This issue of the City Manager Newsletter by Trackdown includes information regarding Fontana, Fort Bragg, Fort Jones, Fortuna, Fountain Valley, and Fowler. The City of Fort Bragg, is the west terminus of the Skunk Railroad, and it is also well known as the site of Glass Beach. The Goldie Hawn classic movie, "Overboard" was partly shot there at the mouth of the Noyo River. The City of Fowler is known as "The Blossome Trail City." Tuskegee Airman Herman Albert "Ace" Lawson was born in Fowler.

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
Fontana was previously known as "Rosena" from 1890 until 1919. In its early years, the city was an agricultural center primarily of citrus groves, vineyards and chicken ranches. The area was

changed during World War II when Henry J. Kaiser built the Kaiser Steel mill just outside the city limits. This huge mill helped feed military equipment for the war and pushed the city's land use away from agriculture. The City of Fontana was incorporated in June 1952. The name "Fontana" is Italian for fountain of water in reference to the nearby Santa Ana River. The city's 2020 population is 212,704. It is the 20th largest city in the State of California. The city manager is **Matthew C. Ballantyne** and the City Clerk is **Germaine Key**. **Ray Ebert** is the Deputy City Manager, Phillip Burum is the Development Services Deputy City Manager, and Daniel Schneider is the Fontana Community Services Director. Monique Carter is the Fontana Communications and Marketing Manager, Jessica A. Brown is the Chief Financial Officer.



Matthew C. Ballantyne began his Fontana city manager tenure in April 2022. He succeeded city manager Mark Denny, who resigned to accept a position in the private sector. Matt served as the San Marino City Manager from 2006 until

2012, when he was hired to be the city manager for the City of <u>Chino</u>, where he worked for 10 years. Matt earned a BA from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) and Master's Degrees from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona and the University of La Verne.

Jessica Brown is the <u>Fontana</u> Chief Financial Officer. She joined the <u>Fontana</u> city staff in November 2021. Jessica began her professional public service career in June 1999 when she was hired as a Financial

Administrator for the Finance and Administration office of the County of San Bernardino. After more than 16 years with the county, Jessica became the Chief Financial Officer for the Apple Valley Fire Protection District. In January 2017 she took the same position with the Lake Arrowhead Community Services District. Jessica went to work in December 2018 as the Finance Director for the city of Rialto. In May 2020 he became the Finance Director for the city of Placentia. Jessica worked for Placentia until she moved to Fontana. She earned a BBA in accounting and finance from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona. She is a Norco College Advisory Board member.

Fort Bragg was established in the area extending from the mouth of the Noyo River after a Bureau of Indians Affairs exploration trip to the area in 1855 to establish the Mendocino Indian Reservation. In

the summer of 1857, a military post was established north of the Noyo River and named for Captain Braxton Bragg. He later became a General in the Confederate Army. The area kept the Fort Bragg name after the post was closed and the Indian Reservation was discontinued. About 1869, a sawmill was opened in Fort Bragg using the Noyo Harbor for shipping. about 1869. The company was incorporated in 1885 as the Fort Bragg Redwood Company. The City of Fort Braga was incorporated in 1889. The 2020 population is 6,983. Fort Bragg has become a tourist destination due to the amazing views of the Pacific Ocean and some notable points of interest. Glass Beach and the Skunk Railroad are two popular things to see. Isaac Whippy is the City Manager, and Diana Paoli is the City Clerk. Merilyn Tiriboyi is the Assistant Finance Director.

Isaac earned a Bachelor's of Commerce degree in accounting and economics from The University of the South Pacific. He also attended Indian College, Suva Fiji taking courses in accounting, economics, math, English, geography and computer.

Linda Ruffing, owner of North Coast Community Planning since February 2018, served as the <u>Fort Braga</u> city manager from January 2006 until February 2018. She previously worked in planning for the County of Mendocino, starting in September 1992 as a Coastal Planner. Linda earned a BA from the University of California, Santa Cruz and a Master of Community & Regional Planning from the University of California, Berkeley.

Gary D. Milliman recently reached out to let us know that he has once again retired. This time as city manager for Talent, Oregon (2024-2025). Gary is an ICMA Credentialed Manager, retired. He served as city manager in Cotati (October 1977-April 1979); Fort Bragg (April 1979-January 1997); South Gate (August 2003-July 2007); and in the Oregon cities of Brookings, Ashland, and Talent. He also served in Port Orford, Oregon. Gary was the Southern California Regional Director for the League of California Cities from 2000 to 2003. Gary earned a BA from California State University, Los Angeles and an MPA from the University of Southern California (USC). He also earned an AA in journalism from East Los Angeles College. In 2019, Gary received a 45 Year ICMA Service Award. He continues to work as a part-time Circuit Judge for six rural Oregon cities.



Fort Jones is in the Scott Valley area of Siskiyou County. The town is registered as a California Historical Landmark. Somewhere around 1850 the town was named Scottsburg. It became Scottsville and in 1852 people

began calling it Wheelock, in honor of a local merchant. A post office was established in 1854 with the town name Ottitiewa, the Indian name for the Scott River. Local residents successfully petitioned the postal service to change the town's name to Fort Jones in 1860. The town was incorporated in March 1872. The 2020 population is set at 695. Cherje Stephen is the Fort Jones Town Administrator and Jessie Monday is the Town Clerk.


Fort Jones Town Administrator Cherie Stephen worked as a private sector auditor starting in 1988. In June 1998, Cherie joined the city staff in Bakersfield as an Accounting Clerk. She also worked with the Etna Post Office in 2020-2024 before she was hired as the Interim Administrator for Fort Jones in November 2023. Cherie was appointed to the full-time Town Administrator position starting in August 2024. Cherie is an Arcadia High School graduate and further studied accounting and business administration at Bakersfield College and Santa Barbara Business College.

Originally named "Slide," short for "Slide Hill," in 1874, <u>Fortuna</u> is a Humboldt County city on the northeasterly shore of the Eel River. The town's name was changed to Springville during the

construction of the Springville Lumber Mill in 1875. A post office was established by the late 1870 with the town name of Springville. Because there was another Springville in the state, the post office chose the name "Slide" in May 1876. In 1884, town residents supported a name change to Fortuna, Spanish for "fortune" and Latin for "chance." Fortuna was incorporated in January 1906. Amy Nilsen is the city manager, and Siana Emmons is the City Clerk and Human Resources Manager. Aaron Felmlee is the Finance Director, and Brendan Byrd is the City Engineer and Director of Public Works. Shari **Meads** is the Community Development Director, and Casey Day is the Chief of Police. Heather Leigh **Stevens** is the Director of Parks and Recreation.



Nadean and Bob Dickey continue to explore the world. Bob retired as the <u>South Gate</u> Public Works Director.

Amy Nilsen became the <u>Fortuna</u> city manager on March 18, 2025. Amy is a former Humboldt County Administrative Officer (CAO). She resigned her county CAO position in May 2021 and she originally signed an employment agreement with the City of <u>Fortuna</u> to serve as the Interim City Manager.

Former City Engineer and Director of Public Works, Merritt Perry, served as the <u>Fortuna</u> city manager from December 2018 after working the Director position from July 2014 to 2018. Merritt worked in the private sector starting in 2003. He earned a BS in environmental engineering from Humboldt State University. He is the new Arcata city manager.

An item in the archives tells us that **Robert M. Davis** served as the <u>Fortuna</u> city manager beginning in September 1977. Prior to joining the <u>Fortuna</u> city staff, Bob worked for the County of Humboldt (1975-1977), City of <u>Anaheim</u> (December 1957-October 1975), and Midland, Texas (1955-1957). Bob retired from <u>Fortuna</u> after 10 years there, and moved with his family to Reno, Nevada. Bob passed away in 2016. He was born in Kansas City, Missouri and served in the U. S. Army Air Corp following his high school graduation. He became a 2nd Lieutenant Bombardier and flew 59 missions. Bob earned a BA from the University of Missouri and an MPA from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA)

Fountain Valley is an Orange County community. The area was known as Talbert or Gospel Swamp. Thomas B. Talbert travelled to California from Illinois in 1878. The area had many farms growing beets that were processed at the

nation's largest plants in Huntington Beach (Holly Sugar Plant). A post office was established in 1899 with the name "Talbert." The city was incorporated in June 1957 with the name "Fountain Valley" referring to the area's high water table and local artesian wells. The community's 2020 population is 57,047. Maggie Le is the Fountain Valley city manager, and Rick Miller is the City Clerk. Ryan Smith is the Finance Director, and Rob Frizzelle is the Community Services Director. Matt Sheppard is the Chief of Police.





Fountain Valley City Manager Maggie Le-Nguyen has served in the position since June 2022. Maggie originally joined the Fountain Valley city staff in December 2015 as Assistant to the City Manager.

Maggie began her public service career in 2001 as a Management Analyst for the City of <u>Brea</u>. In 2008, she took an Administrative Analyst position with <u>Buena Park</u>. In November 2010, Maggie joined the <u>Placentia</u> city staff as a Management Analyst, and in March 2015 she took the Economic Development Manager post in the City of <u>Chino</u>. Maggie earned a BA from California State Polytechnic, Pomona, and an MPA from California State University, Fullerton.

Robert Hall served as the Fountain Valley city manager from 2013 to 2017. Bob was Assistant City Manager of Huntington Beach (2005 to 2013), General Manager of the Rancho Santa Fe Homeowners Association (2017), and Interim City Manager of Stanton (2018) and Laguna Niguel (2019). He also served as the General Services Director of Riverside, where he worked from 2000 to 2005. Bob passed away at 64 in July 2024.

Other former Fountain Valley city managers include: Judy L. Kelsey; Robert J. Houston; and Raul Godinez II. Prior to joining Fountain Valley in May 1984, Judy worked assignments in San Diego; San Dimas; Coventry, English; Los Angeles Police Department; Newport Beach; Westminster; Eureka; and Sunnyvale. She served as the Eureka city manager in 1978-1980. Judy earned a BS and MPA from the University of Southern California (USC).

Raymond H. Kromer served as the <u>Fountain Valley</u> city manager from October 1990 until he retired in December 2012. Ray worked in Pennsylvania and New Jersey local governments before coming to Fountain Valley. In 2011, Ray received a 35 Year ICMA Service Award.



California Managers in Cities from **Fontana to Fowler**



Fowler, formerly Fowler's Switch, is a Fresno County city. It is primarily an agricultural community with grape vineyards and farmland. Fowler's first post office was opened in 1882. The city is named

for an 1870s California State Senator named **Thomas** Fowler. Fowler was incorporated in June 1908, and its 2020 population is reported at 6,700. Fowler Assistant City Manager **Thomas Gaffery** has been serving as Interim City Manager. Angela Vasquez is the City Clerk, and Margarita Moreno is the Finance Director.

Thomas Gaffery began his working career in 2002 as a member of the staff for California State University, Fresno. After more than 14 years, Tom left Fresno State to work as the Director of Parking & Transportation for California State University, San Bernardino. In 2017-2018, Tom worked as a parking consultant for Texas A&M University, San Antonio (2017-2018). After working for the City of Fresno a little more than 3 years, Tom joined the Fowler city staff as Community & Economic Development Director in April 2021. He was the Assistant City Manager from July 2023 to July 2024. He was appointed Interim City Manager in July 2024. Tom earned a BA in economics and an MBA from California State University, Fresno.

La Palma city manager Conal McNamara is the new city of Whittier city manager, replacing City Manager Brian Saeki, who has accepted the City Administrator position with the City of <u>Vernon</u>. Conal is a former <u>Whittier</u> Community Development Director, who has been serving as the La Palma city manager since 2020. Conal earned a BA from the University of California, Irvine, and an MPA from California State University, Northridge. California City has a new city manager. <u>Livingston</u> City Manager Christopher Lopez has been hired to serve as city manager for California City. He is the 8th California City manager in the past three years. Christopher was appointed Interim City Manager in <u>Livingston</u> in February 2023. Steve L. McClary is leaving the Malibu city manager position after reaching a mutual agreement with the city. According to a press release, Steve was hired as interim city manager on April 29, 2021. the city manager for the city of <u>Ojai</u> where he resigned for personal reasons in 2019. He worked as an Assistant City Manager in <u>Camarillo</u>, and he started his career in local government in <u>Fillmore</u> in 1997. Steve earned a BA in communications from Pacific Lutheran University. In 2024 he received a 20 Year ICMA Service Award. Steve has been out of the office for personal reasons since Thanksgiving. Assistant City Manager **Joseph Toney** has

served as Acting City Manager. Ontario Assistant City Manager Darlene Sanchez worked for the City of Monrovia and the City of Glendale before joining the Ontario city staff as Assistant City Manager in September 2020. Darlene served as an Intern in the city of Walnut from November



2000 until April 2002. She was a Senior Project Manager for Monrovia, and after more than 10 years there she took a job with the city of Glendale. Darlene rose to Assistant Community Development Director prior to leaving for Ontario. More Pieces Picked Up: Yuba City has a new Interim City Manager. Robert Bendorf will work with city manager Diana Langley before Diana leaves at the end of March.

Robert has been serving as the County Administrator for Yuba County for the past 14 years. Robert began his public service career with the Yuba County Sheriff's Department in 1986. He joined the County Administrator's office in 2000. He is a member of the Board for the Yuba-Sutter-Colusa United Way. Sausalito City Council members called off a recent meeting after what City Manager Chris Zapata called a "blunt force" hacking attempt on the city computer system. Chris reports that more than 190,000 attempts to compromise staff password access were detected in under 24 hours. Sausalito city staff and technology contractor Marin IT continue to assess the scope of the hacking and potential for future such occurrences. Fremont elevated Assistant City Manager Karena Shackelford to be Fremont's ninth City Manager starting in October 2021. Karena succeeded City Manager Fred Diaz, who retired. Karena worked as an Administrative Officer for the City of <u>San Jose</u> from 1999 to 2006. She joined the city staff in Fremont in Business Manager in March 2006. She rose to Assistant City Manager with Fred in September 2018. Karena earned a BA from San Jose State University and an MBA from Saint Mary's College of California. She received a 20 Year ICMA Service Award in 2018. Since January, Leyne Milstein has served as the Interim City Manager for the City of Sacramento. Leyne served as Assistant City Manager starting in 2017. She is the first woman to serve as the Sacramento Interim City Manager. After working for the State of California with the Department of Finance and the State Public Works Board, she joined the City of Sacramento staff. She served as the city Finance Director from 2008 until 2017. Leyne earned a BA from the University of California, Davis and an MPA from California State University, East Bay. Pasadena City Council Member Rick Cole served as the city manager in Santa Monica (June 2015-April 2020), Ventura (April 2004-September 2012) and the City of Azusa (June 1998-April 2004). Rick currently serves as an Assistant Professor for Occidental College, and as an Adjunct Professor for Pepperdine University, School of Public Policy. In addition to rejoining the Pasadena City



Council, Rick works as Chief Deputy Controller for the City of <u>Los Angeles</u>. Former City Manager Stephen "**Steve" G.
