Cities included in this Issue of the City Manager Newsletter by Trackdown are California's third six plus one cities listed alphabetically: Antioch, Apple Valley, Arcadia, Arcata, Arroyo Grande, Artesia and Arvin. The seven city/town managers of these cities include Kwame Reed; Doug Robertson; Dominic Lazzaretto; Karen Diemer; Matthew Downing; Aldo E. Schindler; and Jeff Jones. These cities are include in six different counties including the counties of Contra Costa, San Bernardino, Los Angeles, Humboldt, San Luis Obispo, and Kern. In Contra Costa County's Antioch, Kwame Reed is the Acting City Manager following the retirement of City Manager Ron Bernal and the resignation of Cornelius Johnson. Of these cities, not only is Antioch the second oldest, incorporating in 1872, it has the largest population at 115,201.

Of this group of cities, Artesia has the smallest population at 16,395 and the oldest of the group is Arcata, incorporated in 1858. Also falling within the alphabetical parameters of this Antioch to Arvin group, are a few unincorporated communities that include Aptos, Arbuckle, Armona, Arnold and Aromas. Aptos is a town in Santa Cruz County and is partly known for Beer Can Beach. Arbuckle is in Colusa County and has a population of 3,484. Armona is a community in Kings County, and Arnold is in Calaveras County. Aromas, originally known as "Sand Cut," is interesting as it is in both Monterey County and San Benito County, straddling the borders.




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Antioch was formerly name "Smith's Landing" and "Marsh's Landing." Ranch owner John Marsh built a boat landing on

the San Joaquin River in 1848 at what is now Antioch. In 1849 twin brothers who were Christian Reverends named Smith came to town and in 1851 they convinced the locals to rename their town to Antioch for the Biblical Syrian town of Antioch. An Antioch post office opened in 1851, closed in 1852 and reopened in 1855. The city of Antioch was incorporated in February 1872 and its 2020 population is 115,291. **Kwame Reed** is the Antioch Acting City Manager and Ellie Householder is the City Clerk. Lauren Posada is the Antioch City Treasurer, **Dawn Merchant** is the Finance Director and Ana Cortez is the Human Resources Director. **Bradley Helfenberger** is the Parks & Recreation Director and **Scott Buenting** is the Acting Public Works Director and City Engineer. The Acting Chief of Police is Joe Vigil.

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Starting in 1995, **Kwame Reed** worked as a Planner for the San Joaquin Council of Governments and the San Joaquin Regional Rail Commission/ACE Train. In July 2002, he joined the city of Oakley staff as an Associate Planner. From 2008 until 2013 he operated a private photo service while he worked as a Senior Analyst for the City of Brentwood (2004-2018). Kwame was hired by the City of Antioch in 2018 as the Economic Development Director. He was appointed Acting City Manager in June 2023. Kwame earned a BS in city and urban planning from California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo.



Apple Valley is in the Victor Valley area of San Bernardino County. In 1885 the railroad came through the Cajon Pass and built a train stop on "A Better Way of Life" the Mojave River called Victor. The

Apple Valley name was officially recognized when the post office opened there in 1949. The area had ranches and apple orchards. Apple Valley was home to Roy Rogers and Dale Evans. The Town of Apple Valley was incorporated in November 1988. The 2020 population is 75,791. **Doug Robertson** is the Town Manager and La Vonda M-Pearson is the Director of Government Services and Town Clerk.

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Apple Valley Town Manager **Douglas B. Robertson** was selected for the position in November 2017. He started his Town of Apple Valley tenure in January 2018. He succeeded Town Manager Frank Robinson, who retired

in July 2017. Doug is the fourth Town Manager following the 1988 town incorporation. He served as the City Manager for the City of <u>Victorville</u> starting in July 2011 and previously worked as the Deputy City Manager starting in March 2004. Doug earned a BS in psychology and an MPA from California State University, San Bernardino.



Orlando Acevedo has worked for the Town of Apple Valley for more than 20 years and has served as the Assistant Town Manager since January 2022. He began his public service career in September 2003 as an Administrative

Intern for the City of <u>Rancho Cucamonga</u> and <u>Apple Valley</u>. He became an <u>Apple Valley</u> Economic Development Specialist in January 2007. Orlando earned a BA from Azusa Pacific University and an MBA from the University of La Verne. Orlando is a Board Member of the San Bernardino County Workforce Development Board.

Arcadia is the home to Santa Anita Park racetrack where exciting thoroughbred horse racing is presented. The city is named for Arcadia, Greece. Arcadia was

incorporated in August 1903. Its 2020 population is set at 56,681. **Dominic Lazzaretto**, son of Andy and Nan, is the <u>Arcadia</u> City Manager and **Justine Bruno** is the Deputy City Manager. **Gene Glasco** is the elected City Clerk. **Roy Nakamura** is the Chief of Police.

Arcadia City Manager Dominic Lazzaretto describes himself as a "aame changing bureaucrat." He began his working career on the private sector side working with his father's consulting firm, A.C. Lazzaretto & Associates from August 1994 to January 2003. He then joined the city staff in the City of La Palma as Community Development Director, and in October 2005 he was appointed Assistant City Manager. Dominic became the La Palma City Manager in July 2007 and worked there until taking the Arcadia city manager position in March 2012. Dominic earned a BS in hotel, restaurant & institutional management from the Schrever Honors College at Pennsylvania State University and an MPA from California State University, Long Beach. He is a Founder of the Ukraine Relief Effort Arcadia in November 2022. In 2023 Dominic received a 20 Year ICMA Service Award. He serves as the Co-Chair of the Cal-ICMA Talent Initiative.

Over the years, some giants in the city manager craft have served the City of <u>Arcadia</u>. **Lyman H. Cozad** was city manager in <u>Colton</u> (1957-1964), <u>Beverly Hills</u> (1964-1966) and <u>Arcadia</u> (1966-1977). Lyman was the President of the City Managers' Department of the League of California Cities in 1972-1973. Lyman passed away in 2001 at the age of 86.

Some of the other heavy hitter <u>Arcadia</u> city managers include **Lyle Alberg**, **George Watts**, **Don Duckworth**, **Bill Kelly** and **Don Penman**.

Arcata was established in 1850 as "Union". The name was changed to Arcata in 1860. In 1850 Arcata expelled all Chinese residents following

Eureka's lead. The city was incorporated in February 1858. Arcata is home to California State Polytechnic University, Humboldt, founded in 1913 and considered an excellent university for science majors. The 2020 population of Arcata is set at 18,857. Karen Diemer is the Arcata City Manager. She notified the city in January 2024 that she will retire this year. A date has not been set. Bridget E. Dory is the City Clerk, and Danette Demello is the Assistant City Manager. **David Loya** is the Director and **Jennifer Dart** is the Deputy Director of Community Development. The Director Environmental Services is **Emily Sinkhorn**. **Bart Silvers** is the Arcata Chief of Police.

Arcata City Manager **Karen Diemer** has advised the city that she plans to resign this year, though a specific date has yet to be set. Karen began her public service career as a Recreation Supervisor for the City of <u>Eureka</u> in

September 1991. In August 1996, she joined the <u>Arcata</u> city staff working in the Department of Environmental Services and Parks and Recreation. Karen worked her way up in that department for more than 18 years. She was appointed <u>Arcata</u> City Manager in November 2014. Karen earned a BA from Humboldt State University. In 2019 she received a 10-year ICMA Service Award.



Arroyo Grande, Spanish for "Big Creek," is in San Luis Obispo County. A railroad depot was built in the area in 1882, stimulating

local commerce. The city was incorporated in July 1911. The 2020 population is 18,441. **Matthew Downing** is the City Manager and **Bill Robeson** is the Assistant City Manager and Public Works Director.

After working in the private sector starting in 2004, Matthew Downing joined the Arroyo Grande city staff in 2010 as a Plannina Intern. In February 2013. Matt went from Assistant Planner to Associate Planner, and in April 2016 he was promoted to Planning Manager. In October 2019, Matt moved to the Planning Manager position in the City of Pismo Beach with then-city manager Jim Lewis. He promoted to Director of Community Development in October 2020. Matt was hired to be the City Manager in Arroyo Grande in January 2024. Matt worked as a Technician for Chem-Dry of San Luis Obispo from June 2004 to May 2011. He now serves as a member of the League of California Cities Environmental Quality Policy Committee. Matt earned a BS and a Master of city & regional planning (MCRP) from California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo.

Artesia was established after the completion of the Artesia School District in 1875. The name "Artesia" comes from the artesian wells in the area, making it ideal for farming and agriculture. Artesia became

the primary downtown area and housing area for the larger dairy farming area around it. Dutch and Portuguese farmers came to the area. Fearing a potential loss of political "home rule" control, the City of Dairy Valley was incorporated in 1956 leaving out the most populated voter areas of Artesia. Artesia incorporated in May 1959 and Dairy Valley became Cerritos. As property valleys escalated the dairy industry relocated to the Chino area and into the San Joaquin Valley. Aldo **Schindler** is the Artesia City Manager and **Jennifer** Alderete is the Acting City Clerk. Jamie Murguia is the Finance Manager and Ericka Jackson is the Human Resources Manager. Okina Dor is the Community Development Director and Edith **Guerra** is the Parks & Recreation Manager.

Artesia City Manager Aldo Schindler began his public service career as a Redevelopment Project Officer for the City of Long Beach in 2000. In November 2009, Aldo became the Director of Community Development for the City of Bell Gardens. Two years later, he took a similar role in the City of Whittier. In April 2014, Aldo moved to the Director of Community Development for the City of Downey. In April 2020 he was named Deputy City Manager in <u>Downey</u>. In 2022 he spent 7 months as the Assistant City Manager for Moreno Valley, and in November 2022 he was hired to be the Artesia City Manager. Aldo earned a BA from San Diego State University and an MPA from California State University, Long Beach. He is a CORO Leadership Southern California graduate.

Artesia has had some excellent and memorable city managers through the years. Ed Medley was the first city manager and he and City Clerk Margaret Rittel managed city hall. Peter B. Feenstra was next in line. "Peter B." was a former Assistant City Manager in the City of Paramount when he was hired in Artesia, and he left to be the City Administrator in <u>Bellflower</u>. **Johnny Johnston** was next. He went on to a long public service career and retired as the County Executive Officer in the County of Ventura. Not necessarily in this order but here is an impressive list of professional city managers with Artesia experience. They include Jim Barisic, E. Eugene Romig, Jerry Schuster, M. D. "Mac" McKeown, Harold Campbell, Lois O'Sullivan, Paul Philips, Maria Dadian, Mike Egan (interim) and Bill Rawlings.

Artesia Deputy City Manager Melissa Gobas Burke joined the city staff in January 2007 as a Recreation Leader. She became the Special Event Coordinator in August 2007 and was elevated to Parks and Recreation Manager in

June 2010. Melissa began her tenure as Administrative Manager in November 2016. From October 2021 until January 2022, Melissa served as Artesia's Acting City Manager. She started as Deputy City Manager in June 2022. Melissa earned a BA from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) and an MS in recreation administration from California State University, Long Beach.

Arvin began with the sale of lots in 1906. The Arvin Post Office was opened in 1914 but the city did not incorporate until December 1960. The city is named for **Arvin Richardson**, who was from one of

the original settling families. The Arvin Migratory Labor Camp was the first federally operated farm labor camp opened by the Farm Security Administration in 1937 as part of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal. Arvin, "The Garden in the Sun," is in Kern County. In 2007 the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) listed Arvin as having the highest levels of smog of any community in the U. S. The 2020 population is set at 19,495. Jeff Jones is the City Manager and Finance Director. Cecilia Vela is the City Clerk. Chris Soriano is the Arvin City Planner and Megan Miller is the Human Resources Manager.

<u>Arvin</u> City Manager **Jeff V. Jones** went to work as the Deputy Financial Officer for the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA) in July 2005. In October 2017 Jeff took the <u>Arvin</u> Finance Director position. He was appointed City Manager in addition to his director post in May 2021. Jeff earned a BA in business administration from Humboldt State University.

Megan Miller came to the <u>Arvin</u> city staff from the private sector in August 2021 as the Human & Community Resources Manager. She served as the Acting City Manager starting in October 2022. Megan attended Central Texas College studying human resources management, and the human resources management and services curriculum at Cornell University. She is a graduate of Bakersfield Christian High School.

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


