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<u>Bakersfield</u>, once a tule reed marshland, was once known as *Kern Island* to the few pioneer explorers who ventured into the area. In 1851, gold was discovered

along the Kern River by some of the many prospectors who came to California looking for riches during the California Gold Rush starting in 1848. A devastating flood swept away most of the original settlement founded in 1860. Thomas Baker, who came to the area for gold built a home on the banks of the Kern River in 1863, at what became known as Baker's Field. By 1870 the community became known as Bakersfield. The city was incorporated in January 1898. It is the county seat of Kern County. The 2020 population of Bakersfield is 403,455. It is the 9th most populace city in California. Christian Clegg is the City Manager and Julie Drimakis is the City Clerk. Randy McKeegan is the Finance Director and Christi Tenter is the Human Resources Director. Virginia "Ginny" Gennaro is the Bakersfield City Attorney. Christopher Boyle is the Development Services Director and the Economic and Community Development Director is Jennifer Byers. The Bakersfield Chief of Police is Greg Terry and the Fire Chief is John Frando. Rick Anthony is the Recreation & Parks Director and Grega Strakaluse is the Public Works Director. Jena **Covey** is the Bakersfield Risk Manager.

Longtime <u>Bakersfield</u> City Manager **Alan Tandy** retired in 2019 after serving as City Manager for 27 years. He was a member of the city staff for 46 years; being initially hired in 1992. Alan came to <u>Bakersfield</u> from Billings, Montana. In 2014, Alan was investigated for suspicion of assault in connection with an incident at the San Joaquin Community Hospital Ice Center where he played recreation league hockey. No charges were filed.

Christian Clegg is the current Bakersfield City Manager. He began his public service career as a Management Intern for Johnson County, Kansas in August 2005. In June 2006, Christian took a similar Management Intern position with the City of Tacoma, Washington. He was hired as a Management Assistant in Tacoma in June 2007 and he was promoted the Management Analyst in May 2008. Christian became the Assistant to the City Manager in the City of Stockton in July 2011. He was appointed Stockton Deputy City Manager in August 2015. After nearly 9 years in Stockton, Christian was hired to be the City Manager for the City of Bakersfield in March 2020. He earned a BA in psychology from Brigham Young University and an MPA from The University of Kansas.



Dr. Scott Andrews is the Assistant City Manager for the city of <u>Bakersfield</u> was born in Tampa, Florida. Scott started his public service career in July 2003as a Recreation Supervisor for the City of Temple Terrace, Florida in July 2003.

Scott took the Economic Development Director job in Sugar Hill, Georgia in April 2014. In September 2017, he was appointed Assistant City Administrator for the City of Smyrna, Georgia. In December 2019 Scott became City Manager in Covington, Georgia. He came to <u>Bakersfield</u> in July 2022 as Assistant City Manager. Scott earned an AA degree from Hillsborough Community College in Tampa, Florida before getting a BS in business management from the University of Phoenix. Scott earned an MPA from Strayer University and a Doctorate in Education from Argosy University in Orange, California.

Director of Recreation and Parks **Rick Anthony** returned to <u>Bakersfield</u> in 2021 after working 30 years on the East Coast. He graduated from Bakersfield College before joining the Air Force.



<u>Baldwin Park</u> is located partly on land that was used for cattle grazing for the San Gabriel Mission. In 1860 the area was known as Vineland. The name was changed to <u>Baldwin Park</u> in

1906. The city was named for Elias J. "Lucky" Baldwin. The city was incorporated in January 1956. The first In-N-Out Burger location was opened in October 1948. The company's first meat processing facility is located on Hamburger Lane. As of January 2024, there are 417 In-N-Out Burger locations in 7 states and 275 different cities. The 2020 Baldwin Park population is 72,176. The Chief Executive Officer (City Manager) is Enrique C. Zaldivar, and Christopher Saenz is the City Clerk. Ron Garcia is the Director of Community Development, and the Finance Director is **Rose Tam**. **Karina Rueda** is the Human Resources Manager. The Public Works Director is Sam Gutierrez, and Manuel Carrillo Jr. is the Director of Recreation and Community Services.

Enrique C. Zaldivar was appointed to succeed long-time <u>Baldwin Park</u> Chief Executive Officer **Shannon Yauchzee** following his retirement. He began his <u>Baldwin Park</u> assignment in June 2021. Enrique previously served as the General Manager and Director of the Los Angeles

Sanitation and Environment starting in 2007. He began his career in 1985 as an Associate Engineer with the City of Los Angeles. Enrique earned a BS in civil environmental engineering from California Polytechnic University, Pomona after completing course work as the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA).

Shannon Yauchzee served as City Manager from July 2014 to July 2021. Since retirement he served as the Interim City Manager in <u>Fontana</u> for 9 months ending in May 2022.

<u>Banning</u> was initially called Moore City, for **Ransom B. Moore**, but within a few months the town was renamed for **Phineas Banning**, who pastured sheep in the area. Ransom operated a

large cattle ranch and later served as a member of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors. Banning is located on either side of the 10 Freeway and is traversed by the San Andreas Fault. The city was incorporated in February 1913. Douglas Schulze is the City Manager and Laurie Sampson is the Assistant City Manager. Marie Calderon is the City Clerk. Adam Rush is the Community Development Director. Lincoln Bogard is the Administrative Services Director and Deputy City Manager.

Minnesota State University, Mankato alumnus, **Douglas J. Schulze** was appointed City Manager for the City of <u>Banning</u> in October 2018. Doug was the Bainbridge Island, Washington city manager from November 2012 to 2018. He also served as City Manager in the Washington State communities of Normandy Park and Medina. He was City Administrator in Sandstone, Minnesota in 1992-1996. Doug is an ICMA Credentialed Manager. He is a U. S. Army military veteran. Doug earned a BS and Master's in urban and regional studies. In 2023 Doug received a 35-year ICMA Service Award.

<u>Banning</u> Assistant City Manager **Laurie Sampson**, has worked for the city since January 2015 when she joined the Public Works Department. She was appointed Assistant City Manager in July 2022.

Lincoln Bogard is the Administrative Services Director and Deputy City Manager for the city of <u>Banning</u> since January 2023. He was the Finance Director in <u>American Canyon</u> (2020-2022) prior to becoming the Finance Director in <u>Banning</u> in June 2022.



<u>Barstow</u> is in the Mojave Desert in San Bernardino County. The <u>Barstow</u> community began in the 1840s as travelers used the corridor moving

from New Mexico and Utah to Los Angeles. Barstow is named for William Barstow Strong, a former president of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway. The Southern Pacific built a rail line through Barstow to Needles in 1883. Mining in the Owens Valley and mountains in the 1860s and 1870s brought many people and businesses to Barstow. The city was incorporated in September 1947. The 2020 population is 25,415. The Acting City Manager is Andrew Espinoza, Jr. and the elected City Clerk is Andrea Flores. Heidy Riley is the Administrative Services Manager, and Mark Gerardi is the Public Works Supervisor.

Interim City Manager **Andrew Espinoza**, **Jr.** began his career with the <u>Barstow</u> Police Department in 1999 as a Patrol Officer. He served as Chief of Police (Director of Public Safety) for about 2 and a half years of his 25 years with the city. **Willie Hopkins**, **Jr.**, was city manager from September 2021 to January when he left to serve as the <u>Compton</u> city manager.

Veteran retired city manager **Richard D. Rowe** served as the <u>Barstow</u> interim city manager in 2008 and then as city manager from January 2009 to January 2011. Richard served as city manager in <u>La Palma</u> (1981-1986), <u>Chino</u> (1986-1996), <u>Needles</u> (2003-2008) and <u>Barstow</u>. He served as Interim City Manager in <u>Needles</u> (2000-2002) and <u>Canyon Lake</u> (2012-2013). He began his career in 1965 as an <u>Anaheim</u> Police Officer. He worked in staff positions in <u>Anaheim</u>, <u>Bakersfield</u> and <u>El Monte</u> before his first city manager appointment in <u>La Palma</u>. He received a 40-year ICMA Service Award in 2015. Richard earned his private pilot's license at an "older" age, and he is a model trains aficionado.

Beaumont is French for "Beautiful Mountain." During the 1850s surveying parties passed through the area that is present-day Beaumont as they looked for the

best passage from the east to the Pacific Ocean. The San Gorgono Pass was surveyed in 1853. By the 1860s, stagecoach service was provided through the pass. Railroad tracks were laide through the area in 1875 and a station was established as the Summit Station. In 1887 a development company named the town Beaumont. The city was incorporated in November 1912. The 2020 population is 53,036. The Beaumont City Manager is Elizabeth Gibbs and the City Clerk is Elaine Morgan. Jennifer **Ustation** is the Finance Director and **Kyle Warsinski** is the Economic Development Manager. Kari Mendoza is the Administrative Services Director and **Doug Story** is the Director of Community Services. Christina Taylor is the Deputy City Manager and Carole Kendrick is the Planning Manager. The Director of Public Works is Robert Vestal. Sean Thuilliez is the Beaumont Chief of Police.



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<u>M. Gibbs</u> worked for <u>Beaumont</u> for a little more than 19 years starting in January 2003 as a Resources Director. She served as Acting and/or Interim City Manager

between June 2015 and May 2016. Elizabeth worked as the Transit Director starting in May 2016 and then the Director of Community Services from July 2018 to January 2022. She did some Substitute teaching in 2022 for the Beaumont Unified School District, and she worked with her landscaping service business she started in January 2016, which she continues to operate. She returned to the city of Beaumont in April 2022 as Interim City Manager and was hired as City Manager in July 2022. Elizabeth earned a BA and MPA from California Baptist University. She is an ICMA Credentialed Manager.

Christina Taylor worked as a Planner for the City of Rialto from May 2003 until January 2009. <u>Bell Gardens</u> is a city within the County of Los Angeles. The city is named for **James George Bell**, as is the City of <u>Bell</u>. One of the oldest homes built in Los Angeles County is

an adobe house built in Bell Gardens in 1795. It is still standing at 7000 Gage Avenue. Because of the rich soil in the area, many Japanese immigrants leased land and farmed quality vegetables for the local marketplace. Bell Gardens remained a farming community until the 1930s. Depression housing earned the community the name of "Billy Goat Acres." The city of Bell Gardens was incorporated in August 1961. It is one of only six cities in Los Angeles County that permits casino gambling. Bell Gardens' 2020 population is 39,501. Michael B. O'Kelly is the Bell Gardens City Manager, and Daisy Gomez is the City Clerk. Elizabeth Nava is the Director of Recreation and Community Services. Manuel Carrillo is the Director of Finance & Administrative Services, and the Director of Public Works is Bernardo Iniguez. The Bell Gardens Chief of Police is Paul Camacho.



Michael B. O'Kelly, <u>Bell Gardens</u> City Manager, previously worked as the Director of Administrative Services for the City of <u>Fullerton</u>. He was hired in <u>Bell Gardens</u> in August 2019. He served in the U. S. Army for 4 years as a field

artillery surveyor and was honorably discharge with the rank of Sergeant. He worked in various positions with the counties of San Bernardino and Orange. He worked 8 years for the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) as the Chief Financial Officer, and Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) before his service to the City of Fullerton. Michael earned a BS in accounting and an MPA from California State University, San Bernardino. He also holds a California Certified Public Accountant (CPA) license.



Elizabeth Nava, <u>Bell Gardens</u> Director of Recreation and Community Services, began her public service career with the City of <u>Norwalk</u>. She started as a Recreation Coordinator in June 2008. She was promoted

<u>Bell Gardens</u> has had an interesting city manager history. They have had some very good ones. A few of those, not in the appropriate order, include Helen S. West, Claude Booker, Charles Gomez, Maria Chacon, Steve Simonian and Larry Kosmont.

Larry Kosmont served as <u>Bell Gardens</u> City Manager from August 1980 to September 1983. Starting in 1975, Larry was an Administrative Intern and Administrative Assistant for Santa Monica. In March 1978 he became the Assistant City Manager in <u>Seal Beach</u>, where Larry was awarded the Annual John Nail Memorial Award. He was the <u>Burbank</u> Redevelopment Director and Community Development Director (1983-1985). He founded the very successful Kosmont Companies in 1986. In 2011 he served as the Interim City Administrator for the City of Montebello. Larry earned a BA from the State University of New York and an MPA from the University of Southern California (USC).

<u>Clovis</u> City Manager **John Holt** and Finance Director **Jay Schengel** report that expenses are outpacing revenues and could lead to future problems. <u>Clovis</u> sales tax revenue has declined for the past two years resulting in a \$2 million shortfall. Though property taxes will be up by

about \$0.9 million, other fees and charges will be slightly down. Expenses will outpace revenues for water, sewer and community sanitation. High inflation rates exacerbate the problem. CalPERS costs are expected to double in the next five years, going from \$10 million to \$20 million. It appears that the <u>California City</u> search for a city manager continues. Though it was reported that **Patrick Marsh** was selected, Patrick and the city did not come to an employment agreement understanding. The city's Human Resources Director **Latisha Lamberth** is the Acting City Manager. Latisha is the 6th acting city manager since City Manager **Doug Dunford** resigned in September 2022.

The annual fee for Newport Beach to maintain membership with the

League of California Cities is \$24,800. Emeryville's recent council meeting was disrupted "Zoombombers" using racist, antisemitic and homophobic lanauaae. City Manager Paul Buddenhagen was warned to monitor speaker's signup names as fake names with double meanings have been used to contribute to disrupting the meetings. Incidents in other Bay Area cities have also been reported, including Antioch, El Cerrito, Fremont, Sacramento, Redwood City and San Mateo. Robert took over from Administrative Services Director Tori Hannah, who served as City Manager Pro tem. Ben came to Pacific Grove as the Interim City Manager in January 2016, replacing former City Manager Thomas Frutchey. Ben became City Manager in April 2016. He is currently the City Manager for Ojai. Bob retired as the Grover Beach City Manager in 2016, and previously served as the city manager in Colfax and Cloverdale. He worked as the Interim City Administrator for **Guadalupe** in 2019.
