Public Managers in California "C" Cities with Names from Carson to Chico

Cities included in the August 2024 issue of the City Manager Newsletter by Trackdown are cities listed alphabetically, including: Carson, Cathedral City, Ceres, Cerritos, and Chico. The unincorporated communities of Caruthers, Castro Castroville, Cayucos and Chester fall within this alphabetical group too. The five cities here include city managers David C. Roberts, Jr.; Charlie McClendon; Doug Dunford; Robert A. Lopez; and Mark Sorensen. These cities are found in the counties of Los Angeles, Riverside, Stanislaus, and Butte. Andy Pickett is the Chief Administrative Officer for Butte County where the city of Oroville is the county seat. Jody L. Hayes is the Chief Executive Officer for Stanislaus County, where Modesto is the county seat.



California's fifth most populous unincorporated area is Castro Valley. Castro Valley is named for **Don Guillermo Castro**, an early California rancher. Castro Valley is in Alameda County.



<u>Carson</u>, California is a South Bay Los Angeles County community. The city is named for **George Henry Carson**, who married a daughter of the Dominguez family in 1857 and

managed the local rancho. Oil was discovered in <u>Carson</u> with the first well drilling in Dominguez Hill in 1921. The City of <u>Carson</u> was not incorporated until February 1968. The city's 2020 population is 95,558. The city manager for the City of <u>Carson</u> is **David C. Roberts**, **Jr.** and **Robert Lennox** and **John S. Raymond** are Assistant City Managers. **Dr. Khaleah K. Bradshaw** is the **Carson** City Clerk.

David C. Roberts is the city manager for the City of Carson served as a Human Resources Specialist in the United States Army from April 2000 to April 2005. Once he left the military at Fort Irwin, David was a planner for a railway in Barstow. In May 2007, he joined the San Bernardino city staff as a Human Resources Analyst, and he worked in that post for more than 5 years. In November 2012, David was hired as the Director of Human Resources for the City of <u>Hawthorne</u>, and he became the <u>Hawthorne</u> Assistant City Manager in July 2014. In June 2018, David was appointed Assistant City Manager for the City of Carson, and in February 2022 he was elevated to City Manager. David earned a BA in sociology from California State University, Long Beach.

Cathedral City

<u>Cathedral City</u> is a city in Riverside County situated between <u>Palm</u> <u>Springs</u> and <u>Rancho Mirage</u>. The city's name is from Cathedral Canyon in the foothills of the city.

The city was incorporated in November 1981. The 2020 population is 51,493. Charlie McClendon is the city manager and Tracey R. Hermosillo is the City Clerk. Anne Ambrose is the Assistant City Manager; George Crum is the Chief of Police; Michael A. Contreras is the Fire Chief: Kevin Beirsack is the Financial Services Director; John Corella is the Director of Public Works; Andrew A. Firestine is the Director of Community and Economic Development: is and Rvan Hunt the communications and Events Manager. Armando **Baldizzone** is the City Engineer.

City Manager Charlie McClendon of Cathedral City, began his city government career in August 1985 in the City of Glendale, Arizona. In September 2002, Charlie left his Management & Budget Director post to join the City of Avondale as Assistant City Manager. In November 2004, Charlie was elevated to the Avondale City Manager position. Charlie came to Cathedral City, California as City Manager in March 2014. He earned a BA from Ottawa University and an MPA from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.



Anne V. Ambrose is the <u>Cathedral City</u> Assistant City Manager. Anne served as the <u>Palmdale</u> Director of Public Safety and Community Relations from June 1999 to August 2013, when she was appointed Director of Administrative

Services. She took the <u>California City</u> Interim City Manager position in June 2021. She came to <u>Cathedral City</u> as Assistant City Manager in January 2023. Anne earned a BA from Kent State University and an MPA from California State University, Northridge.



<u>Ceres</u> is in the County of Stanislaus as part of the Modesto metropolitan statistical area. **John Service**, **Cassius Warner** and **Daniel Whitmore** were among the first nonnative families to live in <u>Ceres</u> in

1867. <u>Ceres</u> was incorporated in February 1918. The 2020 population is set at 49,302. **Doug Dunford** is the current <u>Ceres</u> City Manager, and **Fallon Martin** is the City Clerk. **Joey Chavez** is the Recreation Manager, and **Shannon Esenwein** is the Director of Finance. **Lea Simvoulakis** is the Community Development Director and **Chris Perry** is the Chief of Police. The Human Resources Director is **Delilah Vasquez**, and **Lee Simvouladkis** is the Community Development Director.



<u>Ceres</u> City Manager **Doug Dunford** began his public service career as a Deputy Sheriff for Los Angeles County in September 1978. In October 1989 he took a position as a Police Office for the City of <u>Turlock</u>. After working as a Captain for the railroad police

(1993-2002) in <u>San Bernardino</u>, he was appointed Chief of Police for the <u>City of Escalon</u>. He was the Chief of Police for the <u>Livingston</u> Police Department in 2010-2011 and took the Chief's post for the <u>Gustine</u> Police Department in March 2011. After nearly 7 years as Chief, Doug was appointed City Manager for <u>Gustine</u>. In 2022, Doug served a few months as the City Manager for <u>California City</u> before taking the <u>Ceres</u> city manager appointment starting in May 2023. Doug earned a BASc from Azusa Pacific University and an MA from Bellevue University.

Former City Manager **Alex Terrazas** came to <u>Ceres</u> in 2022 after serving as <u>Los Banos</u> City Manager (2016-2021) and as Assistant Town Manager for <u>Truckee</u>. Alex started as a member of the staff of the League of California Cities. He earned a BA and MPA from California State University, Sacramento.

Tom Westbrook worked for the city of <u>Ceres</u> for more than 20 years. He joined the city staff as an Associate Planner in January 2001 and began working his way up in the organization. Tom became the Senior Planner in February 2005; Planning/Building Division Manager in July 2010; and Director of Community Development in November 2012. Tom was selected to serve as the <u>Ceres</u> city manager starting in April 2020. He joined the City of <u>Red Bluff</u> as Community Development Director in September 2021. Tom was appointed <u>Red Bluff</u> city manager in May 2022. He earned a BA from California State University, Chico.

Shannon Esenwein has served as the <u>Ceres</u> Director of Finance since November 2023. She previously worked as the Chief Finance and Operations Office for the Stanislaus County Community Services Agency (2020-2023). Shannon was the Deputy Director of Parks and Recreation for Stanislaus County from November 2019 to December 2020. She earned an AA degree from San Joaquin Delta College and a BS from California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo.



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Cerritos, where there is only human made hills, was originally incorporated as Dairy Valley. The name "Cerritos," is Spanish for "Little hills." Cerritos is on land that was a portion of the Rancho Los Nietos land. Dairy Valley was

incorporated in April 1956 and omitted the area's major population which became the City of Artesia in 1959. Dairy Valley officially changed its name to the City of Cerritos in January 1967. Between 1970 and 1972, Cerritos was the fastest growing city in California. The 2020 population of Cerritos is 49,578. Robert A. Lopez is the City Manager and Kathy Matsumoto is the Assistant City Manager. Vida P. Barone is the City Clerk and City Treasurer.

On August 31, 1986, Aeroméxico Flight 498 on a flight from Mexico City was preparing to land at Los Angeles International Airport. The plane was struck by a small Piper aircraft that had flown into a Control Tower Area without clearance from Air Traffic Control. The Piper made a crash landing onto the unoccupied playground field of Cerritos Elementary School's, but the Douglas DC-9 airliner crashed inverted (upside-down) plowed into a dense Cerritos residential area, immediately destroying four houses. The resulting fire destroyed eight more houses before firefighters could bring the blaze under control. Eighty-two (82) people died, including 15 people on the ground.

Cerritos has been blessed with some highly professional city managers. M. D. "Mac" McKeown served as the first permanent Dairy Valley city manager in 1956. He went on to be city manager in Paramount, Norwalk and Artesia. Bill Stark was the city manager when the city began changing from a dairy community to a residential and commercial city in the early 1960s. After Bill, there was John DeWeerd, Gaylord F. Knapp and Art Gallucci. Some of the former Assistant City Managers include Stan Morgan, Chris Rope, Jim Barisic, and Vince Brar.

Chico, the largest city by population in Butte County, is the economic center of the northern Sacramento Valley. As the home to California State University, Chico, Chico is known as a college town. Chico was founded in 1860 by **John Bidwell**, who

arrived with the first wagon train to reach California in 1843. The Army established a local camp just outside of Chico during the Civil War under Brigadier General Bidwell. It was referred to as Camp Chico prior to the name of Fort Bidwell. The city of Chico was incorporated in January 1872. The city's 2020 population is set at 101,000. Mark Sorensen is the city manager and Jennifer Macarthy is the Deputy City Manager. Deborah R. Presson is the Chico City Clerk. Barbara Martin is the Administrative Services Director.

<u>Chico</u>'s Bidwell Park is one of the largest municipal parks in the United States. The park was named a California Park and Recreation Society 2013 Regional Treasure. The park includes many hiking and mountain biking trails, picnic areas, swimming holes and beautiful vistas. **Anjie Goulding** is the Recreation Director for the Chico Area Park and Recreation District. Anjie has served as director since July 2021. She earned a BS and MS in kinesiology from California State University, Chico.

Former Norco, Whittier and La Habra City Manager Thomas G. Mauk passed away on June 8 at the age of 80. Tom was born in Carson City, Nevada. After moving with his family to Santa Rosa, Tom moved south to attend classes at California State Polytechnic University, Pomona, where he earned his BS. Tom also earned an MPA from the University of Southern California (USC). Tom began his public service career with the City of Los Angeles where he started as an Administrative Analyst in February 1967. Tom was hired as the Assistant City Manager for Montclair in July 1970, and he was selected to be the Norco City Manager in April 1976. He took the Whittier City Manager position starting in October 1980, and the City Manager post in La Habra starting in December 1999. Following some private side assignments, Tom became the County Executive Officer for Orange County. He served in that position from October 2004 until August 2012. Tom received a 40 Year ICMA Service Award in 2009. He served as the President of the City Managers' Department of the League of California Cities in 1996-1997, and he was a member of the ICMA Executive Board as a Regional Vice President from 1997 to 2000.
