Executive Leadership in Six Cities of the County of Orange



Orange County, the O.C., has a larger population than 19 States and the District of Columbia. The April 2020 population estimate shows the number of residents at 3,186,989. The county was

incorporated in August 1889 and the county seat is the City of <u>Santa Ana</u>. In November 1776, *Mission San Juan Capistrano* became the first permanent European settlement in the area. There are now 34-incorporated cities in the county where avocados and citrus fruit once grew in large orchards. This issue takes a peek at the professionals who serve the cities of the first six cities in the county listed alphabetically: <u>Aliso Viejo</u>, <u>Anaheim</u>, <u>Brea</u>, <u>Buena</u> Park, Costa Mesa and Cypress.





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Executive Leadership in Six Cities of the County of Orange



Aliso Viejo was the first planned community in California to plan a balance between the projected local work force and the number of projected jobs within its borders. A 900-acre

business park, Pacific Park, and the town center, was expected to provide more than 22,000 jobs in order to encourage live-and-work opportunities. The Aliso Viejo Community Association (AVCA) was established to manage local parks and community open space. It was the first community-wide association of its kind in California. The city incorporated in July 2001. The 2020 estimated population is set at 52,176. David **Doyle** is the City Manager and **Mitzi Ortiz** is the City Clerk and Director of Government Services. Ann **Eifert** is the Director of Financial Services and City Treasurer, and **So Kim** is the Community Development Director. Shaun Pelletier is the Aliso Viejo Public Works Director and City Engineer, and Lizzy Mendoza is the Recreation & Community Services Manager.







Special group sessions for sports teams, police and fire departments or other groups may be arranged.

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City Manager **David Doyle**, one of the good guys, is a former Assistant City Manager for the City of <u>Diamond Bar</u> and came to <u>Aliso Viejo</u> as city manager in 2013. David began his public service career in March 1992 as an

Administrative Intern in Manhattan Beach. He was hired as a Management Assistant in Manhattan Beach in August 1993; became a Management Analyst in September 1994; Assistant to the City Manager in September 1995; and Deputy City Manager in January 2000. David left Manhattan Beach to accept the appointment to the Deputy City Manager position in Diamond Bar in July 2000. David was elevated to Assistant City Manager in July 2005. He was hired as the Aliso Viejo City Manager in 2013. David earned a BA from the University of California, Irvine and an MPA from California State University, Long Beach. In 2018 he received a 25-year ICMA Service Award.



So Kim joined the <u>Aliso Viejo</u> city staff in August 2022 as Community Development Director. She began her public service career in December 2004 as a Planning Technician for the City of Hermosa

Beach, and she took a similar post with Rancho Palos Verdes in August 2005. So moved up in the Rancho Palos Verdes staff to Assistant Planner (2006-2011), Associate Planner (2011-2014), Senior Planner (2014-2017) and Deputy Director and Planning Manager (2017-2019). In September 2019, So took the Senior Principal Planner position in the City of Laguna Beach and she was promoted to Assistant Director of Community Development in April 2021. So earned a BA from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona and an MPA from California State University, Long Beach.

Anaheim has effectively transformed from wine making, orange groves and smudge pots to a beautiful new urban area. Disneyland, the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim,

the NHL Anaheim Ducks and more have brought worldwide attention to the community. <u>Anaheim</u> has the largest population in Orange County at a 2020 figure of 346,824. The city was founded in 1857 and incorporated as the 2nd city in Los Angeles County in March 1876. Orange County broke off from L.A. County in 1889. **James Vanderpool** has served as the Anaheim City Manager since September 2020, and **Theresa Bass** is the City Clerk. **Deborah Moreno** is the <u>Anaheim</u> Finance Director and City Treasurer, and **Jean Ibalio** is the Deputy Finance Director. **Greg Garcia** is an <u>Anaheim</u> Assistant City Manager.

Though some are calling for his dismissal due to issues regarding the Anaheim Chamber of Commerce, James P. Vanderpool is the Anaheim City Manager. He has been with Anaheim since September 2020 taking over for Interim City Manager Greg Garcia, who filled in following the dismissal of City Manager Chris Zapata. Jim previously worked for the City of Buena Park for 25 years, serving as City Manager from 2012 to 2020. He served Buena Park as Deputy City Manager and in the city's Public Works Department. He began his public service career as an Intern with the City of Mission Viejo (1993-1995). Jim graduated from Servite High School and earned a BA in public administration from Purdue University and a Master's in business administration from the University of Phoenix.

Spanish visited the <u>Brea</u> area in 1769. The area came to be a center of crude oil production and later by citrus production. Today <u>Brea</u> is a significant retail center with the Brea Mall and downtown area. The City of <u>Brea</u> incorporated in February 1917 and the 2020 population is set at 47,325. **Bill Gallardo** is the City Manager and **Lillian Harris-Neal** is the City Clerk, and **Kristin Griffith** is the Administrative Services Director. **Jason Killebrew** is the <u>Brea</u> Community Development Director, and **Chris Emeterio** is the Community Services Director and Assistant City Manager. **Michael Ho** is the Public Works Director. **Marty Simonoff** is a well-known Brea official.

<u>Buena Park</u> is on land that formerly was part of the Rancho Los Coyotes. Rule of the area moved from the Spanish to the authority of Mexico in 1822. The area went to the United States in 1848 as part of

California that was granted statehood in 1850. The Buena Park area has transitioned primarily to residential from the dairy, wine and citrus industries. Orange groves and smudge pots have been replaced with homes and a few tourist attractions. <u>Buena Park</u> is home to Knott's Berry Farm. The city incorporated in January 1953. The 2020 population is set at 84,034. Aaron France is the City Manager and Adria M. Jimenez is the City Clerk. The Community Development Director is Matt Foulkes, and Jim Box is the Community Development Director Service Director. Sung Hyun Is the Buena Park Finance Director, Assistant City Manager **Eddie Fenton** provides Human Resources administration, and Mina Mikhael is the Director of Public Works and City Engineer.

<u>Costa Mesa</u> gained much of its population during and following World War II due to the nearby Santa Ana Army Air Base. <u>Costa Mesa</u> is the home of the Orange County Fairgrounds and Expo.

Former city manager **Doug Labelle** serves on the fair board of directors. Adjacent to the fairgrounds is the Pacific Amphitheatre. The city is a general law city, and was incorporated in June 1953. It has a 2020 population of 111,918. **Lori Ann Farrell Harrison** is the City Manager and **Brenda Green** is the City Clerk. **Alma Reyes** is the Deputy City Manager and Fatima Gutierrez-Cueva is the Executive Assistant to the City Manager.

Lori Ann Farrell Harrison was named to the Costa Mesa City Manager position following a fourmonth nationwide executive recruitment search. <u>Cypress</u> was originally incorporated in 1956 with the name Dairy City, supported by local dairy farmers in an effort to protect their land from developers. Neighboring cities of

Dairy Valley, which is <u>Cerritos</u>, and Dairyland, which is <u>La Palma</u> took similar actions. Following the end of World War II, the property became too valuable to farm and the dairies gradually relocated and housing took their place. The city name was changed in 1957. The name was derived from *Cypress Elementary School*, which was originally built in 1895. The late City Manager **Darrell Essex** worked for the city 31-years becoming City Manager in 1962. Darrell passed away in 2019 at the age of 87. **Peter Grant** is the current City Manager and **Alisha Farnell** is the City Clerk. **Alicia Velasco** is the Planning Director. **Matt Burton** is the Finance Director.

The <u>El Segundo</u> rating has been raised from AA+ to AAA, the highest rating a municipality can be assigned. This upgraded rating is a major contributing factor in continuing the city's reputation as a businessfriendly city, according to Darrell. Joe Perez, the Community Development Director for the City of Jurupa Valley since November 2020, began his public service career in the City of La Habra Heights in August 1991. He served there as Assistant City Manager and City Manager, leaving La Habra Heights in October 1994 to be the <u>La Puente</u> Assistant City Manager. Joe left La Puente in August 1995 to become the Director of Community Services & Recreation for the City of Paramount, where he worked for nearly 17 years. In September 2012, Joe became the Community Development Director for the City of Bell and in April 2015 he took a similar position with the City of Lawndale. Joe left Lawndale in January 2016 and went to work as the South Gate Community Development Director, leaving that post in 2020 to join the <u>Jurupa Valley</u> staff. Joe is a Lakewood High School graduate and earned a BA in political science from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA). Salinas City Manager Steven S. Carrigan is a finalist for the San Bernardino City Manager position. Steve was previously the City Manager for the City of Merced starting in 2016. He was dismissed from Merced in 2020. Before that he worked as the Los Banos City Manager, and as the Assistant City Manager for the City of Sanger (December 2011-April 2013). Steve also worked for the Yuba Sutter Economic Development Corporation (2009); Stockton (2001-2009) and the City of Lathrop (2009-2011). Steve earned a BA from the University of Arizona. Pinole City Manager Andrew J. Murray resigned from his position. He began his Pinole tenure in January 2020. He was the Assistant City Manager in Pleasant Hill (2013-2020) and Oakland Assistant to the City Administrator (2012-2013).

Frederick "Fred" Sorsabal, 85, of Coeur d"Alene, Idaho passed away on Friday, July 22, 2023.
