#### Management in the One "J" and Three "K" California Cities

Cities included in this Special Issue of the newsletter are the cities of Jackson, Kerman, King City and Kingsburg. These four cities are located in the counties of Amador, Fresno, and Monterey. Amador County is in the California Gold Country and is known as "The Heart of the Mother Lode". The county was created from parts of Calaveras and El Dorado counties in 1854. The county is named for a successful gold miner named José María Amador. Fresno County was founded in 1872 as a railway station of the Central Pacific Railway. It was incorporated in 1885. The station grew with a store and other businesses to the town of Fresno. Monterey County was among the original California Counties founded in 1850 and included parts of San Benito County in 1874.

Jackson is the county seat of Amador County and the largest population center is <u>lone</u> and the surrounding area. The 2020 population of Amador County has been set at 40,474. **Chuck lley** is the Amador County Administrative Officer. He was appointed in September 2010 to become the third CAO in the county's history. Chuck has worked in the private and public sectors as a civil engineer.

<u>Fresno</u> is the county seat for Fresno County. The 2020 population is set at 1,008,654. <u>Fresno</u> is the fifth most populated city in California. **Paul Nerland** is the County Administrative Officer. He was appointed CAO starting in December 2021. After working for the City of Fresno (1995-1997), Paul joined the county staff as a Personnel Analyst in September 1997.

Monterey County is located on California's central coast. <u>Salinas</u> is the county seat for Monterey County. The 2020 population for the county is 439,035. **Sonia M. De La Rosa** is the County Administrative Officer for the County of Monterey. California State University, Fresno alumnus, Sonia worked for the County of Fresno for 25 years before her appointment as CAO in Monterey County in January 2023.

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Jackson, California is named for Colonel Alden Appola Moore Jackson. It was founded in 1848 near a spring of fresh clear water that flowed year-round. It grew into a convenient stopping place on the road from Sacramento to the mines of the California Gold Rush. Jackson was an important supply and transportation town center for the neighboring towns and population centers. Jackson grew as a watering hole for cattle and a durable rock mining area. In 1853 Jackson became the county seat of Amador County. It had previously been the county seat of Calaveras County (1851-1852). Jackson's 2019 estimated population is set at 4,840.

and **Bob Stimpson**. **Connie Gonsalves**, a former Mayor, is married to **John Gonsalves**. John is one of **Anthony Gonsalves**' eight brothers. Anthony and their father, **Joe A. Gonsalves**, a former State Assembly Member founded the <u>Sacramento</u> professional representation firm, **Joe A. Gonsalves & Son**. The firm represents more than 50 California cities.

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



Fresno County city of <u>Kerman</u> developed at a Southern Pacific Railroad watering stop on a line between <u>Tracy</u> and <u>Fresno</u> established

around 1891. The stop was called "Collis" for the railroad President Collis Potter Huntington. A Collis post office was opened in 1894, closed in 1899 and reopened in 1904. It was renamed "Kerman" in 1906. The name was derived by combining the first three letters of the names of developers William G. Kerckhoff and Jacob Mansar. Kerman was incorporated in 1946. The 2019 estimated population of Kerman is set at 15,282. John Jansons is the Kerman City Manager and Josie Camacho is the Interim City Clerk. Jesus R. **Orozco** is the Community Development Director, and Manuel Campos is the Assistant Planner. The Kerman Director of Finance is Josefina Alvarez. Theresa Johnson is the Community Services Director, Steve Wilkins is the Chief of Police and Michael Baraias is the Public Works Director.

A Southern California Edison Company's analysis shows that electricity demand in California is projected to rise by more than 80% by 2045. They estimate that by then, 90% of

vehicles and 95% of buildings will be fully electric. The State's electric grid, shows the analysis, will need to produce three times as much in new utility-scale solar and wind generation and develop the needed energy storage to meet this increased demand.

<u>King City</u> is located on the Salinas River in California's Salinas Valley. It was 1769 when a Spanish explorer expedition camped along

the Salinas River just south of today's King City. In the late 1880s the Dutton Hotel was a major stagecoach stop on El Camino Real. The city is named for founder Charles King. Charles put 6,000 acres into the production of a wheat crop. In 1886 the Southern Pacific Railroad completed service to King City station to serve the farms and ranches in the southern Salinas Valley. The King City post office first opened in 1887. The city was incorporated in February 1911. Novelist John Steinbeck's father J. Ernst Steinbeck was among the first permanent residents of King City and claimed to be the first. Agriculture has played a serious role in King City history. It is contended that between 1910 and 1930, the city became famous worldwide for growing pink beans, especially due to the additional demand brought during World War I. The 2020 population of King City is 13,332. Steven Adams is the City Manager and Erica Sonne is the City Clerk. Doreen Liberto is the King City Community Development Director, and Mike Howard is the Finance Director. Andrea Wasson is the Recreation Manager. Russ Nichols is the Fire Chief and the Chief of Police is James Hunt. The Public Works Director is Octavio Hurtado.



ICMA Credentialed City Manager Steven D. Adams of King City began his public service career as an Intern with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) starting in March 1982. In September 1982 he took an Administrative Intern position with the City of San Luis Obispo. He took a similar Administrative Intern post in Temple City in August 1983. In January 1984, Steve was hired to serve the City of Glendale and when he left nearly 16 years later in July 1999 he was serving as Deputy City Manager. When left Glendale he took the Assistant City Manager position for the City of Westlake Village in July 1999. Steve was hired to serve as the City Manager in Arroyo Grande starting in September 2000. He worked in that position for nearly 14 and a half years. Steve became the City Manager in King City in November 2015. In 1874 <u>Kingsburg</u> was labelled "Wheatville" and that year a post office was established with that name. After a few more naming attempts, the city was incorporated as <u>Kingsburg</u> in May 1908. The 2020 population of <u>Kingsburg</u> is 12,380. **Alexander J. Henderson** is the <u>Kingsburg</u> city manager.
