Another Seven Orange County Cities' Executive Leadership



This is the fourth in a series of issues dedicated to Orange County cities. The April 2020 Orange County population estimate is 3,186,989. The county was incorporated in August 1889 and

the county seat is the City of <u>Santa Ana</u>. In November 1776, <u>Mission San Juan Capistrano</u> became the first permanent European settlement in the area. There are now 34-incorporated cities in the county where avocados and citrus once grew in large orchards. This issue looks at management professionals who serve these O.C. cities listed alphabetically: <u>Los Alamitos</u>, <u>Mission Viejo</u>, <u>Newport Beach</u>, <u>Orange</u>, <u>Placentia</u>, <u>Rancho Santa Margarita</u>, and San Clemente.





In 1896 **Lewellyn Bixby** established the town of <u>Los Alamitos</u> to support the sugar beet factory of the Clark Brothers. In the 1900s sugar beets were delivered to the factories by horse and wagon. The

elimination of a protective tariff and an insect infestation in 1921, resulted in the eventual end of the sugar beet industry in Los Alamitos, but the town continued to grow. The city incorporated in March 1960. The 2020 population is set as 11,780. Chet Simmons is the City Manager and Windmera Quintanar is the City Clerk. Craig Koehler is the Finance Director, Chelsi Wilson is the Administrative Services Manager, and Emeline Noda is the Director of Recreation and Community Services. Michael Claborn is the Chief of Police.



Los Alamitos City Manager Chester "Chet" Simmons served as Assistant City Manager for the City of Westminster, working for City Manager Eddie Manfro, who retired in 2020. Chet became the Assistant to City Manager in July

2011 and was elevated to Assistant City Manager in 2015. The Director of Community Development responsibilities were added to the Assistant City Manager position in 2019. Chet was appointed City Manager in <u>Los Alamitos</u> in January 2020. He earned a BA in political science and government from Gonzaga University.

After working as a Community Services Coordinator for the City of <u>La Mirada</u> (2002-2007), **Emeline Noda** joined the <u>Los Alamitos</u> staff as a Recreation Supervisor in 2007. Emeline has been in <u>Los Alamitos</u> for more than 16 years. She was appointed Director of Recreation & Community Services in July 2021. Emeline earned a BA and MPA from California State University, Long Beach.

<u>Mission Viejo</u> is one of the largest master-planned communities ever built as a single project in the U.S. <u>Mission Viejo</u> is a hilly region in the County of Orange that was once used for cattle and sheep grazing.

It was considered "undevelopable" because of its geologic complexity. Mission Viejo incorporated in March 1988. The 2020 population is 93,653. It is ranked 81st in size of all California cities. The cost of living in Mission Viejo is 150.3% of the national average. Dennis Wilberg is the City Manager and Walker "Keith" K. Rattay is the Assistant City Manager. The Mission Viejo City Clerk is Kimberly Schmitt. Mark Nix is the Director of Recreation and Community Services, and Mark Chagnon is the Public Works Director. Elaine Lister is the Director of Community Development, and Jerry Hill is the Director of Public Services.



Mission Viejo City Manager **Dennis Wilberg** began his public service career working in Transportation for the City of Irvine starting in July 1979.

As the Manager of Transportation in Irvine, he joined the Mission Viejo city staff as the Director of Public

Works in September 1989. Dennis was selected to work as the Assistant City Manager in February 1994, and he became the <u>Mission Viejo</u> City Manager in October 2003. Dennis earned a BA from Californio Polytechnic University, Pomona. He received a 40-year ICMA Service Award in 2019.



Elaine Lister is the Director of Community Development for Mission Viejo. She has held that position since December 2013; nearly 10-years. She previously served as the Planning Manager.

Elaine joined the <u>Mission Viejo</u> staff in 1990 as an Associate Planner. She became Planning Manager in 2000. Elaine is an Alumnus of the University of Glasgow.



Newport Beach In 1870 a 105-ton steam ship navigated through the lower and upper Newport Bay to unload its cargo. The steamer was The Vaquero, captained by Captain Samuel S. Dunnells. The

newly founded post was called "Newport." City development was stimulated and strengthened when the Pacific Electric Railway reach Newport in 1905. The City of Newport Beach incorporated in 1906. The 2020 population is 85,239. The City Manager is Grace K. Leung, and she has two Assistant City Managers Tara Finnigan and Seimone Jurjis. Leilani I. Brown is the City Clerk, and Jason Almam is the Finance Director and City Treasurer. The Public Works Director is Dave Webb, and Sean Levin serves as the Recreation & Senior Services Director. Mark Vukojevic is the Utilities Director, the Fire Chief is Jeff Boyles and Joseph L. Cartwright is the Chief of Police. Barbara Salvini is the Newport Beach Human Resources Director.

Newport Beach City Manager Grace Leung worked as the Director of Finance for the City of Sunnyvale for nearly 6 years (2010-2016) prior to joining the city staff in the City of Irvine as the Director of Administrative Services in January 2016. She became the Irvine Assistant City Manager in October 2016 and served in that capacity until she was appointed Newport Beach City Manager in September 2018. Grace earned a BA in urban studies from Columbia University and an MPP from the Kennedy School at Harvard University.

Leilani Brown was named Newport Beach City Clerk in 2008. She has been with the city since 1997, and previously worked for the City of Bellflower where she worked with now-retired City Clerk **Debra Bauchop**. Leilani earned a BA in public administration. She has achieved the Master Municipal Clerk designation. She is listed as a 2019 Newport Beach Foundation Distinguished Citizen.

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

Tara Finnigan joined the city staff in Newport Beach in January 2008. She arrived to serve as the Public Information Manager. Tara began her public service career as a Public Affairs Representative for the Irvine Ranch Water District (January 1994-

October 1998). Previous to her District work, she worked with private sector consultants. In October 1998 she went to work for the City of <u>Orange</u> as a Business & Public Affairs Manager where she was responsible for the city's communication program. After going to work for <u>Newport Beach</u> in 2008, she was promoted to Assistant to the City Manager in March 2014, she became Deputy City Manager in February 2017 and in January 2022 she became Assistant City Manager. Tara earned a BA from the University of Delaware and an MPA from California State University, Long Beach.

Orange was originally called "Richland" but the post office had already recognized a Richland community in Northern California, so the locals reapplied in 1873 using the name "Orange." The town was incorporated as a general law city in April 1888. Agriculture was the foundation of the local economy. Growth was slow but steady until the 1950s when increased property values stimulated residential development. The 2020 population of the City of Orange is put at 139,911. Tom Kisela is the City Manager and **Susan Galvan** is the Assistant City Manager. Pamela Coleman is the City Clerk, and the Finance Director is Trang Nauyen. Christopher Cash is the Orange Public Works Director, and the Community Development Director is **Russell Bunim**.

Tom Kisela is a retired City of <u>Orange</u> Chief of Police who became the Interim City Manager in November 2022 and became City Manager in March 2023. Tom served as a Captain with the <u>Orange</u> Police Department from April 2012 until he became Chief of Police in April 2016. He retired as Chief in July 2021. Tom earned a BA from California State University, Fullerton and an MPA from Brandman University.



Susan Galvan served as the Deputy City Manager for the City of <u>Orange</u> for more than 10 years starting in 2012. She was appointed Assistant City Manager starting in August 2022. Susan served as the Interim

Director of Community Development in 2021 and 2022.

Placentia developed from a Mexican land grant and the settling of **Daniel Kraemer** in 1865. **William** McFadden is thought to have been the second white settler to come to the Placentia area. The first commercial orange grove was tilled in 1880. Oil was discovered in <u>Placentia</u> in 1919 bringing many wells. Placentia incorporated in December 1926. The 2019 estimated population is 51,233. Damien Arrula is the Placentia City Administrator and Rosanna Ramirez is the Deputy City Administrator. Robert S. McKinnell is the City Clerk and Carole Wayman is the Deputy City Clerk. Karen Crocker is the Director of Community Services and Joseph Lambert is the Development Services Director. Jennifer Lampman is the Director of Finance and Deputy City Administrator Luis Estevez has Public Works Department responsibility.

Placentia City Administrator Damien R. Arrula began his public management career as a Management Analyst for the City of Sierra Madre starting in November 2002. In March 2006, Damien joined the <u>Claremont</u> city staff as a Senior Management Analyst. He was appointed Human Services Manager in 2006 and Economic Development Officer in November 2007. Damien took the Assistant City Administrator post in the City of Placentia in July 2014. He became Acting City Administrator in April 2015, and he was appointed City Administrator starting in April 2015. In 2023, Damien received a 20-year ICMA Service Award. He served on the Board for the Municipal Management Association of Southern California (MMASC) from 2005-2006. Damien earned a BS from California Polytechnic University, Pomona and an MPA from the University of La Verne.

Rancho Santa Margarita, a master planned city, is the city with the longest name in California. The Trabuco Adobe was constructed in 1810 between Trabuco Creek and

Tijeras Creek as an outpost of Mission San Juan Capistrano. Rancho Santa Margarita is a general law city that was incorporated in January 2000. The 2019 estimated population is 47,896. The median price for a home in the city is \$1,199,750, 252.7% of the national average. This makes Rancho Santa Margarita one of the most expensive cities in the U.S. Jennifer M. Cervantez is the City Manager and Laura Lopez is the Assistant to the City Manager. Amy Diaz is the City Clerk and Stefanie Turner is the Director of Finance. Wendi Redington is the Community Services Manager.





San Clemente grew from a land development thanks to Ole Hanson in 1925. Ole was a former Mayor of Seattle and a land developer. He named the development San Clemente for

San Clemente Island. Ole saw the development as a Mediterranean-style resort town and he called it San Clemente by the Sea! The city incorporated in February 1928 and the 2020 population is set at 64,293. The <u>San Clemente</u> City Manager is **Andy Hall** and **Laura Campagnolo** is the City Clerk. **Samantha (Thomas) Wylie** is the <u>San Clemente</u> Beaches, Parks and Recreation Director, and

Andy Hall became the San Clemente City Manager in January 2023. Andy takes the position from Interim City Manager Sean Joyce, who served starting in September following the exit of former City Manager Erik Sund, who left to take the City Manager job in the City of Big Bear Lake. Andy began his public service career in 1991 as a County Planner in Summit County, Utah. After working a couple more planning posts, Andy was appointed City Manager in Payson, Utah in 1998. He took a Long Range Planning Manager position with Henderson, Nevada in July 2007, and in 2008 he took the Draper, Utah Assistant City Manager post. Andy came to Cathedral City in 2009 as Community Development Director and became City Manager in 2012. Andy moved to the Imperial Beach City Manager position in 2013. He earned a BA from Arizona State University and an MPA from the University of Utah. In 2021 he received a 30-year ICMA Service Award.

Samantha Wylie came to San Clemente in June 2003, as a Recreation Coordinator. In May 2016 Samantha became Recreation Supervisor, and in December 2016 Recreation Manager. Samantha was promoted to the Beaches, Parks and Recreation Director in July 2021. She earned a BA in communications and media studies from Chapman University and an MBA from Southern New Hampshire University.

James Makshanoff served as the <u>San Clemente</u> more than five-years when he left for the City Manager position in <u>Pomona</u> in January 2020. Before taking the <u>San Clemente</u> City Manager job in September 2014, Jim worked for <u>Azusa</u> and <u>Downey</u>. He served as the <u>Azusa</u> City Manager for nearly 3-years (January 2012-September 2014). Jim earned a BA and an MPA from California State University, Long Beach.

Erik Sund worked for the City of <u>San Clemente</u> for nearly 9-years. He served as Assistant City Manager (2013-2020) and as City Manager (2020-2022). Erik began his career with the City of <u>Irvine</u> in 2000 and then worked for <u>Downey</u> as a Purchasing Manager (2002-2007). In April 2007, Erik joined the <u>Long Beach</u> city staff and worked three different positions until November 2013 when he was hired by <u>San Clemente</u>. He left <u>San Clemente</u> to accept the City Manager position for the City of <u>Big Bear Lake</u>. Erik earned a BA from the University of California, Irvine.



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Picking Up the Pieces: Word has it that veteran City of Bellflower City Manager Jeff Stewart is planning to retire this year. Jeff, who has also served as city manager in Los Alamitos, and El Segundo came to Bellflower in 2011 following City Manager Mike Egan's resignation to accept the Norwalk City Manager position. Jeff began his career in West Covina and worked for Rosemead, El Segundo, and Los Alamitos before

joining the Bellflower city staff. Jeff worked with the late City Manager Frank G. Tripepi in Rosemead. He served as City Manager in El Segundo and Los Alamitos. Meghan Wishner of the city staff in Fountain Valley provided information on the October 4, 2023 grand opening of Fountain Valley Universally Accessible Playground (UAP) and recreation area. The UAP is a sensory-rich recreational environment that enables children and adults of all abilities to develop physically, socially, and emotionally. The project was completed by the collaboration of the City of Fountain Valley and the Fountain Valley Foundation. San Bernardino continues to search for their next city manager. City Manager Rob Field, the city's 6th city manager in 8-years, left some 10 months ago and the city appointed former City Manager Charles McNeely to serve as the Interim City Manager. The city received 70 applications during their initial recruitment, but the candidate they selected decided to remain with his current employer. It was reported that Salinas City Manager Steve Carrigan was selected, but for personal and professional reasons withdrew from the San Bernardino recruitment as he wished to stay on as the Salinas city manager. On October 3, the Salinas City Council unanimously voted to fire Steve. Jim Pia is the Salinas Interim City Manager. Brant Mesker is the new city manager for the City of Corning. Brant replaces City Manager Kristina Miller, who resigned in June. Tom Potonovic has served as the Interim City Manager. Brant previously worked as a Management Analyst in the office of the Glenn County Administrative Officer (May 2022-2023). He previously worked for the County of Tehama (November 2013-May 2022). He has served as a member of the City of Corning Planning Commission. Brant earned a BBA from California State University, Chico. Long Beach Assistant City Manager Linda F. Tatum, who was appointed by City Manager Tom Modica in June 2020, will retire in November after working with the city since 2015. Linda was previously the Director of Development Services for the City of Long Beach. Linda has served in land use planning for most of her career. She worked for the cities of Inglewood, Culver City and Santa Ana before joining the Long Beach city staff.



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
