Ray Harris (1937 - 2022)

Former City Administrator and professional public administrator Ray Harris passed away peacefully surrounded by family on Wednesday morning, May 25, 2022. He worked as Bellflower City Administrator Peter B. Feenstra's Assistant. Ray served with the old RTD with **Sam Olivito**. He served as the City Administrator in the City of Hawaiian Gardens with veteran city managers Doug Dunlap and Paul Philips. Ray worked as the District Executive for the late California State Assembly Speaker Pro Tem Frank Vicencia, and he served as the Transportation Deputy to Los Angeles County Supervisor Don Knabe. Ray was a versatile and professional public service manager. Following his retirement Ray served as a volunteer docent at the Richard Nixon Presidential Library in Yorba Linda. Ray was always fun to have around. He had jokes and stories that would keep his listeners in stitches. Ray Harris is missed by his friends and acquaintances in addition to his family.

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Found in <u>Calabasas</u> is an adobe structure that dates from 1844 and is one of the oldest surviving buildings in greater Los Angeles. <u>Calabasas</u> incorporated in April 1991. It has a 2020 estimated population of 23,241. **Kindon Meik** is the City Manager, and **Maricela Hernandez** is the City Clerk. **John Bingham** is the Administrative Services Manager and **Erica Green** is the Director of Community Services.

Kindon Meik was appointed City of <u>Calabasas</u> City Manager in January 2021 and began his tenure in March, taking over for Interim City Manager **Don Penman**. Kin is a former City Manager in <u>Corcoran</u> and in the City of <u>Lindsay</u>. Lin earned a BA and Master's degree from Brigham Young University, and a Ph.D. in history from Florida International University.

<u>Carson</u> is the Home of the L A Galaxy Major League Soccer team. <u>Carson</u> was incorporated in February 1968. The 2020 estimated population of <u>Carson</u>

is 95,558. **Sharon Landers** is the City Manager and **Khaleah Bradshaw** is the City Clerk.



City Manager **Sharon Landers** began her public service career in transportation with the New State Governor's Office in 1981. She was a Special Advisor on transportation and air quality to

the Mayor of New York City in 1989-1991. After working in Albany and Trenton, New Jersey, Sharon came to the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority in 1998. After a time with a consulting firm, she joined the San Jose Redevelopment Agency at Assistant Executive Director (2002-2006). Sharon became the Assistant City Manager in the City of Irvine in 2006. In addition, in 2007 she took the Interim CEO position with the Orange County Great Park, Sharon worked in Irvine for thirteen years, and then did some consulting starting in December 2018. She was appointed City Manager in the City of Carson in May 2019. She earned a BA in psychology and computer science from State University of New York at Stony Brook. She earned a JD from the Union University of Albany Law School. Sharon stepped down from her position with Carson effective March 1, 2022. Sharon is the only female city manager in Carson's 52-year history.

David C. Roberts, Jr. is the new City Manager with Sharon Lander's resignation. He was originally hired in <u>Carson</u> to serve as Assistant City Manager in 2018. He earned a BA from California State University, Long Beach.



Between 1970 and 1972, <u>Cerritos</u> was the fastest-growing city in California. The city incorporated in April 1956 as "Dairy Valley." The city's name was changed to

"Cerritos" in January 1967. The 2020 estimated population is 49,578. **Art Gallucci** is the City Manager and **Vida P. Barone** is the City Clerk. **Torrey Contreras** is the Senior Assistant City Manager. Cerritos has had some highly professional city managers over the years, including **William Stark**, **Gaylord Knapp** and current city manager, **Art Gallucci**.

On August 31, 1986, Aeroméxico Flight 498, on approach to Los Angeles International Airport from Mexico City, was struck by a small Piper aircraft that had strayed into a Terminal Control Area without clearance from Air Traffic Control. The Piper crashed on the grounds of Cerritos Elementary School, luckily unoccupied. The Douglas DC-9 fell inverted (upside-down) and plowed into a dense residential area flattening four homes and damaging others. The resulting fire destroyed eight additional houses before firefighters could bring it under control. Eightytwo (82) people died, including fifteen (15) people on the ground. There is a special sculpture in the Cerritos Sculpture Garden memorializing the incident.



Arthur Gallucci was appointed Cerritos City Manager in April 1991. He had been serving as Assistant City Manager to City Manager Gaylord F. Knapp. Art joined the Cerritos staff

in 1971 as a Recreation Superintendent. He was promoted to Assistant Director of Human Affairs. Previous to <u>Cerritos</u>, Art worked for the now-defunct <u>Norwalk</u> Parks and Recreation District that was taken over by the City of Norwalk.



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<u>Claremont</u> was first mapped out by developers following the land boom that came as a result of the transcontinental railroads arriving in Southern California. It is thought

that the name "Claremont" came from Claremont, New Hampshire. The city is closely tied to Pomona College, which moved there in 1889. Claremont was incorporated in October 1907. Its 2020 estimated population is 37,266. Adam Pirrie is the City Manager and Shelley Desautels is the City Clerk. Nikola Hlady is the Senior Planner.



City Manager Adam Pirrie joined the Claremont city staff in July 2005 as the Accounting Supervisor. He was elevated to Finance Manager in October 2007 and he became Finance Director in January 2011. Adam was appointed full-time City Manager in

October 2020 following City Manager **Tara Schultz** into the position. Adam is an alumnus of the University of California, Los Angeles (**UCLA**).

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<u>Commerce</u> was incorporated in 1960 to prevent neighboring cities such as <u>Vernon</u> and <u>Los Angeles</u> from annexing their industrial land. The current City Manager is **Edgar**

P. Cisneros and **Lena Shumway** is the City Clerk and Director of Administrative Services. **Vilko Domic** is the Assistant City Manager.

City Manager Edgar P. Cisneros worked as a policy consultant for the Majority Caucus of the California State Senate in 2006-2007. He then became a Senior Deputy to Los Angeles County Supervisor Gloria Molina in December 2007. In 2014 Edgar worked in public affairs for the Public Works Department of Los Angeles County. He was appointed City Manager in Huntington Park in June 2015, and in November 2017 he became the City Manager in the City of Commerce. He served as a member of the Montebello Unified School District Board of Education (December 2013-April 2020). Edgar earned a BA from California State University, Long Beach and an MPA from the University of Southern California, (USC).

<u>Compton</u> was the 8th city to incorporate in Los Angeles County in May 1888. The 2020 estimated population is 95,740. The City Manager is **Thomas Thomas** and **Alita Godwin** is the City Clerk. **Triphenia Simmons** and **Michael Antwin** are Assistant City Managers.

Fire Chief Ronerick DeKeith Simpson was appointed <u>Compton</u>'s Interim City Manager in July 2021. He follows a number of City Managers including: Johnny Ford, Harold Duffey, Jerry Groomes, Bryan Batiste, <u>Cecil Rhambo</u> and Craig Cornwell. Ronerick studied at Columbia Southern University.

Thomas Thomas has been appointed <u>Compton</u>'s new full-time City Manager. He previously served as City Manager in Lake City, Florida and as Interim City Manager in Charlotte, Michigan. Thomas earned a BA in political science from Valdosta State University and an MPA from Georgia State University.

Covina was founded in 1882 by Joseph Swift Phillips. It appears that the city was named by a young engineer, Frederick Eaton, who was hired to survey the area.

At the time orange and grapefruit orchards covered the city. In 1909 the city was the third largest orange producer in the world. Covina was incorporated in August 1901. Its' 2020 estimated population is 51,268. Chris Marcarello is the Covina City Manager and Mary Lou Walczak is the elected City Clerk.



Chris Marcarello was a Project Manager in <u>Claremont</u> starting in April 2001. Chris became an Administrative Analyst in <u>Newport Beach</u> in 2005. In September 2007

Chris was hired to serve as the Director of Public Works in <u>Rosemead</u>. He went to <u>San Fernando</u> in 2014 to be Deputy City Manager and Public Works Director. He worked in <u>Glendale</u> from April 2017 to June 2018 as the Assistant Director of Public Works, and in June 2018 he was named City Manager in <u>Covina</u>. Chris earned a BS from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona and an MBA from the University of Massachusetts.

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HdL was founded in 1983 by former City Manager Robert "Bob" Hinderliter. HdL expanded and improved with the help of a partnership with former City Manager Lloyd de Llamas, the firm's

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<u>Cudahy</u> is the second smallest city in Los Angeles County after <u>Hawaiian Gardens</u> but with one of the highest population densities. Cudahy is named for its founder, meat-packing leader **Michael Cudahy**. <u>Cudahy</u> incorporated in November 1960. Its 2020 estimated population is 22,811. Following WW II Cudahy residents worked for plants operated by General Motors, Chrysler, Firestone and Bethlehem Steel. **Alfonso Noyola** is the City Manager.



The late **Ray Harris** and **Greg Korduner** met for lunch at Wood Ranch in the <u>Cerritos</u> Town Center on Wednesday, December 17, 2014. Ray began his city services in <u>Bellflower</u> and Greg began in the Cities of <u>Norwalk</u> and <u>Artesia</u>. Greg retired as the <u>Huntington Park</u> City Manager. These two liked playing golf.



City Manager **Alfonso Noyola** is a retired Air Force Major. He was a Medical Service Corps Officer. He served the Air Force from 1979 to 1999. After working in the mortgage industry starting in 1999, Alfonso joined the city staff

in North Las Vegas. He worked as the Assistant Director of Police Services (2003-2010) and the Director of Administrative Services 2010-2014). He then served three years as the City Manager in <u>Arvin</u> (2015-2018) and then Boulder City (2018-2020). Alfonso was appointed City Manager in Cudahy in July 2021.

Brenda Rodriguez is the <u>Cudahy</u> Administrative Services Director. She joined the <u>Cudahy</u> staff in September 2014 as a Section Leader in the <u>Cudahy</u> Beautification Project following her service as a local soccer coach (2007-2015). Brenda was a Recreation Coordinator Inter in 2015 and worked as an Account Clerk (2016-2019) and Administrative Analyst from January 2019 to January 2022 with she was appointed Director. Brenda earned a BBA from California State University, Long Beach and Master's degree in public policy from the University of Southern California (**USC**). Brenda is a Notary Public.

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<u>Culver City</u> has been a center for the film and television productions industry. The city was named for its founder, **Harry Culver**. **John M. Nachbar** is the City Manager, and **Onyx Jones** is the Assistant City Manager. **H. Dale Jones** was appointed the city's Chief Administrative Officer in 1969. **Jody Hall-Esser** was the CAO in 1996.



City Manager John M. Nachbar served as an Administrative Assistant in Zanesville, Ohio in 1979-1980. He then became and Administrative Assistant in Wichita Falls, Texas in 1980. In 1982 he became the Assistant to

the City Manager in Overland Park, Kansas and he was promoted to Assistant City Manager in 1985. He came to California in 1987 to be the City Manager in the City of <u>Patterson</u> and he moved to be the City Administrator of <u>Albany</u> in 1991. In 1994 John took a Deputy City Manager post in Tucson, Arizona. In January 2000 he returned to Overland Park as the City Manager. In August 2010 John was selected for the City Manager position in <u>Culver City</u>. He earned a BGS and an MPA from The University of Kansas. John received a rare 40-year ICMA Service Award in 2019.

Ray was a close friend to Paul Strohman and Glenn "Hutch" Hutchinson of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. Fred Diaz, the 1987 recipient of the John H. Nail Memorial Award, served as the City Manager in Indio (1990-1994), Tracy (1994-2004) and Fremont (2004-2018). Fred earned a BA and MPA from California State University, Fullerton. Fred served as the sixth Fremont city manager. City Manager Melissa Steavenson-Diaz of Redwood City married Fred.
