California Managers in Cities from La Verne to Lake Elsinore



It was the 1830s when European settlers came to the area that included the former cities of Pomona, Claremont, San Dimas, Glendora and La Verne. In the 1880s the Santa Fe Railroad ran a rail line across La Verne

towards Los Angeles. The town was named "Lordsburg" for the landowner who worked with the railroad to bring service to the area. The town was incorporated as "La Verne" in August 1906, when local grew field crops and citrus orchards. Following the end of World War II the citrus business slowly faded away. The 2020 population of La Verne is 31,334. Ken Domer is the City Manager, and the Deputy City Clerk is **Debra Fritz**. Eric Scherer is the Director of Community Development, and Yvonne **Duran** is the Director of Parks & Recreation, while **Danny Wu** is the Director of Public Works.



City Manager Ken Domer began his public service career in January 1991 working for the State of California in Sacramento. In September 1996, Ken joined the staff for the County of Orange, and after working various positions for the county, Ken was

appointed City Manager for the City of Villa Park in May 2005. He became Assistant City Administrator for Placentia in December 2008, and then joined the city staff in <u>Huntington Beach</u> as Assistant City Manager. In July 2017, Ken became city manager for the City of Fullerton. After leaving Fullerton in April 2021, he was hired to serve as Assistant City Manager for the City of Laguna Beach. Ken was selected to be the La Verne city manager starting in December 2022. Ken earned a BA and MPA from the University of Southern California (USC).



Yvonne Duran, Parks & Recreation Director, has been with La Verne for 8 years overseeing the Community Center operations and implementing new programs for young and elderly residents alike. She previously worked with the Pleasant Valley Recreation

and Park District in Camarillo. She earned a BS from California State University, Northridge.

In 2022, **Jesse Duff** became the Interim City Manager following **Bob Russi**'s retirement. Jesse, a longtime well-respected city manager, has more than 40 years of local government executive experience.

He retired as the <u>Duarte</u> city manager in 2004. After his retirement, Jesse served as Interim City Manager for <u>Claremont</u> and <u>Irwindale</u>, and as Interim Community Development Director in <u>Rosemead</u>. He joined the Tri-City Mental Health Authority in 2007 as Executive Director.

Robert "Bob" T. Russi retired after serving as <u>La Verne</u> city manager for more than 12 years. His last day with the city was August 19, 2022. Bob came <u>La Verne</u> in 2001as Assistant to the City Manager, **Marty Lomeli**. After being promoted to Assistant City Manager, Bob was appointed city manager when Marty retired in 2010. Bob began his public service career working for the City of <u>Walnut</u> starting in 1990.

Martin "Marty" Lomeli, born and raised in La Verne, was the La Verne City Manager for 23-years. He had been with the city since 1981 and served as city manager starting in 1987. Marty began his public service career as an Intern for the City of West Covina in September 1978. He joined the Rosemead city staff in December 1978 as an Administrative Assistant to city manager Frank G. Tripepi. In December 1979, Marty took and Administrative Analyst position with the San Luis Obispo, and he joined the city of La Verne staff as Assistant City Manager in January 1981.

California Managers in Cities from La Verne to Lake Elsinore



Lafayette, located in Contra Costa County, is named for Marquis de Lafayette, a French military officer of the American Revolutionary War. Most of the Lafayette area was a part of a Mexican land grant. European

settlement is generally thought to have begun with the arrival **Elam Brown** from St. Joseph, Missouri in 1846. The "Lafayette" post office was established in 1857, though the town's name was not official. Some called the community "Dog Town," Brown's Corner, Brown's Mill, and Alcalanus. In 1890 the name became the single word, "Lafayette" thanks to the U.S. Post Office. Lafayette was incorporated in July 1968. The Lafayette city manager is Niroop Kasthuri Srivatsa, and Joanne Robbins is City Clerk. Jonathan Katayanagi is the Director of Parks, Trails & Recreation. James Williams is Chief of Police, and Mike Moran is the Director of Engineering and Public Works.



City Manager Niroop Kasthuri Srivatsa worked as a Plannina Intern in September 1981 for the city of Wheaton, Illinois. After working in Naperville, Illinois, she was hired as the Planning Director for Lafayette starting in 1992. In

Niroop was promoted to Community Development Director. In 2001 she was made Planning & Building Services Director, and she served in that position for 17 years. Starting in 2016, she became active with the League of California Cities. In 2016-2017, she served as President of the League's Planning & Community Development Department. In January 2019, Niroop was selected to serve as the Lafayette Interim City Manager, and in August she was hired to serve as City Manager. She earned a BA in architecture from Anna University Chennai. She completed graduate courses in architecture and urban design at Washington University in St. Louis. For nearly 15 years between 2005 and 2020 she was a Doa Socializer and Trainer with the Tony La Russa Animal Rescue Foundation.

Laguna Beach is an Orange County Pacific Coast resort city. Laguna Beach was settled in the 1870s, and officially founded in 1887. Tourism is the primary community's economic activity with an estimated six

million people visiting annually. Large annual events include the Pageant of the Masters, Festival of Arts, Sawdust Art Festival Art-A-Fair, Bluewater Music Festival, and Kelpfest. The majority of Laguna Beach was one of the few parcels of coastal land in Southern California that was never was included in a Mexican land grant. The community in Laguna Canyon and around the main beach expanded during the 1880s. A post office was founded in 1887 under the name Lagona, but **Nicholas Isch**, the postmaster, in 1904, successfully petitioned for a name correction to Laguna Beach. The city was incorporated in June 1927. The 2020 population is 23.032.


Eiler Larsen, a Danish immigrant, became a <u>Laguna Beach</u> icon by happily greeting and waving at visitors to the city. From the 1940s to the early 1970s, Eiler greeting one and all with a friendly wave and "Hello." He became a symbol of <u>Laguna Beach</u>'s welcoming and artistic spirit.

Laguna Beach City Manager Dave Kiff works with two Assistant City Managers, Gavin Curran and Jeremy Frimond. The City Clerk is Ann Marie McKay. Mark McAvoy is the Director of Public Works and Utilities. Michelle Bannigan is the Director of Finance, and Alexis Braun is the Acting Director of Transit and Community Services. Jeff Calvert is the Laguna Beach Chief of Police, and the Fire Chief is Niko King. The Director of Human Resources and Risk Management is Aggie Nesh. Laura Parisi is the City Treasurer and Matthew Schneider is the Director of Community Development. Sandy Groves is a former Assistant City Manager starting in July 1995. Ken Frank, with the city 31 years, was city manager starting in 1979, retiring in 2010.

Sanford M. Groves began his public service career as an Administrative Assistant for the city of La Mirada from October 1967 to June 1968. He joined the <u>Garden Grove</u> city staff in August 1973 as an Administrative Assistant and worked his way up in the organization. Sandy was the Staff Assistant to the City Manager from June 1977 to March 1978. He left Garden Grove to work with the ICMA staff in Washington D.C. from 1978 to 1981. 
Laguna Niguel emerged following a number of large property transactions starting with an 1842 land grant. With the 1959 completion of Interstate 5, roadway access was improved to Los

Angeles and Orange County job centers, improving residential demand. The <u>Laguna Niguel</u> Corporation developed one of California's first master planned communities. The city incorporated in December 1989, after discussions and consideration of joining with <u>Dana Point</u> as one city. The 2020 population of <u>Laguna Niguel</u> is 64,355. The city manager is veteran public manager **Tamara Letourneau**, and **Justin J. Martin** is Assistant City Manager. **Marissa Asistin** is City Clerk, and the Assistant to the City Manager is **Kevin O'Connor. Trevor Agrelius** is the Finance Director and **Heidi Lee** is the Finance Manager. **Jonathon Harmon** is the Parks and Recreation Director, and **Jonathan Orduna** is the Community Development Director.



Laguna Niguel City Manager Tamara Letourneau began her public management career in 1989 with the Monrovia City Clerk. In September 1993 she became an Administrative Aide for Arcadia. She went to Claremont

in 1995 with City Manager Glenn Southard. She was the Assistant to the City Manager when she was appointed Sierra Madre city manager in 2001. In 2004 she became the Yorba Linda city manager, serving there until 2008 when she became a Senior Manager for a consulting firm. In February 2014, Tammy was hired to serve as the Assistant City Manager for Costa Mesa. In August 2019, she was selected to be the city manager for the City of Laguna Niguel, where she has served for a little more than 6 years. Tamara was the MMASC President in 1997-1998, a Co-Chair of Women Leading Government, 2008-2017. In 2020 she received a 25 Year ICMA Service Award. Laguna Woods' genesis was the 1962 Moulton Ranch land purchase by developer **Ross Cortese**, who previously helped develop Rossmoor and Leisure World in <u>Seal Beach</u>. His goal was to create a second Leisure World

community. He was successful when in 1964 his Leisure World Laguna Hills project got its first residents. About ninety percent of the city consists of Laguna Woods Village, a private gated retirement community, formerly known as Leisure World. The other ten percent of the city consists of businesses, some homes and the city hall, which are all accessible to the public. The city officially was incorporated in March 1999. Its 2020 population is 17,644. The city is located within the Capistrano Unified School District and the Saddleback Valley Unified School District. Laguna Woods water is supplied by the Moulton Niguel Water District. Doris Jackson, a Laguna Woods resident, designed the Laguna Woods city seal, which was refined by Greg Smith and Associates.

Following City Manager **Leslie Keane** stepping down in 2013, **Christopher Macon**, at age 27, was appointed <u>Laguna Woods</u> city manager in August 2013, following his work as Interim City Manager. Chris earned a BA in organizational management from the University of La Verne and an MPP from California State University, Northridge.

Jeffrey Parker, who is currently working with a cutting-edge leadership development company, served as Walnut city manager from 1995 to 2005, before he was appointed Claremont city manager in December 2005. Jeff moved to the Tustin city manager position in January 2012, where he worked for more than 10 years. He was hired as the Laguna Woods Village CEO and President starting in February 2019. Jeff earned a BA from the University of California, Santa Barbara, and an MPA from California State University, Long Beach.

Laguna Woods first city manager was Leslie Keane starting at incorporation in March 1999. She served Laguna Woods for nearly 15 years, retiring in October 2013. After leaving the city, Leslie served as the Interim City Clerk for the City of Moreno Valley from March to June 2016. She kept active in a number of volunteer positions and still serves as a volunteer schedule coordination for the Heritage Park Friends of the Library. Leslie spent a year from April 2024 to April 2025 as the Newsletter Editor and Vice President for the South Orange County Exchange Club. She is a past Trustee and President of the Orange County Cemetery District. Leslie has also worked with the CSDA Finance Corporation, and the Independent Special Districts of Orange County, Leslie earned a BA in journalist and political science from San Diego State University and an MBA from the University of Redlands. She also completed Certificate programs a USC, UC Riverside and UC Irvine.

California Managers in Cities from La Verne to Lake Elsinore



Lake Elsinore is a Riverside County city that was established in 1888. The city is on the shore of Lake

Elsinore, 3,000 acres natural freshwater lake. It is the largest natural lake in Southern California. It was discovered by the Spanish Franciscan padre Juan Santiago while he explored eastward from the Mission San Juan Capistrano in 1797. The small community became a regular stop on the Butterfield Overland Mail route. A post office was established in the small settlement called "Willard" from 1898 until September 1902. The Union Army created a post at the lake following a great flood that swelled the banks of the lake. The lake would get smaller during dry times and swell with the great rains. During World War II, the lake was used to test seaplanes, and a Douglas Aircraft plant making assemblies for Boeing B-17 Flying wing Fortress bombers was located in the city. The lake ran dry during most of the 1950s and was refilled in the early 1960s. It expands and contracts with rainfall. Lake Elsinore was incorporated in April 1888. Its' 2020 population is 70,265. Jason Simpson is the city manager and Candice Alvarez is the City Clerk. Damaris Abraham is the Community Development Director. Nancy Lassey is the Finance Manager, and Jennifer Avina is the Human Resources Manager.



Lake Elsinore City Manager Jason Simpson began his working career as a Senior Auditor for a private accounting firm. In November 1994, Jason went to work for Costa Mesa as Assistant Director of Finance. He was hired by Vallejo in

October 1998 as Assistant Director of Finance. Following a private side stint, Jason went to <u>Indio</u> as Assistant Director of Finance in 2002 and he took a similar post in <u>Temecula</u> in 2004, and <u>Desert Hot Springs</u> in 2008. In 2012 he became Director of Finance in <u>San Bernardino</u>, and in 2013 Director of Administration for the South Orange County Wastewater Authority. In 2014 he joined the Lake Elsinore city staff as Director of Administrative Services. He became Assistant City Manager in 2017 and then City Manager in 2021. 
