a busy hub for transportation of passengers and goods during the Gold Rush. <u>Stockton</u> incorporated in July 1850. The 2019 estimated populastion is 312,697.

<u>Stockton</u>'s Chief Financial Officer **Jay Kapoor** served as an Assistant Program Budget Manager for the California Department of Finance between January 2013 and March 2020. He worked for the State for 17-years. Jay joined the City of <u>Stockton</u> staff as Assistant Chief Financial Officer in March 2020, and he was elevated to CFO in April 2021 by City Manager **Harry Black**. He earned a BS in agricultural and managerial economics from the University of California, Davis and an MBA from California State University, Sacramento.

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<u>Tracy</u> is another California railroad town. The Central Pacific Railroad track from <u>Sacramento</u> through <u>Stockton</u> on its way to the San Francisco Bay Area went through the area starting in 1868 through 1878 when the new branch and junction opened. There was a junction named for railroad director **Lathrop J. Tracy**. <u>Tracy</u> grew and prospered as the center of an agricultural area. The city incorporated in July 1910. The 2019 estimated population of Tracy is 94,740.



<u>Tracy</u> City Manager **Jenny Haruyama** resigned to become the first City Manager in Beaverton, Oregon under a new City Charter. Jenny began her public service career as a Public Service Assistant in

Milpitas and with a Management Internships in Mountain View, San Leandro and Milpitas. In 1997 Jenny worked in Rancho Cucamonga as a Management Analyst. She moved to Los Gatos as Assistant to the Town Manager in 2001. Jenny appointed Assistant Finance/Budget was Director in 2008. After 11-years in Los Gatos she took the Administrative Services Director position in Tracy and served as Interim Assistant City Manager in 2014. In December 2014 Jenny was hired as the Assistant City Manager in the City of Livermore. In May 2018 Jenny was selected to serve as the City Manager in the City of Scotts Valley. She returned to the City of Tracy in May 2019 as City Manager, and just recently resigned to move to Oregon. Jenny earned a BS from San Jose State University, and an MPA from California State University, East Bay. She also completed the California Local Governance Summer Institute at Stanford University. In 2020 Jenny received a 25-year ICMA Service Award. She is a past President of MMANC (2011).

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
