Named for former railroad director **Lathrop M. Tracy**, the City of Tracy was incorporated in July, 1911. The city is located in San Joaquin County, and has a 2019 estimated population of 94,740. **Jennifer D. Haruyama** is the City Manager, and **Adrianne Richardson** is the City Clerk.



Jennifer D. Haruyama began her public service career in 1991 as a Public Services Assistant for the City of Milpitas. She spent the 2-years between 1995 and 1997 with Management Internships in the Cities of

Mountain View, San Leandro, and Milpitas. In 1997, Jennifer was hired as a Management Analyst in the City of Rancho Cucamonga. In 2001 she was hired as the Assistant to the Town Manager in Los Gatos. In 2008 Jennifer became the Assistant Budget and Finance Director for Los Gatos. After a total of 11-years there, she moved to Tracy as the Administrative Services Director in August, 2012. In December, 2014, Jenny became the Assistant City Manager in the City of Livermore, and she moved from there in May, 2016 when she was appointed City Manager in Scotts Valley. She was hired as the City Manager in Tracy in May, 2019. Jennifer served as a Member of the Board for the Monterey Bay Area Self Insurance Authority (MBASIA) from July, 2016 to May, 2019. She also served as a Board Member for the Santa Cruz Public Library JPA, from July, 2016 to May, 2019. Jennifer earned a BS from San Jose State University, and an MPA from California State University, East Bay. She also attended the California Local Governance Summer Institute at Stanford University.

During the American Civil War, from July to October, 1863, California volunteers fighting the local Indians in the Bald Hills War were stationed in Trinidad. The seaside town of Trinidad was incorporated in 1870. The 2019 estimated population of Trinidad is 355. Former Paramount Mayor and Council Member **Ted Mosier** bought property in Trinidad. **Eli Naffah** is the Trinidad City Manager and **Gabriel Adams** is the City Clerk. Due to the small size of the Trinidad city organization, the City Manager and City Clerk are responsible for multiple functions. It is noted that three of the five members of the Planning Commission are women: **Diane Stockness**, **Kathleen Lake**, and **Cheryl Kelly**.

Truckee began in 1863 as Gray's Station, named for Joseph Gray's Roadhouse on the Trans-Sierra wagon trail. The name comes from the Paiute Indian name "Tro-kay." Truckee incorporated in March, 1993. Truckee is a Nevada County city. The 2019 estimated population of the community is 16,735. In 1846 the Donner Party, consisting of 89 men, women and children followed a branch of the Emigrant trail to the Truckee area in order to attempt a crossing of Donner Pass. The Donner party spent the winter of 1846-1847 snowbound in the Sierra Nevada Mountain near Truckee. **Jeff Loux** is the Truckee Town Manager and **Judy Price** is Town Clerk.



Kim Szczurek is the Administrative Services Director in the Town of Truckee. She is the primary financial advisor to the Town Manager. Kim earned a BA from the University of the Pacific in Stockton. Kim is a Certified

Public Accountant. She has a broad experience in local government, including assignments in human resources, risk management, finance accounting and information technology. In addition to her service with the Town of Truckee, Kim serves as the Area 1 Trustee on the Board for the Tahoe Truckee Unified School District. Kim is currently the Board President.

Great Lakes. Tulare flourished as the headquarters of the railroads in the area. When the railroad moved its headquarters to Bakersfield in 1891, it had a devastating affect on the community. Tulare incorporated in April, 1888. The city's 2019 estimated population is 65,496. Land O'Lakes is Tulare's largest employer. **Rob A. Hunt** is the City Manager, **Josh McDonnell** is the Deputy City Manager, and **Roxanne Yoder** is the Chief Deputy City Clerk.



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Roxanne Diaz, Steven L. Flower, Peter M. Thorson, Kevin Ennis, Gregory W. Stepanicich, Serita Young and **Craig Steele** are among the City Attorneys on the **RWG** staff.

Others serving the city include: **Heidi Cureton**; **Lizbeth Cisneros**; **Tricia Plass**; and **Teena Salazar**.

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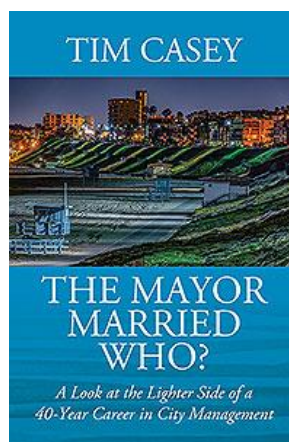

Founded in December, 1871, by grain farmer **John William Mitchell**, Turlock was not incorporated until February, 1908. Turlock became known as the "Heart of the Valley" due to its agricultural production. The city experienced extensive residential and commercial growth in the 1980s. The 2019 estimated population of Turlock is 73,631. **Toby Wells**, a former Ceres City Manager, is the Turlock City Manager, and **Jennifer Land** is the City Clerk.

Sarah Eddy is the Human Resources Manager for the City of Turlock. Sarah joined the city is August, 1988 and has worked for Turlock for more than 32-years. Sarah earned a BS and an MBA from California State University, Stanislaus.

Maryn Pitt is the Turlock Assistant to the City Manager. In January 1977 Maryn went to work for the California Legislature as a member of the Legislative Staff. Picking Up the Pieces: Sausalito City Manager **Adam Politzer**, 55, will retire in late December, 2020. Adam has served as the Sausalito City Manager for the past 13-years, starting in 2007. Adam is not a member of ICMA. Adam's tenure in Sausalito is the longest as City Manager in the City's history. He began his public service career as a Recreation Leader in 1987 for

Palo Alto. He was promoted to Recreation Service Manager in 1995. He joined the Sausalito city staff as the Parks and Recreation Director in 2000. Longtime Torrance City Manager **LeRoy Jackson**, first came to work for the city in August, 1966 as a Personnel Analyst. That began LeRoy's rise in the city organization until he was appointed City Manager in 1983. He quietly retired this month during a virtual City Council meeting on Zoom. His 37-years as City Manager leaves him four-years shy of the State's record, an honor belonging to Lakewood's **Howard Chambers**, who served 41-years before his retirement in 2017. Former Torrance Assistant City Manager **Aram Chaparyan** has succeeded LeRoy as City Manager. Santa Clara Director of Communications **Lenka Wright** is the new Chief Communications Officer for the City of Mountain View beginning October 5. Lenka has previously worked as a TV anchor and reporter, and as a public relation officer for the City of San Jose. She earned a BA in telecommunications and political science from Indiana University and an MA in communication arts from New York Institute of Technology. In Mountain View, she will work closely with City Manager **Kimbra McCarthy**. A Black Lives Matter organization's mural painted on a public City of Martinez street in front of the Martinez Courthouse Building is scheduled to be paved over in early October as part of a larger downtown maintenance project. Martinez City Manager **Eric Figueroa** said that requests for permission to repaint the mural have been denied. **Brett Miller**, 55, is the new Hollister City Manager. Brett joined the Hollister city staff 12-years ago. He came to the city as the Accounting Manager before being promoted to Director of Management Services, and Assistant City Manager. Before coming to Hollister, Brett worked for the County of Butte as an Accounting Manager and Management Analyst.

was the Director of Public Works and Director of General Services in the City of Chula Vista. Born and raised in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Jack earned a BA in environmental studies from the Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania. Pittsburg City Manager **Daron Hall** has announced the appointment of **Dennis Reilly** as the new Fire Chief for the Pittsburg Fire Department. Dennis will replace Chief **Mike Simons**, who announced his retirement after 20-years with the department. Dennis has more than 44-years of experience in the fire service. Letter From Past ICMA President Roy Pederson:

You probably haven't heard from or about me for several years. That's good, I've been happily retired for 20 years and looking forward to several more before my chips get cashed in. But right now I'm very concerned about where ICMA is and where it's going. A piece by the E.D. that came out recently in email basically promotes what is called "critical race theory." Check it out. Fundamental to it is you are what you are due to what group you're in. If you're white, which I am, you are a racist. Maybe unconsciously, but yet a racist. If you're black you're morally a victim whether or not you know it. Thus, no due process is necessary to determine your culpability, since the evidence of your guilt is obvious. You're caught red handed by being white.

And this goes hand in hand with the notion of "systemic racism." This means, as I understand it, that the system is racist even if people in it are not necessarily racists. I've got to say here "wait a minute." I try my best to arrive at truth by being rational and finding facts. (Yes, I know one can't totally escape their biases but one can surely try.) Yet assertions of systemic racism are exactly that: assertions. Making an assertion is not equivalent to reasoning based on facts. I have not seen any effort to disclose the details that prove or even create suspicion that systemic racism is anything more than an assertion. I don't happen to believe it just because of the tone of someone who asserts it. I don't believe the sky is falling either.

As local government managers we have a fundamental duty to support law enforcement. Any kind of law enforcement? No, but if we are responsible for law enforcement, we should be improving it if it needs improving. The same applies to any other local government service we are responsible for. But calls to defund the police are not well founded. Most of us do not want to live in a place that doesn't have effective and responsible law enforcement. That's true of all Americans who simply want law and order.

These days our police are under attack. They are pretty good at defending themselves. But it seems to me that we, as their supervisors, should be expressing our support for sound and responsible policing. It also seems to me that our state associations and I.C.M.A. should be heard from as well. And I would also suggest that the I.C.M.A. Board of Directors should be having a wide discussion with its members before it buys in to a philosophy that looks a lot like what B.L.M. is promoting these days. It's myth, not reality.
