These six (6) cities are found in the counties of Riverside, Los Angeles, Tulare, Solano, Siskiyou and Merced.

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

<u>Desert Hot Springs</u> is a Coachella Valley city in Riverside County. The town was founded in1941 by **L. W. Coffee**, who chose the name <u>Desert Hot Springs</u> because of the area's

natural hot springs. In the 1950s the area became popular with U.S. snow-areas residents seeking warmth. They are dubbed "snowbirds" as they flee their cold weather for the warmth of the desert. The Desert Hot Springs area was treeless prior to the 1930s when the initial population increase. The city was Incorporated in September 1963. The 2020 population is 32,512. Frank J. Luckino is the Desert Hot Springs city manager, and Jerryl Soriano is the City Clerk. Geoffrey Buchheim is the Administrative Services Director and Valerie Rodriguez is the Finance Technician. Doria Wilms is the Deputy City Manager and Daniel Porras is the City Engineer and Assistant City Manager. Roberta Crncic is the Recreation and Community Services Director.



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<u>Desert Hot Springs</u> City Manager **Frank J. Luckino** previously served as city manager for the cities of <u>Twentynine Palms</u> (March 2015-November 2023) and <u>Blythe</u> (June 2013-March 2015). Frank served as

the Assistant General Manager and CFO for the Hi-Desert Water District (2009-2013). From 1994 to 1997, Frank worked in the private sector as the Controller of Planet Hollywood International in Nevada. Frank began his tenure as Desert Hot Springs city manager in November 2023 after serving Twentynine Palms for 8 years. He replaced City Manager Luke Rainey, who left in 2023. He earned a BS in accounting from West Liberty University, West Virginia and an MPA degree. In 2019, Frank received a 10 Year ICMA Service Award. From November 2004 to June 2011 Frank served as a member of the Yucca Valley City Council, which included a term as Mayor.

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In 1840, the area that is now <u>Diamond Bar</u> was part of a Mexican land grant that included Brea Canyon and the eastern Walnut Valley. The rancho was divided following the United States inclusion

of the State of California. Several ranches, the largest of which was the Diamond Bar Ranch, were started. At the time, the Diamond Bar Ranch was one of the largest working cattle ranches in the western United States. In the 1950s the Diamond Bar Ranch was acquired by the Transamerica Corporation for the purpose of creating one of the master-planned nation's first communities. Transamerica gave the community the Diamond Bar name. The city was incorporated in April 1989. The 2020 population is set at 55,072. Daniel Fox is the Diamond Bar City Manager, and the Assistant City Manager is Ryan McLean. The City Clerk is Kristina Santana. Jason Jacobsen is the Finance Director, and Greg Gubman is the Community Development Director. Crystal Knox is the Diamond Bar Recreation Supervisor. (Crystal is the District 13 President-Elect for the California Parks and Recreation Society.) Cecilia Arellano is the Community Relations Manager, and the City Engineer and Public Works Director is David Liu. Diamond Bar Mayor & Council Member Steve Tye serviced as the President of the California Contract Cities Association (CCCA) in 2013-2014.



Daniel Fox has been the <u>Diamond</u>
<u>Bar</u> city manager since July 2017, following his service as the Assistant City Manager for the City of <u>Laguna</u>
<u>Niguel</u> (January 2014 – July 2017) and his overlapping experience as a Realtor for Coast City Capital. Dan served as the <u>Laguna Niguel</u> Director

of Community Development from December 2009 until his appointment as Assistant City Manager. He previously worked Planning in <u>San Juan Capistrano</u> and <u>Tustin</u> and as the <u>Walnut</u> Community Development Director (2004-2009). He earned a BS in urban & regional planning from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona. In 2022 he received a 35-Year ICMA Service Award.

He earned a BA from California State University, Fullerton and a Juris Doctorate from Western State University College of Law. Terry was the <u>Diamond Bar</u> city manager for 8 years. He retired as the city manager for <u>Yorba Linda</u> in 2004. Terry went on to complete some interim assignments, including Interim City Manager for Calimesa.

Originally called Sibleyville, <u>Dinuba</u> is a Tulare County city. The origin of the name

"Dinuba" is unknown, though guesses are plentiful. It is probably a railroad monicker that was dropped on the area during railroad construction. Dinuba is primarily another farming town in California's Central Valley. The city was incorporated in January 1906. The 2020 population is 24,563. Luis Patlan has been City Manager since July 2015, and Daniel James is the Assistant City Manager. The City Clerk and Human Resources Director is Maria Alaniz, and Karina Solis is the Administrative Services Director starting in October 2019. Stephanie Hurtado is the Dinuba Parks & Community Services Director, and George Avila is the Public Works Director. Abel Iriarte is the Chief of Police and Greg Chastain is the Fire Chief.



Luis Patlan started his <u>Dinuba</u> City Manager tenure in July 2015. Luis began his public service career as a Housing Specialist for the City of <u>Sanger</u>. He worked his way up in the Sanger organization to serve as

Interim City Manager. After a stint in the private sector, Luis was hired by the City of <u>Kerman</u> as the Director of Planning and Development, and he was elevated to be <u>Kerman</u> City Manager. Luis earned a BA from California State University, Fresno following graduation from Parlier High School.

It appears that the first "semipermanent" residents in the <u>Dixon</u> area gathered during the California Gold Rush. At that time the community was called Silveyville,

founded in 1852 by Elijah Silvey. The city was originally named "Dicksville" for Thomas Dickson. The story goes that when the first shipment of merchandise arrived on the train from San Francico in 1872, it was mistakenly labeled to "Dixon." The Dixon name has been used for the community since. Dixon was incorporated in March 1878. Its 2020 population is 18,988. The city manager is Jim Lindley and Kristin Janisch is the city clerk. Raffi Boloyan is the Community Development and Planning Director. Madeline Graf is the Economic Development Manager and Public Information Officer, and Christopher Fong is the City Engineer and Director of Utilities. Kate Zawadzki is the Finance Director and Louren Kotow is the Public Works Director.

Jim Lindley began his public service career as a member of the City of Hesperia City Council from December 1998 until December 2006. He worked as the Director of Public Health for San Bernardino from February 2005 until June 2010 when he became the city manager for the City of Dunsmuir. Jim was appointed Dixon city manager in February 2012. He received a 20-Year ICMA Service Award in 2017. Jim earned a BA in economics and an MPA from California State University, San Bernardino.

<u>Dixon</u> Finance Director **Kate Zawadzki** previously worked as an Accountant for the City of <u>Napa</u> (November 1998 – January 2010). She joined the <u>Dixon</u> city staff as Accounting Manager in 2010 and was promoted to Deputy Finance Director in January 2013. Kate became Finance Director in October 2019. She earned a BS in accounting from Sonoma State University and an MPA from California State University, Dominguez Hills.

David Lee Harris served as the <u>Dixon</u> city manager from May 1978 until 1997. He previously served in the City of <u>Fairfield</u>, where he rose to the position of Assistant City Manager from January 1973 until 1978. David worked as an executive recruiter based in Sacramento after leaving city government. David earned a BS and MPA from Brigham Young University. He was born in July 1945. He graduated from high school in 1963.

Found in the Congressional Record is a tribute to DAVID HARRIS by the HONORABLE VIC FAZIO OF CALIFORNIA IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES Friday, May 16, 1997. This is a partial recitation of the citation. Mr. FAZIO of California. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor David Harris of Dixon, CA. David Harris has served as the city manager for the city of Dixon for 19 years, from June 1978 to July 1997. During David Harris' career as city manager to the city of Dixon, he placed the city of Dixon on the map. Dixon grew from a population of 6,031 in 1978 to a population of 13,078 in 1997. Furthermore, the city's area increased from 3.2 square miles in 1978 to 6.5 square miles in 1997. David Harris oversaw the planning and development of Dixon City Hall in 1981, the Senior Multi-Use Center in 1987, the Council Chambers in 1988, the Dixon Police Station in 1991, and the Dixon Fire Station in 1997. In addition, he is credited with creating the city of Dixon's logo, overseeing the planning and development of Northwest Park, and all the major renovations of Hall Park.

<u>Dorris</u>, California is a small city in Siskiyou County established as a result of the Southern Pacific Railroad building a line through the northern section of the Butte Valley. The town was named in

1907 by officials of the railroad for Presley A. and Carlos J. Dorris, who raised livestock in the area in the 1860s. They later moved to Dorris' Bridge on the Pit River, which in 1876 was named Alturas. Dorris is the first city you come to in California while traveling south on Highway 97. Former NFL player Bernie Hughes and former MLB pitcher Nelson Briles were born in **Dorris**. The city was incorporated in December 1908. The 2020 population is 860. Dorris is known for it 200-foot-tall flagpole, at one time, the highest in the U.S. west of the Mississippi River. The local Lions Club flies a big United State flag on the pole. Dorris is currently designated, "Dorris, California-Gateway to Lower Klamath Our Nations First Waterfowl Refuge." Joanna Wynant is the Dorris City Administrator and Jocelyn Ibarra is the elected City Clerk. Carol McKay (2011-2020) is a previous City Administrator.

Joanna Wynant was hired to serve as the <u>Dorris</u> City Administrator on July 27, 2023. She succeeded City Administrator Carol McKay. Joanna represents the City of <u>Dorris</u> on the Butte Valley Groundwater Advisory Committee. Joanna serves <u>Dorris</u> as Deputy City Clerk in addition to City Administrator. Joanna is the daughter in law of the late **Howard Leroy Wynant**, a former Chair of the Butte Valley Indian Council (1997-1999) and Chair of the Shasta Tribe (1999-2002).



West Sacramento, California - Joseph "Joe" Goeden, was born on July 28, 1949 in Spokane, Washington, raised by Dennis and Francis Ryan. After battling a newly determined ALS diagnosis, Joe passed on Sunday, November 10th, 2024, lovingly surrounded by his family at Sutter Hospital in Sacramento, CA.

Joe traveled extensively throughout his childhood, residing in various parts of Washington, Florida and even Japan. At 17 years old, Joe moved to Victorville, California, where as luck would have it, he met the love of his life, Nola Goeden while accompanying her to high school homecoming. They were married in 1973, celebrating 51 years of marriage last Summer.

Joe attended Cal Poly University Pomona, graduating with a degree in Public Administration. His hard work and determination led him up the corporate ladder from janitor to mailroom clerk, to eventually becoming Montebello's City Administrator in Southern California. In 1978,

Joe and Nola welcomed their daughter Katie and three years later, their son John was born.


In 1989 he moved his family to West Sacramento serving as City Manager until his retirement in 2002. Joe continued to stay active in local government by mentoring other City Managers and consulting on a variety of issues. His home away from home was a historic barn he owned in McCloud. He would take monthly trips, tend to the property, sell his handcrafted bars and wood benches and browse for antique treasures.

Joe is survived by his wife Nola, daughter Katie, son John (Ali), grandson Conrad, along with his sisters, Sharon, Karen, Gayle, Denise and brother Dennis.

<u>Dos Palos</u> was founded in the 1820s at the site of two tall trees. Spanish explorer **Gabriel Moraga** named the two tall poplars "Dos Palos." In 1891 cattle rancher **Henry Miller** began

the development of a small town that was given the name "Dos Palos." Dos Palos was incorporated in May 1935. In January 2008 the Dos Palos community and surrounding area was transferred from Fresno County to Merced County. In 2020 the Dos Palos population was 5,798. Major League Baseball outfielder Dave Henderson was born in Merced but grew up in Dos Palso. **Darrell Fonseca**, the Dos Palos city manager, retired effective March 31, 2022. Dewayne Jones is the current city manager. Manuela Sousa is the Director of Finance & Personnel. Craig Hackett is the Director of Utilities, and Gordon Bonds is the Director of Public Works and Parks. Clifton Battles is the Chief of Police and Animal Control and Lori L. Lima is the City Treasurer. Brian Guerrero is the Director of Community Development.

Jerry Dewayne Jones worked as Director of Public Safety in 2018. He then served as the city's Fire Marshall from 2019 to 2020. He became city manager in 2022 following the retirement of longtime city manager **Darrell Fonseca**.

Darrell Fonseca retired after 32 years of service. His last day as city manager was March 31, 2022, He was the longest serving city manager in a single city of all 482 California cities. Darrell grew up on a dairy farm. He graduated from California State University, Fresno and went to work on the staff of the State Assembly and as an administrator to U.S. Congress Member **Richard Lehman**. Darrell served as the Interim Executive Director of the Fresno County and City Chamber of Commerce. He helped bring Triple A professional baseball to Fresno. Darrell was elected National President of the Young Men's Institute (YMI) in 2022. Starting in 2022, Darrell joined the Merced County staff in human resources.

Frank Tripepi and Joe Goeden were good friends. Joe was in Montebello when Frank was next door in Rosemead. After Viet Nam veteran Frank G. Tripepi returned home from over-seas and recovered from his combat injuries. Frank was hired to serve as an Administrative Aide starting in October 1971 for the City of Hawaiian Gardens. In April 1972, he was promoted to Administrative Assistant and in November, he was hired by Rosemead City Manager **Leland Gunn** for the Rosemead Assistant City Manager position. After Lee retired, Frank became Rosemead City Manager in October 1974 and served in that position for 28-years. Following Frank's retirement from Rosemead he was appointed President and Chief Executive Officer of MuniFinancial, which is currently Willdan Financial Services. After Frank completed a year or so as the Interim City Manager in La Puente, he returned fulltime to Willdan, where he was Senior Vice President of Business Development. He earned a BA from California State University, Fullerton.

John is a former Chief of Police and he has served as city manager for several communities, most recently Interim City Manager for the City of Huron in Fresno County. Among others he served as City Manager for the City of Buellton, and he worked as the City Administrator for the City of Exeter. Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) officials decided that Palo Alto City Manager Ed Shikada will not be allowed to participate in decisions that involve Stanford University. On September 7, Ed married Sandra Jung, who works for Stanford Health Care, a university-affiliated nonprofit that includes Stanford Hospital and various clinics. The FPPC directed Ed to also recuse himself from all matters that pertain to Stanford University. The FPPC decision means that any item involving the university will now be overseen by his top deputy, Assistant City Manager Kiely Nose. While the university and the hospital are separate legal entities, the FPPC concludes that their close relationship is enough to extend the conflict-ofinterest provision. Stanford Hospitals and Clinics and Stanford University employ about 10,000 people together, making them the largest employers in Palo Alto. San Jose Council Member Omar Torres was arrested on charges stemming from child sex crime allegations. The alleged crimes are purported to have taken place more than twenty-five years ago. He was arraigned at the San Jose Hall of Justice on three felony charges for raping a child. The San Jose City Manager is Jennifer Maguire and Paul Joseph is the Chief of Police. Bessie Marie Scott is the new Antioch city manager. She is a former Deputy Inspector General for the City of Seattle, Washington. Bessie earned a BA in law, society and philosophy from the University of California, Santa Barbara and an MPA from the University of Washington. Bessie is Antioch's fifth city manager in three years.
