Cities included in this Issue of the City Manager Newsletter by Trackdown are California's first six cities listed alphabetically: Alturas, Amador City, American Canyon, Anaheim, Anderson and Angels Camp. These cities and towns are located in the counties of Modoc, Amador, Napa, Orange, Shasta, and Calaveras. Of the six, Anaheim is the oldest, incorporating in March 1876. The late Keith Murdoch served as the Anaheim city manager between 1950 and 1976. During his tenure Disneyland was founded and the Angels Major League Baseball team came to town. While Keith was city manager, Anaheim went from orange groves to become a destination city. Of this group of cities, Amador City is the smallest in the State with 200 people in about a third of a square mile.

<u>Alturas</u> is the county seat for Modoc County, located in the north easterly corner of California. The 024 Chair of the Board of Supervisors for Modoc County is **Shane Starr**. Shane is a graduate of California State

University, Chico. He works for the local member of Congress. Modoc County was made from the easter section of Siskiyou County in 1874. **Chester Robertson** is the County Administrative Officer. <u>Alturas</u> was originally named for the bridge Pressley and James Dorris built across the Pit River. The Dorris Bridge post office opened in 1871. The town was renamed Dorrisville in 1874 and then <u>Alturas</u> in 1876. The city was incorporated in September 1901. The Nevada-California-Oregon Railway Building built in 1917-1918 is in <u>Alturas</u>.

Alturas is Spanish for "a valley on top of a mountain." The city has an estimated 19



employees. Joe Picotte is the Director of Public Works. Jeff Hedlund is the City Attorney, and the Fire Marshal is Eric Hunter. Sid Cullins, who served as the Chief of Police since 2015 and worked for the city 38 years, passed away at the end of 2023.



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

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<u>Amador City</u> is the smallest and least populous incorporated city in the State of California. The city has a total incorporated area of 0.3 square miles. This Amador County community is formerly known as Amador's Creek or South Amador and was originally settled in 1849. The city was incorporated in June 1915 and has a 2020 population of 2000. Amador City is named for **José Maria Amador**, a California miner who found gold in the area in 1848. The original mining town era buildings have been repurposed as unique shops, restaurants and other attractions. **Joyce Davidson** is the City Clerk and **Holly Groth** is the City Treasurer.



Joyce Davidson is a resident of Amador City and serves as the City Clerk. For the past 20 years Joyce has owned the Amador City Mercantile.

Amador City is home to the Imperial Hotel, the Bellflower Home and Garden center, the Naked Frog Soapery & Such Boutique and many other unique shops for browsing.

<u>American Canyon</u> is found in the southern part of the Napa County and is the county's second most populous city. The city was incorporated in January 1992 and the 2020 population is set at 21,837. **Jason Holley** is the city manager, **Maria Lara-Ojeda** is the Assistant City Manager and **Taresa Geilfuss** is the City Clerk.

Jason Holley has been the <u>American Canyon</u> city manager since October 2017. He joined the city staff in December 2013 as the Director of Public Works. Prior to joining <u>American Canyon</u>, Jason worked as a Senior Civil Engineer for the City of <u>Napa</u> between March 2007 and December 2013. He worked for two different private sector firms starting in July 2000. Jason earned a BS in bioresource and agricultural engineering from California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo. Orange County City of <u>Anaheim</u>, a Charter City, was originally incorporated in March 1876 as a part of Los Angeles County. The city was founded in 1857 by a group of mostly German families

as an agricultural community. Orange County took part of Los Angeles County in 1889. The city went from agriculture to become a destination vacation city following the opening of Disneyland in July 1955. Today the city is the home of the Anaheim Convention Center, the Los Angeles Angels Major League Baseball team, and the Anaheim Ducks of the National Hockey League (NHL), as well as, Disneyland and many hotels, restaurants and other resort facilities. The 2020 population is 346,824. Since September 2020, James Vanderpool has served as the Anaheim City Manager. Theresa Bass is the City Clerk and Gregory Garcia is the Deputy City Manager. The Community Services Director is Siany Larson-Cash, and Debbie Moreno is the Finance Director and City Treasurer. Ted White is the Planning & Building Director, and Rudy Emami is the Public Works Director. Carlos Castellanos is the City Engineer. Rick Armendariz is the Anaheim Chief of Police.

<u>Anaheim</u> City Manager **James P. "Jim" Vanderpool** previously served as the city manager for the City of <u>Buena Park</u>. Someone said that he went from Knott's Berry Farm to Disneyland! Jim joined the <u>Anaheim</u> executive team in September 2020 succeeding former City Manager **Chris Zapata**. Jim is the 15th city manager to serve the City of <u>Anaheim</u> since the position was created in 1919. Jim was the <u>Buena Park</u> City Manager starting in 2012. Before becoming the <u>Buena Park</u> city manager, Jim worked there in the Public Works Department, Assistant City Manager and Deputy City Manager. He earned a BA from Purdue University and an MBA from the University of Phoenix.

Chris Zapata served as the <u>Anaheim</u> city manager from August 2018 until April 2020. He currently works as the city manager for the City of <u>Sausalito</u>. He previously was the city manager in the cities of <u>National City</u> (2004-2012) and <u>San Leandro</u> (2012-2018). Chris earned a BA from Northern Arizona University.

Keith Murdoch served as the <u>Anaheim</u> city Manager from 1950 until his retirement in 1976. Keith worked closely with the Disney organization when they were building Disneyland, and he became a close friend to **Walt Disney**. Keith passed away in 2011 at the age of 92.

"Workaholic" **James D. Ruth** became <u>Anaheim</u> city manager in May 1990. He worked in <u>Maywood</u>, <u>Lynwood</u> and <u>Downey</u> and joined <u>Anaheim</u> as Parks and Recreation Director. He also served in <u>Long Beach</u>. He retired in 2018 as the Rossmoor Community Services District General Manager.

Anderson is named for ranch owner Elias Anderson, who allowed the Oregon and California Railroad rights of way and a station site in 1872. The railroad gave the local station/depot the name

"Anderson." <u>Anderson</u> is in Shasta County. Though the community has a long history, it was incorporated as a city in January 1956. The 2020 population is 11,323. As a side note, former <u>Anderson</u> Mayor and Council Member **Stan Morgan** is a former Assistant City Manager in Dairy Valley (<u>Cerritos</u>). **Joey Forseth-Deshais** is the new <u>Anderson</u> City Manager succeeding the retired City Manager **Jeff Kiser. Christy White** is the Anderson City Clerk, and



City Manager Joseph "Joey" Forseth-Deshais joined the <u>Anderson</u> city staff as Director of Community Services in 2023. He previously served as the Assistant Director of Community Services in <u>Redding</u>. He started his

city manager tenure on January 3, 2024, succeeding retired city manager **Jeff Kiser**. Executive recruiters Peckham & McKenney were retained by the city regarding the <u>Anderson</u> city manager recruitment.

Retired City of <u>Anderson</u> Assistant City Manager **Liz Cottrell** worked for the city for nearly 24 years. She began as the Finance Office Manager in June 2000, and she was appointed Finance Director in December 2011. Liz earned a BA from National University.

Angels Camp is the only incorporated city in Calaveras County. Mark Twain based his famous short story "The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County"

on a story he claimed he heard at the Angels Hotel in 1865. Angels Camp is sometimes called "Frogtown" due to Mark Twain's prose. The first post office was founded in 1851, called Carson's Creek. The name was changed in 1853 and the city was incorporated with the name "Angels" in 1912. The 2020 population is set at 3,667. Rebecca Callen is the Angels Camp City Administrator.



Rebecca Callen has been the Angels <u>Camp</u> City Administrator since February 2022 when she took over from former City Administrator Melissa Eads. Rebecca worked as a Business Analyst for the County of Calaveras

starting in December 2006. She was elected County Auditor-Controller in January 2011 and served in that position until September 2019. From October 2019 until January 2022, Rebecca worked as the Director of Administrative Services for the Calaveras County Water District. She worked there until she joined the Angels Camp city staff. Rebecca attended Butte Junior College, and the University of California, Davis continuing and professional education program. She earned a BS in strategic management from California State University, Chico.

Melissa Eads, who previously served as the Angels Camp City Administrator, is currently serving as the City Administrator for the City of Sonora. In Sonora she replaced City Administrator Mary Rose Rutikanga, who took a Peace Corps position in Africa. Melissa served in Angels Camp for four years and prior to that she was the Executive Director of the Calaveras Council of Governments and worked for Tuolumne County Transportation.

Don Benninghoven (1933 – 2023)

Don Benninghoven lost his battle to cancer on Nov. 17, 2023, in Santa Barbara. He passed peacefully with his family by his side.

Don's remarkable 40-year career with the League of California Cities, the last 26 as Executive Director, saw him work with major figures in Sacramento and Washington, D.C., including seven California governors, from Pat Brown and Ronald Reagan to Jerry Brown and Arnold Schwarzenegger. He also worked with and became friends with several leading mayors, including Tom Bradley and Dianne Feinstein.

Don found a calling that ensured local government leaders had the flexibility and resources to carry out local goals. He influenced major legislation that continues to impact the lives of all Californians. And while the accomplishments were major, he felt his career was a great one because of the dedicated people he worked with, including the League staff, elected officials, and staff from all the cities he encountered during his career.

In retirement, Don was asked to carry out one more major public policy initiative: to help pass the Marine Life Protection Act to address overfishing of marine life along California's coast. In partnership with a veteran capitol staffer, Ken Wiseman, and a large team of talented scientists and others, Don's tireless ability to negotiate among virtually an unlimited list of opponents was on full display. His appointment to the California Fish and Wildlife Commission to ensure passage was quite a ride. Don was incredibly proud that this work would have an impact for generations.
