# City Managers in Sonoma County Cities

Sonoma County is part of California's "Wine Country." The county incorporated in February 1850. The county seat is the City of <u>Santa Rosa</u>. Russian immigrants were the first to establish a permanent settlement in Sonoma County. Fort Ross was established in 1812. The 2020 population was set at 488,863. **M. Christina Rivera** is the Sonoma County Administrator, appointed in January 2023. She has worked for the county for more than 26 years.

<u>Cloverdale</u> begins the alphabetical listing of Sonoma County cities and continues with <u>Cotati</u>, <u>Healdsburg</u>, <u>Petaluma</u>, <u>Rohnert Park</u>, <u>Santa Rosa</u>, <u>Sebastopol</u>, <u>Sonoma</u> and <u>Windsor</u>.



<u>Cloverdale</u> started as a stagecoach stop. The town was laid out after 1859. Railroad service hit the community in 1872, and by 1878 there were three trains a day service between <u>Cloverdale</u> and the San Francisco Bay Ferry landing. The city was incorporated in February 1872. The 2020 population is set at 8,996. **David Kelley** is the City Manager and City Clerk is **Mike Maloney**.

Cloverdale City Manager David Kelley began his public service career as an economic and planning consultant for a private sector company in Chico in April 1995. David went to work for the County of Colusa as the Director of Plannina & Building and LAFCO Executive Officer starting in June 1998. After a little more than 3 years as a Senior Project Manager for a private firm in Rocklin, David joined the staff in the Town of Windsor. David left Windsor in 2016 to take the Assistant City Manager and Community Development jobs in Cloverdale. He was appointed City Manager in April 2018. David earned a BA from California State University, Chico and attended graduate classes there. He earned an MBA from Sonoma State University. Outside of work David has served as an Event Volunteer for the Vineman Ironman Triathlons starting in 2013.

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# City Managers in Sonoma County Cities

In 1870 the San Francisco and North Pacific Railroad completed the first railroad from Petaluma to Santa Rosa. The town of Cotati formed around the wood and water stop called Page's Station. The 1906 San Francisco earthquake damage many Cotati fireplace chimneys, including the chimney at the Stony Point School. Cotati incorporated in July 1963. Its 2020 population is 7,584. Damien O'Bid is the City Manager and Kevin Patterson is the Deputy City Clerk. The Administrative Services Director is Angela Courter. Cotati's Recreation Manager is Ashley Wilson.



City Manager **Damien E. O'Bid** was hired in April 2015. He was the Action City Manager starting in December 2014. He joined the <u>Cotati</u> city staff in 2008 as the Assistant City Manager,

Public Works Director and City Engineer.

Following a successful private sector career starting in July 2003, <u>Cotati</u> Administrative Services Director **Angela Courter** joined the city staff as a Senior Accountant in August 2016. Angela was promoted to serve as the Director of Administrative Services in February 2019. She earned as AA from Santa Rosa Junior College and a BA from Sonoma State University. Angela is a Certified Public Accountant.

Healdsburg City Manager Jeff Kay worked with Willdan as a Project Manager from October 2005 until May 2009. He joined the City of San Leandro city staff in May 2009 as a Business Development Analyst. He worked his way up in the organization to Business Development Manager (2013-2016) and Assistant City Manager (2016-2018). Jeff served as the San Leandro City Manager for nearly 12-years starting in January 2018. He took the Healdsburg City Manager post in January 2021, Jeff earned a BA from Vassar College and an MA in planning from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

<u>Petaluma</u> gets its name from the Miwok village named Péta Lúuma. Considered the founder of <u>Petaluma</u> is famed Californio statesman **Mariano Guadalupe Vallejo**. <u>Petaluma</u> was

incorporated in April 1858. Its 2020 population is 59,776. <u>Petaluma</u> is known to have a historic center and is a center for the Petaluma Valley region of Sonoma County. **Peggy Flynn** is <u>Petaluma</u>'s tenth City Manager and **Kendall Sawyer** is the appointed City Clerk.



Petaluma City Manager Peggy Flynn served in communications, government affair and as a Special Projects Manager for the City of San Jose Redevelopment Agency (1998-2004). In 2006 she became the Executive Director of the

Downtown Bloomington Association in Illinois. Peggy became the Community and Government Relations Manager for the Sonoma County Agricultural Preservation and Open Space District in 2009. In 2012 Peggy was appointed Assistant to the City Manager in Novato and she became Assistant City Manager in 2017. Peggy was recruited to serve as the Petaluma City Manager in 2019. She earned a BS and attained the Dean's Scholar designation from San Jose State University.

Rohnert Park is named for the Rohnert family who owned the Rohnert Seed Farm, which started in 1929 and was a major horticultural

success. The city was planned and built in 1956 and 1957. The city of Rohnert Park was incorporated in 1962 and has a 2020 population of 44,390. Marcela Piedra is the City Manager and Sylvia Lopez Cuevas is the City Clerk. Don Schwartz is the Assistant City Manager and Cindy Bagley is the Director of Community Services.

Rohnert Park City Manager Marcela Piedra earned an MBA from the University of Phoenix. She was appointed city manager to take the place of retired City Manager Darrin Jenkins in 2022. She took office in January 2023. Marcela previously served as city manager for the City of El Centro for five years. Prior to becoming city manager Marcela worked as the El Centro Deputy City Manager, Community Services Director, Director of Economic Development, and Redevelopment Manager. She is bi-lingual fluent in English and Spanish.



After working for a private sports academy for a couple years (2007-2009), **Cindy (Toms) Bagley** worked as a Recreation Programs Supervisor for the Town of <u>Windsor</u> (2009-2016). In November 2016, Cindy joined the <u>Rohnert Park</u> city

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## City Managers in Sonoma County Cities

Santa Rosa is the county seat of Sonoma County. Santa Rosa was founded in 1833 and named by colonists from Mexico. By the 1850s a Wells Fargo post and general store were established in downtown Santa Rosa. The city was incorporated in March 1868. Its 2020 population is set at 178,127. The city manager is Maraskeshia Smith and Elizabeth Licursi is the Administrative Support Supervisor. Alan Alton is the Chief Financial Officer.

From April 2009 and June 2018, <u>Santa Rosa</u> City Manager **Maraskeshia Smith** worked for the City of Cincinnati; first as a Deputy Director of Public Works and then Director of Public Services (2015-2018). In July 2018 she went to work as the Assistant City Administrator in the City of <u>Oakland</u> and in May 2020 she became a Deputy City Manager in <u>Stockton</u>. Maraskeshia was appointed City Manager in <u>Santa Rosa</u> in January 2022. She earned a BS from the University of Kentucky and an MBA from Easter Kentucky University.



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**Michael Colantuono** is Managing Shareholder, and currently is City Attorney for the City of <u>Grass Valley</u>. Two of the firm's attorneys were named California Lawyers of the Year (2020).

Sebastopol post office and a small commercial center for the farmers in the surrounding area was established in the 1850s. The California Gold Rush brought many

settlers into the area in 1848-1855. Sebastopol became know as the "Gravenstein Apple Capital of the World." The town was incorporated in June 1902. The 2021 population is estimated at 7,448. Larry McLaughlin is the City Manager and City Attorney and Mary Gourley is the City Clerk and Assistant City Manager.

Larry McLaughlin of the law firm McLaughlin & Hendrickson serves as the City Attorney and City Manager for the City of <u>Sebastopol</u>. Larry was appointed City Manager in 2013 after having served as City Attorney since 1987. Larry has announced plans to retire from his joint role as City Manager and City Attorney and return to his private law practice that he founded in 1987. He earned his law degree as a member of the first class of Empire College of Law.

Sonoma is one of the principal communities in California's Wine Country. Mission San Francisco Solano is the direct predecessor to the founding of Sonoma. In 1834, **George C. Yount** worked on the Mission construction. After

a time of military control a town council was established in 1844. The city was incorporated in September 1883. Its 2020 estimated population is 11,024. Mark Linder has served as the Interim City Manager since January 2023. Sue Casey had served as Acting City Manager starting in February 2022. Rebekah Barr is the Sonoma City Clerk starting in August 2016. Cathy Capriola was City Manager from January 2017 to December 2020. Carol Giovanatto is a retired Sonoma City Manager (December 2012 – January 2017).

Interim City Manager **Mark R. Linder** is a former Assistant City Manager for the City of <u>San Jose</u> (2002-2006) and Deputy City Manager (2006-2008). Mark served as the City Manager for the City of <u>Campbell</u> from February 2013 to December 2016. He earned a BA from Macalester College and an MPA from San Jose State University.

<u>Windsor</u>'s first European settlers arrived in 1851. A post office was

established in 1855. **Hiram Lewis** was the first postmaster and named the town <u>Windsor</u> for England's Windsor Castle. Northwestern Pacific Railroad came to <u>Windsor</u> in 1872, providing a convenient connection to the Bay Area. During WW II a U.S. Army Air Forces training air base was built. The airport is now the Charles M. Schulz – Sonoma County Airport. The town survived as an unincorporated community until July 1992 when Windsor incorporated. The 2019 estimated population is 27,128. **Jon Davis** is the Town Manager and **Irene Camacho-Werby** is the City Clerk.

<u>Windsor</u> Town Manager **Jon Davis** was appointed in August 2022. He previously served as Director of the <u>Windsor</u> Parks and Recreation Department. He succeeded Town Manager **Ken MacNab**, who retired in December 2021, and took over from Interim Town Manager **Mark Linder**. Jon first came to work for the town in 2003 starting as a Recreation Program Coordinator. Jon was promoted to Parks and Recreation Department Director. Jon began his public service career working for the cities of <u>Irvine</u> and <u>Santa Barbara</u>.

<u>Windsor</u> Parks and Recreation Director **Olivia Lemen** joined the town staff in December 2014 as a Management Analyst in the Parks and Recreation Department. She previously worked as Recreation Manager in the City of <u>Calistoga</u> (2099-2014). Olivia earned a BS in applied mathematics from Humboldt State University.



Roy completed professional work assignments in Porterville, Montebello, Scottsdale, Colorado Spring, Fountain Hills, and the counties of Yolo, Maricopa and Nevada. Roy earned a BA in political science from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), and MA in government from California State University, Los Angeles, and he was a Coro Foundation Intern. Roy is a past President of ICMA. The Rossmoor Community Services District has a population of approximately 10,500, The district is an unincorporated area located between the cities of Seal Beach and Los Alamitos. General Manager Joe Mendoza, a retired City of Cerritos Recreation Services Superintendent, was hired by the District in October 2018. Joe worked as a Deputy Director with the Los Angeles County Community Services Agency following his retirement from Cerritos.



More Pieces Picked Up: Cornelius "Con" Johnson, Antioch City Manager, has been placed on administrative leave. Con was appointed City Manager last October with a two-year employment agreement. Human Resources Director Ana Cortez is the Acting City Manager. There has been talk of a recruitment to replace Con. Former Assistant City Manager

Rosanna Bayon Moore left the city in late February to become the City Administrator in the City of Piedmont. Con was hired to replace retired City Manager Ron Bernal. Con is a former San Francisco Police Captain, though his retirement records show he retired as a Police Lieutenant. Former Orange County Treasurer Chriss Street is the new Chief Executive Officer for the County of Shasta. Chriss is known as one of those involved in the movement to divide the State of California into two States. Chriss has roots in Shasta County. Local media reported that he returned to the area to care for his parents. He has operated his business and government consulting firm, Chriss Street & Company since January 1994. He has served as an Adjunct Professor at California State University, Dominguez Hills since August 2011. He was elected Orange County Treasurer from January 2006 until January 2011. Chriss earned a BS in economics from the University of California, Irvine. Irvine City Manager Oliver Chi, a public management veteran, was interviewed by FBI agents as part of an investigation of the city. Oliver has been City Manager since November 2021. He said that the FBI had questions related to an ongoing investigation that they are engaged in related to issues in and around Irvine. Oliver became the sixth Irvine City Manager in December 2021. He previously served as City Manager in Huntington Beach, Monrovia and Rosemead. He held other executive posts in Barstow. Claremont and Arcadia. Oliver earned a BA from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) and an MPA from the University of Southern California (USC). A vociferous group of residents continue

to complain about the appointment of new <u>Yucaipa</u> City Manager **Chris Mann.** A city investigation found no

evidence to support claims the group made. Chris is the successor to retired City Manager **Ray Casey**. Chris grew up in the Dallas, Texas area, which has made him a huge Dallas Cowboys fan. Chris is a former Director and President of the Yucaipa Valley Water District (2016-2023) and served as the City Manager for the City of <u>Canyon Lake</u> (2019-2023). 
