City Managers in this issue include Acting City Manager James Lindsay in Lodi, T. Jarb Thaipeir in Loma Linda, Andrew Vialpando in Lomita, Dean Albro in Lompoc, and Tom Modica in Long Beach. We apologize to former Livermore city manager Linda Barton, for a substandard write up in the October issue. Linda served as the President of the League City Managers' Department in 2010-2011. <u>Lodi</u> is among the few California cities that immediately brings a song to mind. Located in the San Joaquin Valley, the "breadbasket of the world," the community grew up around a local school

established in 1859 and the Central Pacific Railroad coming to town in 1869. The community was initially named Mokelumne and/or Mokelumne Station for the nearby Mokelumne River. Among the "guesses" of how the city got its name is that Lodi is a city in northern Italy. More than likely, some of the earliest settlers were from Lodi, Illinois, named for that Italian town. The city of Lodi, California incorporated in December 1906. Its 2020 population is 66,348. James Lindsay, retired Saratoga city manager, is the Acting Lodi city manager, and Olivia Nashed is the City Clerk.

James Lindsay served as the City of <u>Saratoga</u> city manager for more than a decade; from July 2014 to July 2024. He had joined the <u>Saratoga</u> city staff in October 2011 as the Community Development Director. Jim began his began his public service career in April 2000 with the City of <u>Milpitas</u>. He was the Permit Center Manager and in July 2003 Jim became the Planning Manager. After short tenures with KB Home and the Metropolitan Planning Group, Jim was hired as the Planning & Neighborhood Services Director in October 2007. After retiring from <u>Saratoga</u>, Jim founded the Sierra View Partners in <u>Auburn</u>. He earned a BA from San Jose State University.

Former <u>Lodi</u> city manager **Scott R. Carney** was removed from the city manager position in October 2025, six months after he was placed on paid administrative leave. Most of Scott's experience was at the State level, though he served as the Deputy City Manager in Stockton from 2014 to 2020. Lodi was his only city manager job.

## California Managers in Cities from Lodi to Long Beach

Henry "Hank" Glaves, Jr. served as the Lodi city manager for 28 years. Hank passed away in July 2001 at the age of 79. He died after a year-long battle with cancer. Hank became city manager in 1957. He came to work for the city in April 1952 to serve as administrative assistant and city clerk to then-city manager Doug Weller. Hank retired as Lodi city manager in March 1985 at the age of 63. Han served as President of the City Managers' Department of the League of California Cities in 1976-1977. He was an alumnus of the University of Southern California (USC).

Tom Peterson succeeded Hank Glaves as Lodi city manager. Tom began his working career as a city hall reporter in San Diego County. He served as the Lodi Assistant City Manager from 1964 to 1973, and he worked as the City Manager from 1985 until 1995. Tom passed away in May 2015 at the age of 81. Tom was a veteran of the U.S. Navy. He left Lodi in 1973 to be the Woodland city manager but returned to Lodi 1985 when city manager Hank Glaves retired. He was inducted into the Lodi Community Hall of Fame in 2011. Tom was born and raised in New Jersey. He earned a BA in journalism from the University of California, Berkeley.



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Loma Linda began as a failed attempt to build point of interest tourists' attractions that were repurposed to provide successful convalescent home facilities and a health resort. In February 1906,

The Loma Linda College of Evangelists was established. That institution is now the Loma Linda University. Loma Linda is in the southern San Bernardino Valley. The southern third of the city is known as South Hills. The city was incorporated in September 1970. The city manager is **T. Jarb Thaipejr** and **Lynette Arreola** is the City Clerk. **Lorena Matarrita** is the Community Development Director and **Sonia Fabela** is the Loma Linda Finance Director. The Fire Chief is **Dan Harker**.

Loma Linda City Manager **T. Jarb Thaipejr** was the Public Works Director for the city prior to his appointment to succeed city manager **Dennis Halloway** in May 2009. Jarb took over the position on July 3, 2009. He joined the Loma Linda city staff in 2001. He is a native of Thailand. Jarb earned a BS in civil engineering from Iowa State University and an MBA from the University of Redlands. He worked as a civil engineer for the city of <u>San Bernardino</u> for 7 years before joining the <u>Loma Linda</u> city staff.

In August 1954, armed with a BS from Emporia Kansas State University, Robert R. Mitchell became the Assistant to the City Manager in Ferguson, Missouri. Bob later earned his MPA from the University of Kansas. He worked in Hollidaysburg, and Sharpsville, Pennsylvania, and in May 1963 Bob was appointed City Manager in Webster City, Iowa. He moved to California as a Municipal Finance Analyst in Beverly Hills, and in September 1965, Bob was appointed to the Coachella City Manager position. In November 1968 he became the City Manager in Duarte, where he served until June 1975 when he was appointed City Manager in Baldwin Park. He served as the Acting City Manager in Norco in May 1976. After acting as a Public Policy and Administration college instructor for a time, Bob was appointed City Manager in Loma Linda in March 1977, a position he held for 14-years. He was the Executive Director for the Inland Valley Redevelopment Agency for a year starting in March 1991. Bob received a 35-year ICMA Service Award. Bob lived in Temecula before his passing in May 2015, from a decade fight with Parkinson's disease. He was 86 years old. He was born in July 1928. Bob was a proven professional city manager.

What is now <u>Lomita</u> was part of the Spanish Empire and in 1767 a part of the Province of the California's. The name "Lomita" is Spanish for "Little hill". Lomita grew as an unincorporated

section of Los Angeles County, and in June 1964 the city incorporated to prevent annexations by adjoining cities. **Andrew Vialpando** is the city manager and **Lina Hernandez** is the Deputy City Manager and Public Works Director. **Deborah Dixon** is the Human Resources & Risk Manager, and **Adrian Fernandez** is the Economic Development Director.

Andrew Vialpando began his Lomita city manager tenure in May 2024. Andrew previously served as the Assistant City Manager for the City of Paramount since January 2020. On his way to Paramount and Lomita, Andy served on the Long

<u>Beach</u> city managers staff, as an Administrative Analyst for <u>La Mirada</u> and with the cities of <u>Santa Barbara</u> and <u>Santa Fe Springs</u>. In Lomita he followed City Manager **Ryan Smoot**, who left <u>Lomita</u> to be the city manager for the City of <u>Bellflower</u>. Andy earned a BA in political science from the University of California, Santa Barbara and an MPA from California State University, Fullerton.

Ryan Smoot served as the Lomita city manager from June 2017 to April 2023, and then followed retiring City Manager Jeff Stewart to be the city manager for the city of Bellflower. Ryan earned a BA from the California State University, Long Beach. Following Ryan's departure to Bellflower, Joe Hoefgen was retained as the Interim City Manager. Michael Rock, the current city manager of the city of lone, served as Lomita city manager from June 2012 until July 2015. Walker J. Ritter served as the Lomita city manager for 14 years. He retired in February 1996. The late Keene Wilson succeeded Walker in August 1996, coming to Lomita after serving as Bradbury city manager.

Lompoc is where retired Pomona city manager **Doug Dunlap** calls home. After a notable career in public management, Doug returned to the community where he was a high school football star.

Lompoc is a Santa Barbara County city that is often considered a military town because it is near to Vandenberg Space Force Base. At the southern edge of the city is the site of the original Mission La Purisima that was established in 1787. After an earthquake destroyed the mission in 1812, it was rebuilt about a mile outside of the Lompoc city limits. The coastal branch of the Southern Pacific Railroad opened about 1900. During World War II, Lompoc was the site of Camp Cooke, a United State Army training camp. In 1958 the United State Air Force established an intercontinental ballistic missile base at the former Camp Cooke. The Space Shuttle program cancelled its plans for a Lompoc facility following the Challenger explosion in 1986. The city was incorporated in August 1888. The 2020 population is 44,444. The current Lompoc city manager is **Dean Albroc**, a Lompoc High School graduate, and Stacey Haddon is the City Clerk. Brian Fallon is the Lompoc City Fire Chief. Christie **Alacon** in the Community Development Director. Christie Donnelly, a former resident of Colorado, is the Management Services Director and Finance Director.

**Dean Albroc** is the <u>Lompoc</u> city manager. He has lived in the city since junior high and is a graduate of Lompoc High School. Dean has worked for the city since 2012, joining the city staff as an accounting and revenue manager. Prior to his appointment to the city manager position in 2021, he worked several years as the Management Services Director. Before coming to work for the city, Dean serves 21 years in accounting for the Department of Justice, Bureau of Prisons in Lompoc. Dean earned a BS in accounting from the University of La Verne. Dean was sworn in as the <u>Lompoc</u> city manager on January 18, 2022. He followed City Manager **Jim Throop**, who resigned after working as city manager for three-years.

Christie Donnelly is the city of Lompoc Management Services Director and Finance Director and City Treasurer. She joined the city staff in August 2019 as the Accounting and Revenue Manager. Christie worked several positions in Colorado before coming to Lompoc. From August 2015 to October 2018, Christie was the Accounting Manager for the El Paso County Clerk and Recorder's Office in the Greater Colorado Springs Area. She earned a BA from the University of San Diego and an MS in accounting from Regis University.

**Jim Throop** joined the <u>Lompoc</u> city staff in July 2018 and left after three years to accept the appointment of the <u>Cupertino</u> city manager post. Jim earned a BA in economics from Paso Robles and an MBA from Chapman University. In 2020 he received a 20-years ICMA Service Award.

Patrick Wiemiller was the Lompoc city manager prior to Jim Throop. Pat resigned from the position in 2017, and Deputy City Manager Richard Morgan became the Interim City Manager until Jim assumed the position in December 2017. Pat worked as Assistant City Manager in Santa Maria after leaving Lompoc. He may be a candidate for Lompoc City Council.

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### California Managers in Cities from Lodi to Long Beach



Long Beach is the 7th most populous city in the United States, and also the second largest population in Los Angeles County. The land changed hands following Spanish American land

grants and acquisitions. Jotham Bixby is considered the "Father of Long Beach." He later established the Bixby Land Company. In the 1870s as many as 30,000 sheep grazed on the property and with sheared twice yearly to provide wool for trade. Eventually the Long Beach Land and Water Company bought the farm-land that extended to the long beach along the Pacific Ocean. The community's name became Long Beach. The town was incorporated in December 1897. Long Beach, as a port city, had a relationship with the U. S. Navy even before the war. Long Beach was part of the Battle of Los Angeles during World War II when observers for the United States Forces reported shells being fired from the ocean. Anti-aircraft batteries fired into the night, though no planes were ever sighted. Long Beach's population grew substantially during and after World War II, with needed workers being for manufacturing and G.I. Bill recipients seeking out homes. The first planes rolled out from Douglas Aircraft Company's Long Beach plant in December 1941. The 2020 population of the city is 466,742. Thomas "Tom" B. Modica is the city manager, April Walker is the Assistant City Manager and Teresa Chandler is the Deputy City Manager. Christopher Koontz is the Long Beach Community Development Director. Kevin Riper is the Director and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Financial Management. Wally Hebeish is the Chief of Police and Dennis Buchanan is the Fire Chief. Allison Whyte **King** is the Director of Health and Human Services.

Thomas "Tom" B. Modica is the Long Beach city manager starting in September 2019. Tom hails from Tucson, Arizona and began his public service career as a Research Assistant with the University of Arizona in 2000, and as an Intern for the City of Tucson,

Arizona (June 2001 – August 2001). He worked doing recreation programs and supervising other recreation employees. Tom was hired by Long Beach as a Management Assistant in July 2002 and began his rise in the city organization. He was promoted to Special Assistant to the City Manager in July 2003; Manager of Public/Government Affairs in January 2005; Deputy City Manager in October 2013; and Assistant City Manager in November 2014. Tom was appointed Acting City Manager when City Manager Pat West retired in September 2019, and he became City Manager in April 2020. Tom earned a BA from the University of Karlsruhe, and a BA and MPA from the University of Arizona. In 2019 he received a 10 Year ICMA Service Award. Tom's wife Stefanie volunteers at the Long Beach animal shelter.

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Retired Long Beach and Paramount City Manager Pat West joined the Los Angeles-based public affairs firm Englander Knabe & Allen (EKA) as a Joint Venture Partner in August 2025. 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### California Managers in Cities from Lodi to Long Beach

Long Beach former city managers start with **Charles** E. Hewes from July 1921 until November 1922. Charles H. Windham was No. 2, starting in December 1922 and serving until March 1926. Charles Henderson served as city manager for a short time (March 1926-July 1927) before Henry Callahan took the office from July 1927 to 1928. Then it was G.L. Buck (January 1929-July 1930), C.C. Lewis (1930-1931), E. S. Dobbin (1932-1933), and R. M. **Dorton** (1934-1939). **J.W. Charleville** took the job in 1939 to 1940, when Carl Erickson became city manager (1941-1942). Herbert C. Legg was city manager in 1943, and Samuel E. Vickers took the job from 1944 and 1945, when Carl Wirsching stepped in from 1946 to 1948, and Samuel returned to the city manager's office from 1949 to 1960. Sam served as city manager through all of the 1950s and then John R. Mansell served throughout the 1960s (1961-1976). John was followed by **John Dever** 1977-986), James C. Hankla (1987-1998), Henry Taboada (1999-2002), and **Gerald Miller** (2003-2006).





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**Samuel Vickers** served about 14 years as the <u>Long Beach</u> city manager. Sam was the President of the City Manager's Department of the League of California Cities in 1949, and he served as President of ICMA in 1956. Prior to coming to <u>Long Beach</u>, Sam was the city manager of <u>Vallejo</u> for four years. He resigned his <u>Long Beach</u> city manager position in 1961. Sam was the city manager of <u>Vallejo</u> for four years. After leaving <u>Long Beach</u>, he worked as a consultant and Interim City Manager in various cities including <u>Beverly Hills</u>, <u>Newport Beach</u> and <u>Rialto</u>. Sam is remembered for his work on the tidelands oil revenue dispute with the State. He passed away on April 22, 2004, at the age of 88.



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

John R. Mansell was appointed to succeed City Manager Sam Vickers, and he held the position for the next 15 years. When John passed away in 2004, a Long Beach Press-Telegram article contended that John was an excellent negotiator, talented orator, and mathematical whiz. He was the elected City Auditor for 10 years prior to being city manager. John E. Dever followed John as city manager and served there from 1978 to 1987. He is credited with mentoring women in the public service. Jim Hankla, who has come to a "Proof of Life" lunch with John Shirey, was city manager from 1987 to 1998. Jerry "Gerald" Miller passed away at the age of 75 in July

2024. He was beloved by many throughout the community. **Pat West** succeeded Jerry in 2007 and served through 2018. He developed a highly professional reputation among area city managers and throughout the State.

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Picking Up the Pieces: Former Anaheim a (2011-2013) City Manager Bob Wingenroth, currently the city manager for the City of Surprise, Arizona, is returning to California to be the next city manager for the city of Laguna Hills. Bob earned a BS in accounting and an MBA from Arizona State University. Jennifer Ott is scheduled to be appointed to be the

next city manager for the city of Hayward. Jennifer joined the Hayward city staff in September 2018 as Deputy City Manager, and she was promoted to Assistant City Manager. In 2022 she left Hayward to serve as the Alameda city manager. She will become Hayward city manager on December 8, 2025. Jennifer earned a BA in history and Spanish from the University of California, Davis and an MPP from the University of California, Berkeley. Members of the Oakley city council have addressed allegations that Council Member George Fuller, who is accused of "bullying and retaliatory actions" against members of the city staff. An independent third-party investigation into the accusations was conducted. Josh McMurray was appointed Oakley city manager in November 2021. Assistant City Manager Danielle Navarro underlined that city staff would not comment on the matter. Former Lodi City Administrator Jerry Glenn passed away last month at his Long Beach home. Jerry joined the Lodi city staff in 1973 to serve as Assistant City Manager, a position he held for 22 years before he was appointed Galt City Manager (1996-1999). Jerry served in the U.S. Navy and graduated from the U.S. Naval Officer Candidate School in Newport, Rhode Island. Jerry was 90 years old when he suffered a stroke on September 12, 2025. Steven Ramos was appointed General Manager for the McCloud Community Services District (CSD) in October 2024. He works with a staff that includes, among others, Sherry Smith, Finance Officer; Eli Jones, Public Works Superintendent; and Rachel Mattson, District Secretary. **Steve Pinkerton** is the City Manager for the City of Mountain House in the San Joaquin County. Mountain House was incorporated in July 2024. In November 1994, the San Joaquin County Board of Supervisors officially approved the community of Mountain House, and in 1996 the community's master plan was approved. Mountain View is on the foothills of Diablo Range and close to the Altamont Pass. Mountain House is Steve's third city manager job. He previously worked as city manager for the cities of Davis (2011-2014) and Manteca (2008-2011). Due in part by its small population of just 208 residents, Vernon is the most burglarized city in California. In 2023, the city reported 110 burglaries, meaning that more than half of its residents were affected by a burglary. Statistically, the city had a burglary rate of 52.88 per 100 people. The next closest city on the list is Sauget, Illinois with a burglary rate of 7.58 per 100 people. **Brian** Saeki is the Vernon City Administrator. Brian previously worked for the Cities of Whittier, Covina and San Fernando.

Former Petaluma City Manager John Scharer passed away on September 7 at the age of 90. John was the Petaluma city manager from 1981 through 1996. He was born, John Louis Scharer, on December 29, 1934, in Susanville. He grew up in Healdsburg. He served in the United States Air Force for four years starting in 1953. He was a radio operator in Germany during that service. John earned an AA from Santa Rosa Junior College and a BS from Golden Gate University. He joined the Petaluma city staff in 1961 as an accountant in the Water Department. John was a sports fan and enjoyed cheering on the Giants, Warriors and 49ers. Lodi city council members and City Manager Scott R. Carney have parted ways. Scott was put on administrative leave in April and the Council is pursuing termination action. Scott was hired to serve as city manager in Lodi in June 2024. He previously worked as a Deputy Director for Administration with the California Department of Health Care Services (July 2021 – June 2024). Scott publicly alleged widespread misuse of city funds and he accused city staff of misconduct. Scott earned a BA from the University of California, Davis, a Master of Social Welfare, Management and Planning from the University of California, Berkeley. Scott also earned a Doctor of Education from the University of the Pacific. James Lindsay has worked as Acting City Manager since May 2025. Kristin Aguila is the new Senior Assistant City Manager for the City of Cerritos. She will be working with City Manager Robert A. Lopez. Kristin joined the Cerritos city staff in 2005 as a Planning Intern. She worked her way up and was appointed Director of Community Development in January 2022. Kristin earned a BS from California State Polytechnic University and an MPA from California State University, Fullerton.

More Pieces Picked Up: Concord City Manager Valerie Barone will retire at the end of the fiscal year. She has served more than three decades for public service. Valerie served as a Community Development Specialist for the U.S. Peace Corps in Nagpana, Panay Island, Philippines in May 1987 to October 1989. She joined the city of Milpitas staff in July 1995, where she worked as the Planning, Recreation &

Neighborhood Services Director. In June 2002, she began her tenure as the Community Development Director for the City of Walnut Creek. Valerie was hired to be the Concord city manager starting in February 2012 in an "Interim" capacity, and she became city manager two months later. Valerie earned a BS from California State University, Humboldt and a Masters, Administration and Management from California State University, Sacramento, Rancho Santa Margarita, incorporated in January 2000, where Jennifer M. Cervantez is city manager. Jennifer was appointed city manager in May 2012 and started her new job on July 9. She replaced retiring city manager Steve Hayman. Prior to joining Rancho Santa Margarita, Jennifer worked as the Assistant City Manager for the City of La Habra. She also previously worked with Santa Ana and the League of California Cities staff. Jennifer graduated from Santa Ana High School, and she earned a BA from California State University, Long Beach and an MPP from Claremont University. She is married and has two daughters. Officials of the City of Fullerton filed a complaint with the California Attorney General's Office, raising serious concerns about possible anti-competitive practices in the fire apparatus manufacturing industry. The complaint centers on escalating prices, extended delivery timelines, and restrictive contract terms. Fullerton reports experiencing unprecedented price increases of up to 75% for pumper engines over the past decade and more than 40% for aerial trucks in just the past few years. Additionally, delivery timelines now exceed four years, requiring cities to rely on aging vehicles beyond national safety standards. Kim Chaudhry is the Senior Administrative Officer Analyst familiar with the issues.
