# Executive Leadership in Six Cities of the County of Orange Revisited



Orange County, the O.C., has a larger population than 19 States and the District of Columbia. The April 2020 population estimate shows the number of residents at 3,186,989. The county was incorporated in August

1889 and the county seat is the City of <u>Santa Ana</u>. In November 1776, *Mission San Juan Capistrano* became the first permanent European settlement in the area. There are now 34-incorporated cities in the county where avocados and citrus fruit once grew in large orchards. This issue looks at the management professionals who serve the cities of the second six O.C. cities listed alphabetically: <u>Dana Point</u>, <u>Fountain Valley</u>, <u>Fullerton</u>, <u>Garden Grove</u>, <u>Huntington Beach</u>, and Irvine.





<u>Dana Point</u>, the Dolphin and Whale Watching Capital of the World, was named for the local headland, which was named for **Richard Henry Dana**, **Jr.**, author of Two Years Before the Mast. In his

book, Dana describes the area and claims that it along with neighboring San Juan Capistrano is the most romantic place on the coast. The area is designated a California Historical Landmark. European explorers and settlers came to the area in 1769 to 1770, The Mission San Juan Capistrano is very close by. Richard Henry Dana visited the area in 1835 while sailing aboard the sailing brig Pilgrim on her voyage along the California coast. Dana Point Harbor was built in the 1960s and opened in 1971 with a marina, shops and restaurants, along with the Catalina Express transportation. The city incorporated in January 1989. The 2020 population counted out at 33,107. Mike Killebrew is the City Manager and Shayna Sharke is the City Clerk. The Director **Assistant** City Manager and Administrative Services is **Kelly Reenders**.

City Manager Michael "Mike" A. Killebrew joined the Dana Point city staff in September 2007. He was appointed City Manager beginning in April 2020 succeeding City Manager Mark Denny, who left the city to accept the City Manager position in the City of Fontana. He is a resident of the city; the first to be appointed city manager. Prior to his city manager appointment, Mike served as the Dana Point Assistant City Manager and Director of Administrative Services for more than 12 years. Before joining the Dana Point city staff, Mike served as the Chief Financial Officer, controller and as an auditor for the City of Long Beach. Mike was named Dana Point Citizen of the Year in 2019. He served as President of the local Rotary Club and was twice named Rotarian of the Year.

Long time Dana Point Director of Community Services and Parks, Kevin Evans retired after more than 34 years of public service and 27 years with Dana Point. He began his public service career working for the U.S. Navy as a civilian recreation professional. In 1983 he joined municipal government as a Recreation Supervisor for the City of Rancho Cucamonga. Kevin became a Recreation Supervisor for the City of Poway in 1987, and in January 1990 he took a similar position with the Capistrano Bay Park and Recreation District. <u>Fountain Valley</u> developed on land that became full of farms. One of the main crops was beets that were processed at the Holly Sugar Plant in <u>Huntington Beach</u>. The post office

was established in 1899 and the city was incorporated in June 1957. The Fountain Valley name came from its "swamp land" reputation with a very highwater table. The area had a number of artesian wells too. Irrigation and drainage canals were installed to make the land usable for agriculture. Farming remained the main use of land until the 1960s. The 2020 population is set at 57,047. Maggie Le is the Fountain Valley City Manager and Rick Miller is the City Clerk. Meghan Wishner is the Management Analyst in the City Manager's office. Ryan Smith is the Finance Director, and Rob Frizzelle is the Community Services Director.

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Fountain Valley City Manager Maggie Le began her public service career as a Management Analyst for the City of Brea in 2001. In 2008, Maggie took an Administrative Analyst position in Buena Park. She

became a Management Analyst for the <u>Placentia</u> administration in November 2010, and in May 2015 she went to the City of Chino as Economic Development Manager. <u>Fullerton</u> had its first European visitors in 1769 when a Spanish expedition passed through on its way to <u>Monterey</u>. The area developed as agricultural

land. Orange and lemon groves stretched out over large areas. Oil wells found their way there too, and the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway built there. Residential development expanded following World War II as military veterans returned to start families and careers. The city incorporated in February 1904. The 2020 population is set as 143,617. Eric Levitt is the City Manager taking over from Interim City Manager Jeff Collier, a retired Whittier City Manager. Daisy Perez is the Deputy City Manager and Lucinda Williams is the City Clerk. Ellis Chang is the Administrative Services Director. Robert Dunn is the Fullerton Chief of Police.

Irvine is a master-planned community started by the Irvine Company in the 1960s. In 1866, James Irvine and a couple of partners acquired the biggest interest in the Irvine area property devoted mainly to ranching and after 1870 tenant farming. In 1878, James acquired the interests of his partners and following his death in 1886 his son, the ranch was inherited by his son James Irvine II. He converted the land use to field crops, olives, and citrus. The railroad came to the area in 1888 and the local station was named for **James Irvine**. The town eventually was named <u>Irvine</u> in 1914. Two United State Marine Corps facilities were built on Irvine ranch land sold to the government during World War II. In 1959, the University of California, Irvine began development. The city was incorporated in December 1971. Oliver C. Chi is the Irvine City Manager and **Carl Petersen** is the City Clerk. Chris Slama is the Community Services Tim Gehrich Director: is the Development Director; the Administrative Services Director is **Dahle Bulosan**; Human Resources Director is Jimmee Medina; Jaimee Bourgeois is the Public Works and Transportation Director; and Michael Kent is the Chief of Police.
