State of California "H" Named Cities Revisited

There are 14 California cities with names that begin with the letter "H". Alphabetically, they start with <u>Half Moon Bay</u> and end with <u>Huntington Park</u>. This is the second Trackdown issue focused on the "H" named cities. This issue looks alphabetically at <u>Hermosa Beach</u> through <u>Huntington Park</u>. Seemingly random city groupings are used to provide an interest in cities throughout the State. The objective is to eventually look at managers of all cities throughout California.

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<u>Hermosa Beach</u> is one of the beach communities of Los Angeles County. <u>Hermosa Beach</u> was originally part of the 1784 Rancho San Pedro Spanish land grant. In the early days the area

was rolling hills covered with fields of grain, where during some seasons sheep were allowed to graze. The first survey was made in 1901 for the boardwalk, and the first pier was built in 1904. The city was incorporated in January 1907. The 2020 Hermosa Beach population is set at 19,728. **Suja Lowenthal** is the City Manager, and the Deputy City Manager is **Angela Crespi**. **Viki Copeland** is the Finance Director. The <u>Hermosa Beach</u> City Clerk is former <u>Hawaiian Gardens</u> Mayor and Council Member **Myra Maravilla** and the Chief of Police is **Paul LeBaron**. **Joseph SanClemente** is the Public Works Director.



City Manager **Suja Lowenthal** served as the Government & Public Outreach Manager for the West Basin Municipal Water District (1998-2005). In July 2010 Suja was elected to the <u>Long Beach</u> City Council. She served on the City

Council until July 2016. Suja was the Long Beach Vice Mayor from July 2014 until July 2016. She worked as a Transit Planning & Community Engagement Manager for the City of Santa Monica (2012-2017) and in August 2017 she became a Senior Advisor to the Santa Monica City Manager. Suja began her tenure as the Hermosa Beach City Manager in September 2018. She earned a BA in economics from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), and MBA from California State University, Los Angeles and a Doctorate in policy, planning & development from the University of Southern California (USC). Suja served as a Member of the Board of Directors for Heal the Bay (2007-2019) and currently service as a Board Member for Climate Resolve.

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

<u>Hermosa Beach</u> Deputy City Manager **Angela Crespi** worked as a City Planner for the City of Carbondale, Illinois starting in August 2006. She served three years as a Field Representative for the Southern Illinois University

Master of Public Administration Program (2008-2011). Angela worked as a Manager for the Orange County Public Works Department in Planning, building, grading & land use permits. In July 2014, Angela took the Fire Department Administrative Manager position in the City of Newport Beach. She became the Finance and Administrative Manager for the Newport Beach Public Works Department in July 2019. Angela joined the Hermosa Beach city staff in May 2021 as the Interim Public Works Director. In April 2022, she took the Interim Community Development Director position, and in March 2021 she began her tenure as the Hermosa Beach Deputy City Manager job. Angela earned a BA and MPA from Southern Illinois University, Carbondale. She earned a Project Management Certificate from California State University, Fullerton.



Rancho Mirage was incorporated in August 1973. The city's estimated 2022 population is 17,633 in a corporate area of nearly 26 square miles.



<u>Hesperia</u> is in the Victor Valley in San Bernardino County. The area was included in a Spanish land grant in 1781. The town site was laid out in 1891 by railroad company land developers of the Santa Fe Railroad.

Hesperia grew slowly until the completion of US Routes 66, 91 and 395 in the 1940s, followed by the completion of Interstate 15 in the late 1960s. In the 1950s the Hesperia Inn and golf course was completed, attracting many Hollywood celebrities. The Hesperia Inn also housed the Jack Dempsey Museum. The incorporated in July 1988, and its 2020 population is set at 99,818. Rachel Molina is the City Manager and Tammy Pelayes is the Assistant to the City Manager. Melinda Sayre is the City Clerk and doubles as the Deputy City Manager. Casey Brooksher is the Assistant City Manager and **Rita Perez** is the Human Resources Manager.



Rachel Molina joined the <u>Hesperia</u> city staff in February 2007 as a Senior Office Assistant in the City Manager's office. Rachel served as Public Information Officer, Deputy City Manager and Assistant City Manager. She was

selected to serve as City Manager in June 2023 following the retirement of City Manager **Nils Bentsen**. Rachel earned a BA in organizational leadership from Chapman University, and an MPA from California Baptist University.

Melinda L. Sayre joined the <u>Hesperia</u> staff in 2007 as Assistant City Clerk and became City Clerk in July 2013. In 2020 she doubled as the Director of Government Services, and more recently she was assigned Assistant City Manager responsibilities. Melinda earned an MPA from California State University, Long Beach.

<u>Hidden Hills</u> is a planned community, designed and developed in the 1950s by **A. E. Hanson**. His earlier projects include <u>Rolling Hills</u> and <u>Palos Verdes Estates</u>. <u>Hidden Hills</u>

was incorporated in October 1961. The city's 2020 population is 1,725. Ther are 692 housing units in the city built in the median year 1969. The city provides a rural, country way of life. This pastoral setting is highlighted by the absence of sidewalks and streetlights. Horses, llamas, ostriches and an occasional cow will be found on city lots. **Kerry Kallman** is the City Manager for Hidden Hills.

<u>Hidden Hills</u> City Manager **Kerry Kallman** began his local government public service career as a Community Relations Coordinator for the City of <u>Westlake Village</u> in December 2002 working for City Manager **Ray Taylor**. He was promoted to Administrative Analyst in 2008 and Senior Administrative Analyst in 2013. After nearly 13 years with <u>Westlake Village</u>, Kerry was hired by <u>Hidden</u> <u>Hills</u> to serve as City Manager starting in September 2016 succeeding retiring City Manager **Cherie Paglia**. Kerry graduated from Agoura High School and earned a BA in history and social studies and an MPPA from California Lutheran University.

<u>Highland</u> was founded as a townsite in San Bernardino County in 1891. The city was incorporated as a general law city in November 1987. The 2019 estimated population for

<u>Highland</u> is 55,417. Joseph Hughes is the City Manager and **Betty Hughes** is the City Clerk. **Chuck Dantuono** is the Director of Administrative Services, and Lawrence A. Mainez is the Community Development Director. **Carlos Zamano** is the Director of Public Works and City Engineer.

<u>Highland</u> City Manager **Joseph Hughes** has announced his retirement effective December 29. He served 17 years as city manager, succeeding the first <u>Highland</u> City Manager **Sam Racadio** in May 2006. Ralph Andersen & Associates has been retained to help the city find its next city manager.

One cannot speak of the City of Highland without recognizing Sam Racadio. Mayor and Council Member and former Highland city manager Sam Racadio previously served as the City Manager for the City of <u>Banning</u> (1985-1988). Sam served as the first Highland City Manager from February 1988 until July 2006. In December 2010, Sam began his elected official career as a member of the Highland City Council. Sam earned an AA degree from Mt. San Jacinto College, a BA in sociology from the University of Redlands and an MPA from the University of California, Riverside. Sam Racadio served as President of the City Managers' Department of the League of California Cities in 1999-2000. In 2015 Sam received a 40-year ICMA Service Award. The County of San Bernardino operates the Highland Sam J. Racadio Library & Environmental Learning Center.

<u>Hollister</u> is the county seat of San Benito County. One of the largest cities in the Monterey Bay area, the city is an agricultural town known for its apricots, olive oil, vineyards, pomegranates and chocolate.

Hollister was founded in November 1868 by William Welles Hollister on Mexican land-grant property. The city was incorporated in August 1872. David Mirrione is the City Manager and Jennifer Woodworth is the City Clerk. Carlos Reynoso is the Chief of Police. Tina Garza is the Hollister Recreation Supervisor.

After working for the County of Merced as the Director of Workforce Investment (2018-2020) and as the Assistant County Executive (2019-2022), **David Mirrione** joined the <u>Hollister</u> city staff as Assistant City Manager in August 2022. He was the Interim City Manager for six months in 2023, and he was hired to serve as the <u>Hollister</u> City Manager in August 2023. David earned a BA in business administration from Humboldt State University.

Retired City of Moorpark Assistant City Manager Hugh R. Riley, served as the Hollister City Manager for a time (1988-1994). He retired from Moorpark in December 2014, and currently serves as the Executive Director for the Ventura Council of Governments. He began his public service career as an Assistant Engineer for Tucumcari, New Mexico in January 1974. Hugh was promoted to Director of Community Planning & Development (1975-1978), Assistant City Manager (1978-1984), Deputy City Manager (1984-1985), and he was City Manager from 1985 until 1988 when he left to become the Hollister City Manager (1988-1994). Hugh served as the City Manager for Temple City (1994-1999) before working as the Moorpark Assistant City Manager (2000-2014). Hugh earned a BA from Pennsylvania State University. In 2014, Hugh received a 40-year ICMA Service Award.

Huntington Beach, known as "Surf City," and home of Duke's Barefoot Bar and Restaurant at the iconic Huntington Beach Pier, is named for **Henry E. Huntington**. <u>Huntington Beach</u> is well known

for its nearly 10-miles of beach and an excellent surfing swell. The original pier was built in 1904; a 1,000-foot-long timber structure. <u>Huntington Beach</u> was incorporated in February 1909. <u>Huntington Beach</u> was originally an agricultural area with crops such as lima beans, asparagus, peppers, celery and sugar beets. Holly Sugar was a major employer. *Huntington Beach High School* was built in 1906. Oil was discovered in the city leading to the construction of many wells. The high school teams are known as the Oilers. The 2020 estimated population in 198,711. The city is in the process of changing city managers.

City Manager **AI Zelinka**, who served as the Huntington Beach City Manager since June 2022, resigned and Chief of Police **Eric G. Parra** has been appointed Interim City Manager. The city has lost its second city manager in two years. Prior to AI, City Manager **Oliver C. Chi** resigned to become the City Manager for the City of <u>Irvine</u>. Oliver succeeded City Manager **Fred Wilson** who took a position with Ralph Andersen & Associates after leaving the city. Veteran City Manager **Sean Joyce** served as Interim City Manager in 2021 following Oliver's departure to <u>Irvine</u>.

Fred Wilson was hired as <u>Huntington Beach</u> City Manager to replace Interim City Manager **Paul Emery**, who took the position in 2007 when City Manager **Penny Culbreth-Graft** left to become the City Manager in Colorado Spring, Colorado. When Fred left, **Lori Ann Farrell Harrison** served as Interim City Manager in 2019 before leaving for Costa Mesa. Former City Manager **Ray Silver** served as President of the League City Managers' (2002-2003).

Huntington Beach's City Clerk is **Robin Estanislau**. Ashley Wysocki is the Community Services Director in <u>Huntington Beach</u>, and **Michele Warren** is the Director of Human Resources. **Chau Vu** is the Director of Public Works.



Ashley Wysocki joined the Huntington Beach city staff in May 2020 as the Community & Library Services Manager. She was promoted to Deputy Director in May 2021, and she served as Acting

Director starting in March 2023. Ashley was appointed Director beginning in July 2023. She served as the National President of Women in Leisure Services, Chi Kappa Rho in 2020-2021, Ashley started her public service career as a Recreation Leader for the City of Signal Hill in December 2003. She joined the Corona city staff in 2007 as a Recreation Coordinator and she was promoted to Recreation Supervisor in August 2013. She took the Community Services Superintendent post in the City of Rancho Cucamonga in September 2017 before joining the Huntington Beach staff. Ashley earned a BA in recreation and leisure studies from California State University, Lona Beach and an MPA from California State University, San Bernardino.

Huntington Park, where Willdan Founder Dan Heil was born, is named for Henry E. Huntington. The community became a "streetcar suburb" on the Los Angeles Railway that workers used. It is estimated that to this day about 30% of Huntington Park residents work in Vernon and Commerce factories and businesses. In the early years Huntington Park was almost exclusively a racially white community. Today <u>Huntington Park</u> is mostly a Hispanic hub. The city was incorporated in September 1906. The 2020 estimated population is 57,509. Ricardo Reyes is the City Manager and Raul Alvarez is the Assistant City Manager. Sergio **Infanzon** is the Director of Communications and Community Relations, and the Director of Community Development is Steve Forster. Jeff Jones is the Finance Director, and Cesar Roldan is the Public Works Director. Cosme Lozano is the Chief of Police. Cynthia V. Norzagaray is the Director of Parks & Recreation.

Ricardo Martin Reyes is the <u>Huntington Park</u> City Manager since 2017. Rick previously was the Assistant City Manager. Before coming to the city, Ricardo worked as a Deputy Secretary for the California Department of Veterans Affairs. He was the Veterans Employment Coordinator for the Los Angeles County Federation of Labor, AFL-CIO. He earned an AA from East Los Angeles College.

<u>Huntington Park</u> Community Development Director **Steve Forster** joined the city staff in October 2020 as Interim Community Development Director. In November 2022, Steve served as Public Works Director for the City of <u>La Mirada</u> for 23 years (June 1989-February 2013). 

Ryan worked with the <u>Bellflower</u> city manager's office prior to his appointment as Lomita City Manager in 2016. Jeff, who previously served as city manager in Los Alamitos, and <u>El</u>

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More Pieces Picked Up: Stockton City Manager Harry Black received community support for his leadership in the wake of charges by Council Member Michele Padilla that the city manager has created a hostile work environment. Eight of 13 speakers at a

recent city council meeting expressed support for the city manager. Several individuals, public and city staff, made supportive statements about City Manager Harry Black. Congratulations to Mayor Hipolito Angel Cerros of the City of Lindsay. However, he may not be the youngest Mayor of all-time as claimed. It might be that Julia Sylva was the Mayor of the City of Hawaiian Gardens at an earlier age. Lindsay also has an outstanding young city manager in Joe Tanner, who followed in his father's footsteps. The senior Joe Tanner is a retired Vallejo city manager. Julia is currently an Adjunct Professor of Law at Southwester Law School in Los Angeles, as well as, conducting her own Law Office. She was elected to the City Council at age 20, which made her the youngest and first Latina elected to the city council. Julia is the first Latina Mayor in the U.S. (Hawaiian Gardens, California; 1978 to 1980). Sonoma City Manager David M. Guhin was forced to deal with "gross" and "disturbing" public comments. He feels responsible to defend the city council and the community from hate speech. Public antisemitic and



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
racist comments were presented to the Sonoma City Council during the public comment section of a recent City Council meeting. Public commenters called into the city's meeting via Zoom and spewed hateful rhetoric that targets people of color and the Jewish community. City staff quickly muted and terminated the comments. David began his public service in June 1998 as an Assistant Engineer in Stafford County, Virginia. He worked as Assistant City Manager for Santa Rosa (2018-2020) and as the Executive Director of Government Operations for the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria (2020-2023), prior to starting May 2023 as the City Manager for the City of Sonoma. David earned a BS in civil engineering from South Dakota Mines and a Master of Organization Development from Sonoma State University School of Extended education. He is the seventh Sonoma city manager in the past three years. Trinidad City Manager Eli A. Naffah continues to work part-time as an Associate Professor at the College of the Redwoods where is teaches political science and business law at their Eureka and Crescent City campuses. He began his service to the college in August 2009. Eli was appointed City Manager for the City of <u>Trinidad</u> in March 2019. Eli was an Administrative Intern in La Mirada starting in May 1983, before he joined the Montebello city staff as an Economic Development Specialist in April 1993. Eli worked for Huntington Beach as a Development Specialist (1995-2000) and Economic Development Director in the City of Antioch (2000-2002). In July 2002, Eli became the City Manager for the City of Rio Dell (2002-2005), and he served as the City Manager for Crescent City from May 2006 until May 2008. In 2012, he became the City Manager in Phoenix, Oregon. In 2008, Eli received a 20year ICMA Service Award. He earned a BA from John Carroll University and a Juris Doctorate from Southland University.


